Spring is Almost Here...

Spring is just around the corner, which means starting April 1st fire permits are required and summer hours start at the landfill sites.

Starting April 1st fire permits will be available online at www.neebing.org or from the Municipal Office, AJ's Trading Post and Green Acres Variety.

Summer hours at the landfill sites run from April 1st to September 30th each year. During this period, both sites will be open Saturdays from 9:00 am to 5:00 pm, as well as Sundays and Wednesdays from 4:00 pm to 8:00 pm.

- Being Held to Consider a General Amendment to Neebing's Comprehensive Zoning By-law

Please take notice that the Council of The Corporation of the Municipality of Neebing, sitting as Committee of the Whole, will hold a Public Meeting on **Wednesday**, **April 1**, **2020 at 5:00 p.m.**, at the Neebing Municipal office (4766 Highway 61, Neebing, Ontario) to consider an amendment to Neebing's Comprehensive Zoning By-law (Number 2017-030) under Section 34 of the Planning Act, R.S.O. 1990, c. P.13, as amended.

The proposed amendment will increase the side yard set back for garages with side walls greater than 3.1 meters (10 feet) from the current requirement (which is 1.5 meters) to match the requirement for main buildings such as residences (which is 5 meters). The proposed change will apply to the Lakefront Residential, Residential 1, Residential 2 and Seasonal zones.

This amendment is being recommended due to the increased popularity of lofts and/or apartments being constructed over garages. The smaller set-back for accessory buildings, such as garages, is suitable for smaller struc-

tures, but not suitable for buildings that are more similar in size and appearance to main houses than to accessory buildings. Large structures close to property lines can have negative impacts on the neighbouring residential property occupants.

ANY PERSON may attend the Public Meeting and/or make written or verbal presentations either in support of, or in opposition to, the proposed Zoning By-law Amendment. If a person or public body that files an appeal of a decision of the Municipality of Neebing in respect of the proposed Zoning By-law Amendment does not make oral submissions at this public meeting, or does not provide written submissions prior to the decision of the Council in the matter, the Local Planning Appeals Tribunal may not grant them status to maintain an appeal.

Submissions by regular lettermail, facsimile, electronic mail or personal delivery are accepted, however, the onus is on the person submitting the information (by whatever means) to make sure that it was actually received.

- Being Held to Consider - Staff Recommendations for the Formal Closure of Three Roads

Please take notice that the Council of The Corporation of the Municipality of Neebing, sitting as Committee of the Whole, will hold a Public Meeting on **Wednesday, March 20th, 2020 at 5:00 p.m.**, at the Neebing Municipal office (4766 Highway 61, Neebing, Ontario) to consider Staff Recommendations to close three roads in the Municipality. Authority to close roads is found in Section 34 of the Municipal Act, 2001.

The first road under consideration is shown on Plan of Subdivision Number M99 (south shore of Oliver Lake) as "Pete's Place". This very short road, branching off of Willowdale Road, was dedicated to the Province when Registered Plan of Subdivision M99 was finalized in 1962. At that time, Scoble was a township without municipal organization. There are no municipal addresses on either road. Rather, the lots on the Plan of Subdivision which are shown to front on Pete's Place have municipal addresses on Willowdale Road. The Municipality has never constructed nor maintained "Pete's Place" as a public road.

"Pete's Place" became the property of the Municipality when Scoble was amalgamated into Neebing on January 1st, 1999. Council is considering formally closing the road as such to prevent public access rights to property which is occupied currently by persons with abutting properties.

Pete's Place is listed in the Municipality's Road Maintenance Policy as an "unmaintained municipal highway".

The second road under consideration is shown on Plan of Subdivision Number M99 (south shore of Oliver Lake) as "John's Place". The comments above, with respect to "Pete's Place" apply equally to "John's Place".

The third road under consideration is known as "Garbo Road" and / or "Pine River Road". It exists on property that used to be Highway 61 before the highway was re-routed in the early 1950's. It branches off of Memory Road near the intersection of current Highway 61 and Memory Road. By order in council under the "Highway Improvement Act" as it then existed, the property was "transferred to the municipality within which it is situate" on May 11, 1953. A portion of the property is used as the road bed for that part of Memory Road that intersects with Highway 61. However, where Memory Road veers to the east, and "Garbo Road" (also known as "Pine River Road") continues along the former Highway 61 property, southerly, the property is not maintained by the municipality and functions as a driveway to a house with municipal address 28 Memory Road.

On the opposite side of Pine River, the property that was formerly Highway 61 continues, leading up to existing Highway 61. Adjacent lands to this portion of the property are vacant. There was once a bridge over the Pine River joining the two portions of property that used to be part of Highway 61, however, it is no longer there.

This property is listed in the Municipality's Road Maintenance Policy as a "private road". While the Municipality has never maintained the road as a public road, a formal closure is being recommended by staff to create more certainty for the general public.

ANY PERSON may attend the Public Meeting and / or make written or verbal presentations either in support of, or in opposition to, the proposed road closures.

Which Electronic Devices Can Be Recycled?

Neebing participates in the provincial electronics recycling program. Electronic waste can be brought to both landfill sites in Neebing. Ever wonder what products can be recycled? Below is a list of the devices that are accepted:

- <u>Display Devices</u> Televisions and monitors, including various technologies such as Cathode Ray Tube (CRT), flat panel (LCD, LED and plasma) and rear projection.
- Non-cellular Telephones Includes corded and cordless telephones, as well as telephone answering machines.
- Home Audio/Video Systems Includes VCRs, DVD and CD players, speakers, amplifiers, receivers, data projectors and similar audio/video systems.
- <u>Desktop Computers</u> Desktop computers (including those acting as servers).
- Floor-Standing Photocopiers/Multi-Function Devices Floor-standing printing devices including printers, photocopiers, and multi-function de-
- <u>Portable Computers</u> Includes portable computers such as laptops, netbooks, notebooks and tablets.
- Computer Peripherals Includes both wired and wireless manual input devices such as keyboards, mice and trackballs.
- <u>Desktop Printers/Multi-Function Devices</u> Printers designed to reside on a work surface, including laser and LED, ink jet, dot matrix, thermal, dye sublimation and "multi-function" copy, scan, fax and print devices. Stand-alone desktop fax machines are also included in this category.
- Personal/Portable Audio/Video Systems Includes docking speakers, portable stereos, portable CD players, portable audio recorders, tape/radio players, digital media (MP3) players, voice recorders, and digital and video cameras.
- <u>Home Theater In-A-Box (HTB) Systems</u> Includes pre-packaged disc player/speaker/amplifier systems for use with video or television display to create a home theatre experience.
- Vehicle Audio/Video Systems (aftermarket) Includes amplifiers, equalizers, speakers and audio/video components.
- Cellular Devices and Pagers Cellular phones, including those offering camera, video recording and/or audio functions; smartphones (cell-enabled); cell-enabled PDAs utilizing touch-screen. technology; cell-enabled handheld devices.

Before dropping off your electronic devices:

- 1. Assess if the device can be reused and given away.
- 2. Ensure the service account for the device is deactivated.
- 3. Clear your device of personal information including removing the SIM card.



In Neebing, March can be a pretty exciting month! As I write this message on a sub-zero February morning, a look outside at the dirty snow banks, along with the sight of water dripping from the roof, I can observe signs that

winter is actually slowly, but reluctantly giving way to Spring.



NEEBING FIRE AND RESCUE ASSOCIATION (NFRA) Brief History of NFRA

- NFRA began in the early 1970's as there were no organized emergency
- Group of volunteers dedicated to raising funds for emergency needs and to improve the level of community well-being and safety.
- Early efforts included acquiring water packs and portable pumps to protect residents from grass and brush fires.
- Constant and steady work lead to the creation of a Volunteer Fire Department, Neebing Emergency Services (NES), including the acquisition of fire trucks and fire halls, essential firefighting equipment, the development of a First Response Pre-ambulance Care Team to provide immediate and bridge care to trauma and medical emergency care during the wait for an ambulance.
- Today there are 5 fire halls, 36 volunteer fire fighters/first responders and up to date emergency equipment.
- They respond to approximately 100 incidents per year.



Beyond Books: You Can't Judge a Library Book by its Cover

At times, it is a bit hard to describe or put into words the Library's value and how it contributes to our health and well being. You cannot always judge a library by its cover or simply by its books. One way that we can look at our Library's value is to look at how users respond to the varying services and programs. You might see the sparkle in a mom's face as she watches her young family master new skills, or you might see the smile of an older adult who is learning new information in their quest for life long learning, or you might see the teen building their self esteem and growing in confidence while exploring career paths or finding common interests amongst other peers.

We also look at usage and interests through the number of visits and program attendance. Over the last 5 years, the total no. of visits at both the Rosslyn and Murillo Libraries has increased significantly by almost 7,000 (from 13,250 to 20,187 visits). In 2019, 151 new members joined the Library, programs saw a 30% increase in attendance, and ebooks soared to a 47% increase

with 4,500 books being checked out. Our Library's value and importance has become more and more significant over the last decade. As our community grows and changes both in population and interests, the Library responds by providing services and programs to meet the many varying needs of rural residents. People of all ages, abilities, and backgrounds come to the Library for many reasons including connecting with others in a welcoming and inclusive environment. It is important that the Library understands and continues to listen to

> the needs of our residents.

One of the areas that the Library is working on is to better meet the needs of people with disabilities. Under the Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act (AODA), the Library is required to make programs and services accessible. To help meet this legislated requirement, the Library is looking at improving its front desk service by investing in a front desk that has varying heights which will help staff better serve everyone including

those who use a wheelchair. This improvement will help create better access to library services for all people in our community. Funding for these kinds of initiatives are, in part, supported by fundraising events.

Recently, the Library hosted a fun, educational event to raise funds towards items such as new front desks that are not funded in the annual budget. Rosslyn resident, Doug Ratz, presented an evening of interesting facts about five different kinds of whiskey from around the world. Participants not only enjoyed learning about the different kinds of whiskey, their origin and tastes, but were also treated to foods from the country where the whiskey originated. Canada's whiskey proved to be one of the most popular and the most enjoyed by participants. When the whiskey was paired with Marilyn TenHave's homemade butter tarts made with pure maple syrup, it was simply delicious! The overall evening was a delight to all who attended. Participants commented on how it was the best whiskey tasting event that they had ever attended.



The Rural Pharmacist:

The Coronavirus and Global Outbreaks

The novel Coronavirus has the world's attention, and rightfully so. At the time of writing, China has reported approximately 75,000 cases and 2121 deaths while another 1076 have been reported from 26 other countries, including 7 deaths.

There's so much that we still don't know about the coronavirus. These outbreaks tend to spread fast and scientists are faced with the challenge of racing to find solutions to respond. Misinformation can spread even faster yet, especially with social media, and it's important to focus on what we do know and what we can do.

There were early comparisons between the Coronavirus and the SARS outbreak in Toronto in 2003, but experts say the Coronavirus isn't like days (the incubation period). These in-SARS. One big difference is when it is


After exposure to most viruses, there's a period of time when it grows in your body and eventually, you become contagious and infectious-this is called the "incubation period". You usually become contagious right before you get sick and show symptoms. For example, Influenza (the Flu) generally has an incubation period of 2 days, while you're probably infectious 12 hours before the symptoms appear. This is why the flu can spread so quickly. If Bob is contagious with the flu before he is showing symptoms and comes in contact with a plane full of people, then that plane full of people can grow the virus within 2 fected people will then be contagious to the people they come in contact with in the next day or so, and the virus will continue to spread in that fashion.


Regarding the Toronto SARS virus from 2003, it had a different pattern in how it spread. It didn't spread before you got sick, but rather you were infectious while you were sick and the sicker you got then the more infectious you became. These diseases spread heavily in hospitals and that is why so many healthcare workers were affected by SARS.

There was a lot of concern among healthcare workers when news of the Coronavirus emerged, but there haven't been hospital outbreaks in China, which is good news. The bad news with the Coronavirus is that it spreads similarly to the majority of other viruses, in that you can be contagious even before you get sick. More of the good news- since SARS there has been significant investments in global communication for detecting and managing potential outbreaks. When SARS 2003 happened, Toronto didn't know they had any cases until they had 40 cases. With Coronavirus, it was detected and identified early. Patients with characteristic symptoms were properly screened, diagnosed and then efforts were made to find potential contacts they may have had in recent days.

When analyzing and comparing the SARS scenario vs the present Coronavirus scenario it is truly amazing how fast public health officials moved to limit the spread. China has done some impressive work in building a hospital in just 10 days for patients, along with shutting down international travel from Wuhan (where the virus originated from).

I understand this might not fall under "light reading", but it is fascinating, and also a little unsettling, how unique these illnesses are and how little we may know. Hopefully, China's quarantine is able to slow and stop the spread. They are doing everything they can and if they can't control it with the public health measures they are taking then it will be a valuable lesson for the world. How can we better prepare so that we are in a better position to react to these situations? What if a virus like this started in a less developed country that didn't respond quickly? I feel terrible for everyone in China. It is a scary situation, but one that we must learn from. Chances are slim that we will be affected here in our hometown by the coronavirus, but this can still serve as a lesson to help prevent other communicable diseases. Wash your hands, cover your cough, stay home when you're sick, make sure your vaccinations are up-to-date. If you've never gotten your flu shot because "you've never gotten the flu" then do it for those around you.
