Dirt Road Dust Suppression

Reducing dust on municipal gravel roads is good for people who travel the roads, and for residents who live along the road. Reducing dust also helps maintain the road surface by keeping fine gravel from blowing away.

Liquid calcium chloride salt is used for long-term dust control. Calcium chloride is the same type of salt that is used in household water softener systems

Municipal staff do not keep a supply of calcium salt on-hand. When the municipality arranges for the application of liquid calcium to gravel roads, they order it by the truckload, and pay for it to be applied to the road surface. The best time to apply calcium is when a road is damp, with a slow soaking rainfall providing the best condition for the application of calcium salt. Rainfall from brief intense storms tends to run off the road surface quickly, and water does not soak into the road in the same way as a longer duration rain-shower does. Unfortunately, rainfall does not follow a schedule.

Prior to spreading calcium, the road surface should be graded and free of potholes. But freshly graded roads are dustier than non-graded roads, so there are times the Municipality receives dust complaints when the road surface is being prepared for the application of calcium salt.

Liquid calcium road salt is expensive, and costs about \$1,000 per kilometer of road. Some roads that have a very low traffic count may not have calcium treatment, and other may have treatment applied every few years as required, rather than every year.

In an ideal world, calcium dust suppression treatment would be able to be applied whenever and whenever it is required. The municipality does its best to ensure as many of the roads are treated as possible.

Neebing Municipal Services Modifications Updated July 17, 2020

OPENINGS:

All Municipality of Neebing parks and recreation facilities including boat launches, washrooms, gazebos, picnic tables, benches, BMX park and children's playgrounds are open. For your own safety, physical distancing of 2 metres or 6 feet must be maintained. These areas and their related equipment ARE NOT SANITIZED. You are using the amenities at your own risk. Bring your own hand sanitizer and disinfecting wipes.

CLOSURES:

 Municipal buildings that remain closed to the public include the Municipal Office, Public Works, Fire Halls and the Good Neighbour Sheds at the landfill sites. We continue to work on having appropriate safety measures in place for both staff and the public before these buildings will reopen.

GENERAL SERVICE NOTICES: LANDFILL AND RECYCLING:

- Both the Scoble and Sand Hill Landfills are open and running regular summer hours Wednesdays and Sunday 4 pm 8 pm and Saturdays 9 am 5 pm.
- For household garbage bag tags, you can collect your tags at the landfill sites during regular hours of operation. You MUST present photo ID (driver's licence) to the attendant in order to receive your tags. If you are a seasonal property owner, bring your tax bill to show proof of property ownership as your ID will not indicate a Neebing address.
- Loads of debris and waste requiring a tipping fee waybill will be recorded at the landfill and invoiced through the Municipal Office.
- The Good Neighbour Sheds remain **closed** to the public.

BUILDING PERMITS AND INSPECTIONS:

- Building permit applications will continue to be accepted, reviewed and approved to facilitate all types of construction.
- Building inspections will continue for all permitted construction projects.
- Please contact our Chief Building Official, Ken Yanishewski to arrange for an appointment to discuss to your building project.

PROPERTY TAX PAYMENTS:

- Property tax payments can be made using internet banking, by dropping a cheque, money order or bank draft in the mail or in the secure mailbox at the office located in the entrance alcove or through Paymentus by credit card. Visit our website www.neebing.org/taxes for additional payment details.
- We are currently unable to accept cash and debit payments as our office remains closed.

Shoreline Condition Statement for the Lake Superior shoreline within its Area of Jurisdiction, due to continued high water levels that remain well above average.

The beginning of July water level was 12 centimetres below last year's record high, 24 centimetres above its beginning of July average (1918-2019), and the 9th highest beginning of July level on record.

The current water level is approximately 49 centimetres lower than the 100-year flood level for Lake Superior. Lake Superior water



The LRCA has updated the levels fluctuate seasonally, therefore as expected, levels will continue to increase into the summer. Water levels on Lake Superior are expected to remain above average for a prolonged period of time, continuing a heightened risk of shoreline flooding, beach submersion and wave driven erosion along some reaches of the shoreline.

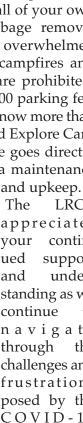
> The LRCA is planning on conducting some Living Classroom workshops during the months of September, October and November, provided we can do so safely. Keep an eye on our website at www.lakeheadca.com for up-to-date information on topics, dates and times. Pre-registration will be required, and space will be extremely limited.

If you do plan on visiting a Conservation Area this summer, you must comply with physical distancing practices; Provincial orders surrounding acceptable group sizes must also be adhered to.

While visiting, all pets must be on-leash at all times and picked up after, please remove all of your own garbage as our garbage removal process is currently overwhelmed and remember that campfires and overnight camping are prohibited. Don't forget your \$2.00 parking fee; it is most appreciated now more than ever, and coin box and Explore Card Parking Pass revenue goes directly to Conservation Area maintenance

Neebing Emergency Services

The Summer of 2020 - 'Sunshine, Lollipops and ... a Good Dose of the Unexpected'!

I hesitate as I write this month's piece - the word August, unfortunately, signals that summer is now on the downside. However, we still have a month (and usually more) to enjoy 'summer activities' while also appreciating the fruits (and veggies, and flowers,) of a Neebing summer. As many have noted, it's been a 'real' summer - with hot, sunny days. Recently, we have welcomed some rainy episodes, which delighted eager gardeners and helped to significantly lower the wildfire threat in our area. To those who picked up Canna lilies at the office these past few weeks, they should grow well with the heat and moisture, and will hopefully add a tropic-like flair to your garden.

As we move through August, and the remainder of what has been an excellent summer, it is important to remember that both personal and fire **safety** need to be kept in mind and addressed. The following tips will help you to enjoy these last weeks of "summer fun" safely:

- If you are on (or close to) the water, lifejackets or PFDs are an absolute must;
- Never leave 'little (or non-) swimmers' unattended in the pool or lake;
- If you are cooking on the BBQ, it is wise to ensure that you have a spray bottle of plain water nearby to knock down unexpected flare-ups. If this spray-application fails, close the lid, turn off the heat, and, if necessary, think about what other options you might have to replace your incinerated supper;
- Be aware that while you are using the BBQ, loose clothing (such as large sleeves or flowy/flimsy fabrics) can easily ignite if it gets too close to the heat/flame. If, unfortunately, you do receive a burn, cool the burn area immediately with cool water or, if available, a wrapped an ice pack. Rapid cooling of a burn helps to reduce possible tissue damage, and to ease some of the injury pain;
- If you are outside when a thunderstorm begins, take cover indoors. Although lightening can be 'electrifying' (pun intended) to watch, all that energy can prove to be

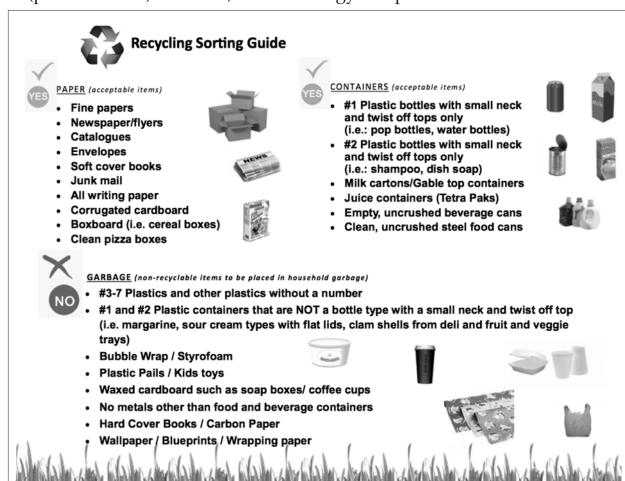
- deadly if you (or objects near you) get struck by a bolt of lightening;
- Be advised that trees that fall on hydro lines (which is frequently known to occur during high-wind conditions) can result in both a subsequent fire, and an electrocution threat to your safety. Keep yourself and others away from the area of downed tree(s) and any impacted hydro wires, and call 911 to report the incident;
- Drink plenty of fluids on hot days, especially if you are active/working outside. As well are taking in water liquid, you would be wise to replenish electrolytes which are lost from your body through excessive sweating (which can result in dehydration) by including juices or other elctrolyte-drinks;
- Don't forget to apply sunscreen when you plan to be busy outside. Preventive sunscreen application will help to protect your skin from damaging UV rays, while still allowing you to enjoy the warmth and comfort of the summer sun. Frequent re-applications are needed if you are swimming or sweating excessively; and

Finally, as we move through our first COVID 19 summer, it is important to remember to continue to adhere to the "COVID protection habits" that apear to have wisely been adopted by Neebing residents, and to have helped to keep everyone safe over the past five (5) months!

- Wash or Sanitize your hands frequently,
- Maintain **Social Distancing** when you are making contact with others outside of your family 'bubble',
- Stay at Home when possible. This is still the surest way of minimizing the potential for contracting COVID 19. However, during the "reopening' stage of public activity, as we begin to return to many normal activities that require contact with people outside our safety 'bubble', we are encouraged to wear a non-surgical mask to help minimize the potential spread of COVID 19.

It has become apparent over recent months that, unlike routine colds and flu, COVID 19 does not disappear in summer weather. The virus is relatively quickly and easily spread - from an infected host (even if that host is asymptomatic) to an uninfected person, who can then become ill, and infect others.

Now, before it's gone, get out and enjoy the rest of our fabulous 2020 Neebing summer! Stay Safe, Stay Well and Stay Protected

Helpful Information From Neebing's Emergency Services -Covid 19

WHAT IS COVID-19?

- COVID19 is a newly active virus that is highly contagious
- COVID19 most commonly spread by saliva droplets from close human contacts
- Droplets can also survive on surfaces for up to several days and spread through unprotected contact of contaminated surfaces
- COVID symptoms similar to cold or flu, its trademark symptoms include, persistent fever, dry cough and breathing discomfort
- There are currently no medicines or vaccines on the market to alleviate or kill the virus once you are infected
- The incubation period for the virus is up to 14 days

REMINDERS:

- COVID 19 is now a global virus and may be present in any community including
- COVID is a short-lived illness in a person only a small percentage of people get seriously ill, requiring hospitalization.
- Like with a cold or flu the majority of people will have symptoms for a short period of time and return to normal with no outward signs of having been ill.
- There is some evidence that the virus can be spread by people who do not yet show signs of being ill so it is prudent that we keep our distance from others and protect ourselves.

STAYING SAFE:

- Social Distancing maintaining minimum distance from other people of six (6) feet
- Staying at Home minimize all direct contact with those outside your 'home family' (living under one roof) to essential activities such as obtaining food or medi-
- Minimize Movements to essential activities including obtaining food or medi-
- Self Isolation if you have travelled outside your home region, believe you have hadcontact with a person who may have COVID 19 or you feel sick.

REDUCE YOUR RISK FOR COVID:

- Hand Hygiene wash your hands carefully and frequently. Substitute sanitizer where soap and water not available.
- Don't Touch Your Face the virus can be spread by contact from hand contact with acontaminated surface to your body through contact with mouth, nose or eyes
- Decontamination of External Items consider decontamination of items purchased or brought into the home from external sources. This can range from leaving them in the garage for several days to with groceries, washing them down between the car and entering the house.

If you wear gloves, mask or eye protection to increase your protection while conducting 'external' activities remember that you must consider the gear as contaminated and clean it when you change location or activities.

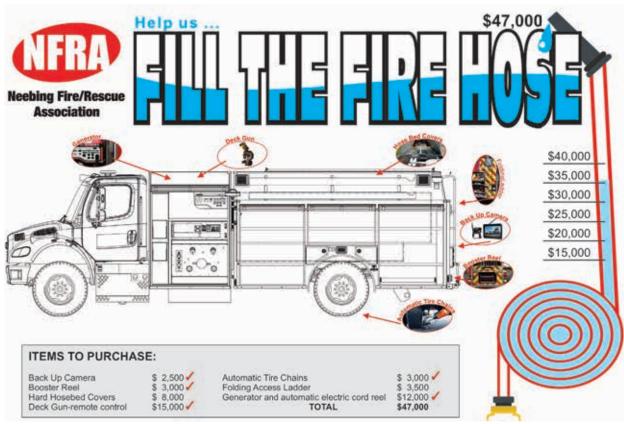

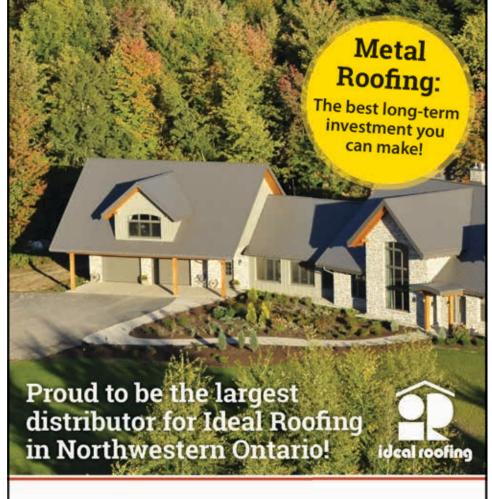

And as they say - if you build it they will come. And they did. Into the garden. And into the house through a very tiny opening at the base of the back door. They were as cute as a button and there were a number of days where you had to watch where you stepped. One even visited me in the bathroom at 3:00 am and was escorted back outside. It didn't bother me. I wasn't annoyed. In fact I was overjoyed to the point of tears. Yup, I cried over toads. It was probably a build up of things, saved up from weeks of stress. Stress and sadness at being isolated and missing people and places

and things and processing all the new rules and guidelines and constant changes. There was just something about those tiny innocent toads that brought it on. They had no clue what a pandemic was. We've been spoiled a bit this summer 30 or higher should be applied to the with such beautiful weather. However, there's one thing that comes to mind when we're stuck in blistering heat. Did you catch the foreshadowing? UV exposure from too much sun can trigger an episode of cold sores. Cold sores are probably more common than you think. In fact, up to 20-40% of the adult population experiences recurrent episodes. So, why don't we take a look into some of the ways that we can help prevent a recurrence this summer and what we can do if a cold sore shows up unin-

Some of the common stressors that can precipitate recurrences include emotional stress, fever, hormonal factors, hyperthermia and UV exposure. Protecting your skin and lips from sun exposure can reduce the frequency of lips and face 30 minutes prior to exposure. It's also not a bad idea to wear lip balm with an indicated SPF. However, this doesn't just go for summer weather. Think back to the last time you went skiing or ice fishing. There's probably a time when you wished you had sunscreen and some lip balm!

But what if you're unlucky and you wake up one morning with a surprise visitor? Well, unfortunately there are no products that can completely get rid of the virus that causes cold sores. However, there are certain products that can help reduce the severity and duration of a flare. Medications such as Abreva which, you can purchase over-the-counter, are intended to do just that. Prescription medications are also available if referred by a physician or nurse practitioner. These tend to be more effective that the over-the-

> counter products but it does require a visit with your prescriber. Either way, each medication works better when it is started as soon as possible. And I mean immediately. For the best outcomes therapy should be started within 24 hours of symptom onset.

In addition to the medications that are available for the virus itself, there are other products we can use to help with the symptoms of a cold sore. Pain, swelling and itchiness tend to accompany a flare. Tylenol and Advil are two good options for helping deal with the pain and swelling. These can be continued while the sore is present and are generally well tolerated. Topical anesthetics such as lidocaine or benzocaine can also be used to help reduce local pain. Sometimes simply using a cold compress can help reduce pain and itching too.

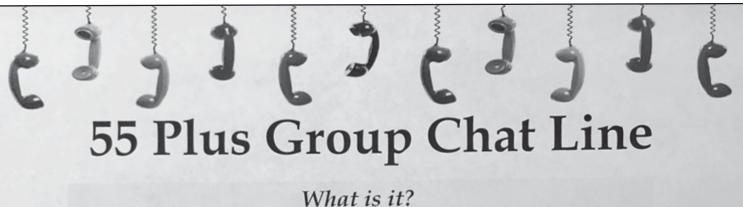
At the end of the day, a little extra help can go a long way to help reduce the burden of a flare up. Many readers probably already have some of the drugs mentioned above in their medicine cabinet. 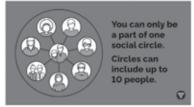

TBDSSAB Promoting Ontario Renovates Funding for Homeowners

July 9, 2020 - The District of Thunder Bay Social Services Administration Board (TBDSSAB) has funds available under the Ontario Renovates program, in the form of forgivable loans, for low- and middle-income families, individuals or seniors to fix up their home.

"Ontario Renovates is part of the Ontario Priorities Housing Initiative that is made possible by funding from the Ontario Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing. The renovation program helps low-income families make vital repairs and modifications that they may otherwise be unable to do," says Bill Bradica, Chief Administrative Officer. " TBDSSAB still has funding available for this year and people are encouraged to apply."

According to Ken Ranta, Director - Integrated Social Services, "Eligible client groups for Ontario Renovates include low to moderate income homeowners residing in the District of Thunder Bay. Some seniors, who may have equity in their home but not sufficient income, may not be able to undertake necessary repairs. Without this type of funding they would likely have to enter into a reverse mortgage or sell the home and move into an apartment. Ontario Renovates allows them to stay safely in their home. The types of repairs and modifications that qualify for the program include roofing and exterior envelope repairs, removal of old oil tanks and replacement of furnaces, insulation and weatherproofing, as well as accessibility modifications like adding entrance ramps, bathroom renovations and making the home walker or wheelchair accessible."

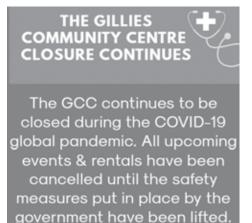
