The Sheds at the Scoble and Sand Hill Landfill sites have been closed since the Provincial Emergency was declared because of the COVID-19 pandemic in March.

The sheds will be reopening after Labour Day weekend with the following safety protocols in place:

- One family at a time may enter the shed
- Masks are required (the shed is an indoor space)
- When waiting to enter the shed please remain 6 feet away from others who are not in your social bubble.

Here are some items that can and cannot can be dropped off to the Good Neighbour sheds. The list of accepted items will change from time-to-time, so be sure to check for additional signage at the shed.

YES: (Place these items in the space provided inside the good neighbour sheds)

- Gently used, unbroken, clean items
- Unused items
- Children's toys

NO: (Put these items in the landfill, or resell privately)

- Upholstered Furniture
- Clothing and Footwear including boots
- Encyclopedias and Magazines
- Food
- Items that require electricity to run
- Liquids

Please note the items in the shed are NOT sanitized. If you take something home, please clean or sanitize the item before use. Any items you pick up at the Good Neighbour sheds are to used at your own risk.

# Neebing Municipal Services During COVID-19

Updated August 17, 2020

- Municipal buildings including the Municipal Office, Public Works and Fire Halls, remain CLOSED to the public.
- Outdoor parks, playgrounds and recreation amenities including boat launches, gazebos, picnic tables and the BMX park are OPEN.
- Remember to practise physical distancing while using these facilities and ensure there are no gatherings of more than 10 people.

Please keep our parks clean and if you pack it in, pack it out! The Boy Scouts have a rule: "Always leave the campground cleaner than you found it." If you find a mess on the ground, you clean it up regardless of who might have made it. You intentionally improve the environment for the next group to enjoy.

#### **Landfill and Recycling:**

- Both the Scoble and Sand Hill landfill sites including the Good Neighbour sheds are OPEN running normal hours of operation.
- Annual Municipal Garbage Bag Tag allotments can be picked up at either landfill site. You must present photo ID to the attendants in order to receive your tags.
- Household battery recycling is being offered at both landfill sites. Bring in your batteries for proper disposal. Accepted batteries are AA AAA C D 6 and 9-volt (including rechargeable), watch and cellphone batteries.

#### **Building Permits and Inspections:**

- Building permit applications are being accepted, reviewed and approved to facilitate all types of construction, and inspections will continue for all permitted projects.
- Please contact our Chief Building Official, Ken Yanishewski at 807-630-9726 to arrange for an appointment to discuss to your building project.

#### **Property Tax Payments:**

- Property tax payments can be made using internet banking, through Paymentus by credit card, by dropping a cheque, money order or bank draft in the mail or in the secure mailbox at the office located in the entrance alcove.
- We are currently unable to accept cash and debit payments as the office is closed to the public.

#### **Municipal Council Meetings:**

- Council passed a by-law to allow members of Council to participate and vote at council meetings electronically during this emergency.
- Council meetings are virtual and held on regular council dates being the first and third Wednesday of each month. A 'virtual meeting' is the hosting of a meeting in a virtual environment and not face-to-face. Participants call in by telephone or connect online through the internet.

### The Rural Pharmacist: **Diabetes and Monitoring Your Blood Sugars**

Summer is winding down and now is a good opportunity for diabetics to reset and analyze their blood sugar profile, as the bonfire smores and BBQ cookouts are less plentiful. We want to make sure we are doing what we can to prevent future health risks, like increased risk for cardiovascular disease, kidney disease, or nerve pains. Diabetes management can be difficult and overwhelming for new diabetics and experienced diabetics alike. There are oral medications, insulin injection techniques to learn, lifestyle modifications to adapt, and then there's monitoring your blood sugar trends and understanding how to handle them.

As technology continues to improve, we have seen new diabetic metres (aka glucometers) hit the market to facilitate patient self-monitoring of their blood sugars. Today's glucometers require smaller blood samples when pricking your finger, because this isn't supposed to look like a crime scene. Many glucometers also have Bluetooth capability to connect with your smartphone which allows you to analyze all your testing data to identify trends and provide valuable in-

There's the new Freestyle Libre which reads your blood sugars through a small sensor on the back of your arm. This small sensor stays in place for 2 weeks at a time and eliminates the need for finger pricks, as you can check your blood sugar by scanning the sensor with the reader device. This allows for ease of frequent monitoring throughout the day for people that may need to adjust their insulin doses, depending on how high, or low, their blood sugars are before or after a meal.

The newest technology available is the Dexcom G6, which is a continuous blood glucose monitor that is placed on your abdomen. It will provide continuous readings to an app on your phone every 5 minutes to give a blood sugar reading. An alert will notify you if your sugar dips below or rises above your target levels. You can also sync to up to 5 phones to monitor, which could be handy for a parent to manage their child's blood sugars, or a caregiver managing an elderly person's blood sugar. This device is not available through pharmacies in Canada yet, but we anticipate that should happen in the future.

All these testing devices and sories are expensive when you don't have a drug plan, but fortunately most drug plans do cover them, albeit with some criteria. The Freestyle Libre is only covered by the Ontario Drug Benefit (ODB) if you have an active Rx

for insulin therapy, as it is meant for people that need to monitor more frequently. Studies have shown that increased frequency of monitoring for patients on oral medications doesn't result in improved diabetic care. This makes sense, because if your blood sugars are high one day following a reading then you wouldn't adjust your dose of your oral medication, as one would with their insulin therapy. This same concept applies to coverage for test strips through ODB. If you manage your blood sugars with lifestyle modifications or most oral diabetic medications, then you are eligible for 200 test strips per year; if you're on an oral medication that puts you at higher risk for hypoglycemia (or low blood sugars which can be a medical emergency due to risk of going unconscious) then you are eligible for 400 strips per year, as you may need to test more frequently to ensure you avoid a hypoglycemic incident. Again, if you're on insulin you are eligible to receive up to 3000 test strips per year, as one may need to test 4-7 times per day. Most glucometers are free, or the cost is covered by the manufacturer, with the purchase of a box of test strips. Private plans differ in their policies for coverage of diabetic supplies – contact your plan administrator if you have questions regarding your coverage.

Blood sugar monitoring and recommendations on frequency should be individualized on the patient's needs. If a patient is very stable and well within their targets for blood sugars then an A1C test every 3 months with their primary care provider may be enough in monitoring their diabetes, or even testing once a week at home. On the other hand, if a patient is newly diabetic, not meeting their targets, or starting a new medication then testing every day to twice a week may be necessary to monitor trends. Nobody not me, not you, not your doctorwants diabetes monitoring to be a cumbersome activity. It can be important for some people to test more frequently in certain scenarios!

Speak with our pharmacists if you have any questions about which diabetic metre is a good fit for you, how frequently you should be testing or what to do about your testing results. The information that we do gather is only valuable if we take action and use it to improve our diabetic care. With guidance and effort, your diabetes can be managed effectively to prevent future health risks while you get to continue to enjoy the thing s you love in

# Hello September and 'Sayanora' to Summer

Inevitably September, with its transition to the Fall season, brings changes, both in temperature

and colour, from the golden days of Summer. This year we are anticipating our first 'COVID Fall', and many of the traditional activities we have come to expect and enjoy at this time of year will not take place. For example, how odd it will seem to leave summer behind, and not have a community Fall Fair celebration to look forward to, with its prize livestock showings, garden bounty to purchase (and eat), fun activities and music for families to enjoy, steam train engines and fire trucks to marvel at, and friends and neighbours to connect with once more. However, it is important that we, as a community, accept and continue to respect the COVID Rules (and the restrictions they endorse) we have adopted to help to ensure the health and safety of all our residents.

Looking ahead, September is a month where, as days shorten and the weather starts to cool, we need to begin balancing our outdoor fire safety practices with fire safety considerations inside the home. Outside, we want to make sure that we are still practicing safe outdoor cooking habits and fire burning practices, which include following common FireSmart guidelines. These guidelines remind us of the importance of removing tall grasses and fine fuels that are close to our homes and outbuildings, and ensuring that stocked firewood is not piled too close to buildings, especially homes. These wood stockpiles, although convenient, can also provide a bountiful source of fuel that may readily spread to your home if they become ignited as a result of a poorly discarded cigarette butt, or a nearby creeping grass fire. Remember that fire needs fuel to spread, so isolating fuel sources (such as wood piles) from value structures helps to interrupt the easy progress/growth of a fire, thereby helping to protect your valuables.

Of special concern regarding outside fire safety this September, is the fact that locally we have had an absence of good steady rainfall for a number of months. Therefore, there is very little moisture in the soil and in the easily burnable duff-layer in the bush. In fact in recent weeks, as burdocks have been showing off a new crop of very 'sticky' burrs, I am aware that it is possible to simply lay the burdock stock across your thigh, lean back and pull, and the plant (root and all) will come out of the ground, with many of the roots appearing shrunken due to the lack of moisture in the soil. Until we get some serious rainfall, those residents who live in areas with deep duff layers (currently dry, and if ignited, will tend to burn deep and spread further underground) are advised to take extra care with open fires, and to be aware of the potential for lightning strikes during stormy weather. Inside your home, it is time to make plans to get your heating system ready for the season ahead; changing filters, servicing burners, cleaning chimneys, checking pumps, and thermostats, and making sure that whatever your heat source, it is functional and ready to keep you

warm. It is also time, as group/family activities begin to move indoors, to test all your smoke and CO alarms - to ensure they are working properly. They are your first line-of- defense - warning you of the danger of a fire or CO gas (odourless, colourless, tasteless) hazard, and telling you to get out of the house, thereby increasing the chance of your survival should such a situation occur! There are a number of different types of both battery and hardwired smoke/CO units on the market these days. Make sure that you know whether (or not) your units need regular battery changes, have 10 year batteries preinstalled or are hardwired to your electrical system. It should be noted, that some '10 year' batteries may not continue to function as they should for the full ten year period. If, during regular testing, they begin to give out a 'low-battery alarm', it is time to replace the entire unit. All smoke and CO alarms are now stamped with an 'Endof-Use' date. On smoke alarms, the date given is usually 10 years, and on CO alarms, the date may be as low as only 7 years. Any smoke or CO alarm unit that reaches its End-of-Use date must be replaced, regardless of its power source.

Happily, one of the few things that has successfully progressed on schedule despite the COVID pandemic restrictions, is the construction of Neebing's anticipated new fire pumper truck. Once the new pumper is invested, Pumper 141, which served Pearson FD for many years (it was brought into service in the mid 1980's) before becoming a part of the Neebing (at the time of the 1999 amalgamation) fire family will be fully "retired". In addition to serving the Neebing community for the past 30+ years, P141 has also provided a valuable service as the training pumper for not only Neebing Firefighters, but also for many other firefighters from across NW Ontario. When the new pumper arrives this fall, it will have some "big shoes to fill", but it will demonstrate the benefit of 30-plus years of innovation and equipment improvements that P141 did not enjoy. NFRA reports a great show of community support for their special 'Fill the Hose' fund raising initiative. These additional monies will contribute to the purchase of many of the innovative attributes of the new pumper, an example of which are the installed 'automatic tire chains' that can be utilized during 'bad weather' emergency responses. A picture of the new pumper 'under construction' is included below.

I am pleased to report that even in the midst of the pandemic, we have had residents come forward to join our NES ranks. While training sessions and meetings are not carried out in usual fashion, we are creating ways that will allow NES members to engage in critical training activities, which serve to prepare them to serve the community effectively. As well as a Thank You to those who have already stepped forward to join us in these difficult times (and to those who have continued to serve over the past years), I would like to offer a word of encouragement to any person who may be thinking that they would like to join NES. You can take the first step to let us know you are interested by completing an application online on the Neebing municipal website at www.neebing.org , or by simply leaving a message at the office number (474-5331). Neebing's geographic size makes it particularly desirable if emergency volunteers are distributed as broadly

as possible across the municipality. Current population distribution can make this somewhat difficult for a volunteer service. Volunteer distribution is ever changing, and currently volunteer numbers are generally low in the Pearson/ West Oliver Lake area, as well as in areas south of Sturgeon Bay Road.

In managing the COVID pandemic situation, the Province has moved along with "Stage 3 reopening". People are therefore becoming more active in and around their homes, as well a driving more to other areas in our region, and NES has noticed that the number of emergency calls for assistance is beginning to rise. Though not our most desired way to meet our neighbours, it has been reassuring during our calls to see and hear how people are managing and taking care during the pandemic! Well done Neebing!

Thanks also to Don Fawcett for his donation of scrap metal to NFRA.





# **Beyond Books:** Smiles and More

The Library's curbside services have been in demand since opening in July. Once a week from 2 to 7 on Tuesdays at Rosslyn and once a week from 2 to 7 on Wednesdays at Murillo, residents can pick up books and dvds that they have placed on hold or called in to loan. The hours of curbside service may change so check the website, Library facebook page, or call to see what hours are available for pick up. With the uncertainty of these times, curbside services will continue for as long as needed.

Curbside pickup is easy:

- ✓ You need a Library card in good standing.
- ✓ Place items on hold from the Library collection by:
  - 1. Using the Library's online catalogue. Not sure how to use the on line catalogue? Visit:

- 2. Email oplibrary@tbaytel.net; or:
- 3. Phone the Library during business hours Murillo Library phone 935-2729 or Rosslyn Library 939-2312.
- ✓ The number of books and dvds are limited to 5 (of each).
- ✓ Interlibrary loans can be made by email or phone.
- Requests for printing services and the documents to be printed must be provided through an email.
- ✓ When an order is filled, the Library will inform you that it is ready and you will be assigned a pick-up time.

- ✓ Items will be set on a table outside the facility.
- ✓ One patron and one order at a time will be permitted at the table.
- ✔ Physical distancing guidelines are in effect.

Return your books and dvds to the book return drop. All books and dvds are then quarantined for 72 hours. Following the quarantine period, staff disinfect the material according to public health guidelines before they are available again for loan by other residents.

The Province also now permits Libraries to reopen their facilities for in-library use. Like many Libraries across the province, our Libraries are not open yet for in library services and may not be open for awhile. To open the facilities safely, there is a lot of preparation and planning. Right now, we are working on plans that will address the many concerns about public access into the Libraries. We want to make sure that every precaution is in place to protect the health and safety of our residents. This Plan will then go to our Municipality and Council for their review. Because both Libraries are in municipal buildings (Rosslyn and Murillo Community Centres), Council must approve any Plan for public use of these facilities.

### Lakehead Region Conservation Authority

The LRCA has updated the Shoreline Condition Statement for the Lake Superior shoreline within its Area of Jurisdiction, due to continued high water levels that remain well above average. The beginning of August water level was 8 centimetres below last year's record high, 26 centimetres above its beginning of August average (1918-2019), and tied for the 5th highest beginning of August level on record. Water levels on Lake Superior are expected to remain above average for a prolonged period of time, continuing a heightened risk of shoreline flooding, beach submersion and wave driven erosion along some reaches of the shoreline.

With the huge surge in visitors to our Conservation Areas this summer, there has also been an increase in littering and the dumping of personal, household garbage at our Areas. Please ensure that you utilize the clearly marked garbage receptacles, and if they are full, bring your garbage home with you. Do not dump your household garbage in a Conservation Area.

The LRCA is planning on conducting some outdoor Living Classroom workshops during the months of September, October and November. Registration will open soon, so be

sure to keep an eye on our website at www.lakeheadca.com for up-to-date information on topics, dates and times. Pre-registration will be required, space will be extremely limited, and all participants will be required to adhere to any safety measures put in place by staff.

If you do plan on visiting a Conservation Area this summer, you must comply with physical distancing practices; Provincial orders surrounding acceptable group sizes must also be adhered to.

While visiting, all pets must be onleash at all times and picked up after, please remove all of your own garbage as our garbage removal process is currently overwhelmed and remember that campfires and overnight camping are prohibited. Don't forget your \$2.00 parking fee; it is most appreciated now more than ever, and coin box and Explore Card Parking Pass revenue goes directly to Conservation Area maintenance and upkeep.

The LRCA appreciates your continued support and understanding as we continue to navigate through the challenges and frustrations posed by the COVID-19 pandemic, and we look forward to your continued cooperation.




