Again we will be following protocols for COVID-19.



Neebing Municipal Services During COVID-19

Updated September 30, 2020

Municipal buildings including the Municipal Office, Public Works and Fire Halls, remain **CLOSED** to the public. We are still able to provide services and are available by phone 474-5331 and email **www.neebing.org/contact**. We appreciate your patience while we continue to work on the installation of appropriate safety measures aimed at protecting the health of both the public and our staff.

Landfill and Recycling:

- Both the Scoble and Sand Hill landfill sites including the Good Neighbour sheds are OPEN running normal hours of operation.
 - o **REMEMBER:** October 1st both landfills begin operating on Winter Hours: Saturdays 9 am 5 pm and Sundays 12 pm 4 pm.
- Annual Municipal Garbage Bag Tag allotments should be picked up at either landfill site. You must present photo ID to the attendants in order to receive your tags.
- Household battery recycling is offered at both landfill sites. Bring in your batteries for proper disposal. Accepted batteries are AA AAA C D 6 and 9-volt (including rechargeable), watch and cellphone batteries.

Building Permits and Inspections:

- Building permit applications are being accepted, reviewed and approved to facilitate all types of construction, and inspections will continue for all permitted projects.
- Visit our website www.neebing.org/building for permit applications and building information.
- Please contact our Chief Building Official, Ken Yanishewski at 807-708-9944 to arrange for an appointment to discuss to your building project.

Property Tax Payments:

- Property tax payments can be made using internet banking, through Paymentus by credit card, by dropping a cheque, money order or bank draft in the mail or in the secure mailbox at the office located in the entrance alcove.
- We are currently unable to accept cash and debit payments as the office is closed to the public.
- Visit www.neebing.org/taxes for details on alternate payment methods available to you.

Municipal Council Meetings:

- Council passed a by-law to allow members of Council to participate and vote at council meetings electronically during this emergency.
- Council meetings are virtual and held on regular council dates being the first and third Wednesday of each month. A 'virtual meeting' is the hosting of a meeting in a virtual environment and not face-to-face. Participants call in by telephone or connect online through the internet.

From October 18th to the 24th, Ontario is celebrating Public Library Week. If you haven't had the opportunity to use your Library's curbside service pickup, make Public Library Week a time for you to once again enjoy a good read or learn new information and skills.

The theme of Public Library Week is "One Card, One Million Possibilities". The resources offered through your library create important opportunities and possibilities for us to learn, support literacy and education, and help shape new ideas. While your Library may look different in terms of how you loan and receive your books and information, it continues to play a valuable role in the life of our community.

Since curbside pickup began in July, the Library has provided almost 750 loans of books and resources to members. Approximately 390 curbside pickups have been accommodated through this modified service. Many members continue to access ebooks through the library website. So far this year, the number of loans through ebooks has increased by over 50%. To date, almost 4000 ebooks have been accessed through the ebook service provided by the Library.

Rosslyn Library is open for curbside pickups every Tuesday from 2 until 7 p.m. and Murillo is open for pickups on Wednesdays from 2 until 7 p.m. If these times do not work for

Be 'Bear Wise' and Prevent Bear Encounters

Prevent and report encounters with black bears and learn who to contact.

Who to contact

Not every bear sighting is an emergency situation. Here is who to call if you encounter a bear.

Emergency situations

Call 911 or your local police if a bear poses an immediate threat to personal safety and exhibits threatening or aggressive behaviour, such as:

- enters a school yard when school is in session
- stalks people and lingers at the site
- enters or tries to enter a residence
- wanders into a public gathering
- kills livestock/pets and lingers at the site

Police will respond first to an emergency situation, but may request assistance from the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry during daylight hours.

Non-emergency encounters

Call the toll-free Bear Wise reporting line at 1-866-514-2327 (TTY 705-945-7641) if a bear:

- roams around or checks garbage cans
- breaks into a shed where garbage or food is stored
- is in a tree
- pulls down a bird feeder or knocks over a barbecue
- moves through a backyard or field but does not linger

This line operates 24 hours a day, seven days a week, from April 1 to November 30.

If you encounter a black bear

When bears are caught off guard, they are stressed, and usually just want to

Stop. Do not panic. Remain calm.

Generally, the noisier the bear is, the less dangerous it is, provided you do not approach. The noise is meant to "scare" you off and acts as a warning signal.

DO

- Slowly back away while keeping the bear in sight and wait for it to
- If the bear does not leave, throw objects, wave your arms and make noise with a whistle or air horn.
- Prepare to use bear spray.
- If you are near a building or vehicle get inside as a precaution.
- Drop any food you may be carrying and slowly move away.
- If a bear is in a tree, leave it alone. Leave the area. The bear will come down when it feels safe.

DO NOT

- Run, climb a tree or swim.
- Kneel down.
- Make direct eye contact.
- Approach the bear to get a better look.
- Attempt to feed a bear.

Bear warning signs

Black bear attacks are extremely rare. A threatened or predatory black bear will give off warning signs to let you know you are too close. A black bear standing on its hind legs is not a sign of aggressive behaviour. The bear is trying to get a better look at you or catch your scent.

A defensive bear

A bear that feels threatened will:

- salivate excessively and exhale loudly
- make huffing, moaning, clacking and popping sounds with its mouth, teeth and jaws
- lower its head with its ears drawn back while facing you
- charge forward, and/or swat the ground with its paws (known as a bluff' charge)

A predatory bear

The bear will approach silently, usually in rural or remote areas, and may continue to approach regardless of your attempts to deter them by yelling or throwing rocks. If the bear attacks:

- use bear spray
- fight back with everything you have
- do not play dead unless you are sure a mother bear is attacking in defense of her cubs





Neebing Emergency Services

In Neebing, we tend to experience some rather rapid weather changes during the month October. 'True to form', our weather has certainly resulted in seasonal transformations, including the 'unmasking' of beautiful Fall foliage around our community. Indoors, kitchens are busy processing the summer garden food bounty - canning, freezing, and preserving products in anticipation of their enjoyment and sustenance through the coming winter season. Outdoors, buzzing chainsaws signal the cutting and splitting of firewood for the provision of warmth and comfort through the cold days ahead. Summer crops are being harvested, and the summer green fields of corn - still standing - have turned to fields of brown. Jack Frost has been busy too - painting the hillsides in reds and yellows, and smoke is often seen rising from chimneys on cooler mornings.

October is acknowledged as a Fire Safety Month by the entire Fire Service. Each year, during the week around October 9th – in 2020 it is slated for October 4th-10th – the seven (7) day period is celebrated globally as Fire Prevention Week (FPW). During this week, and throughout the following year, the fire service as an entity focuses special attention on a specifically chosen and widely promoted **critical fire safety issue**. The theme for **Fire Prevention Week 2020** is:


"Serve Up Fire Safety in the Kitchen"

While the kitchen is commonly thought of as a room of comfort - for 'consumption and conversation' – it has been shown that statistically (across North America), it is the most likely place in your home for an unintended fire to start. Of note is the fact that **cooking** IS THE #1 cause of all house fires.

NES would like to take this opportunity to remind Neebing residents of the following fire safety tips which should be followed while working in your kitchen:

- Cooking is the #1 cause of fires and burn injuries in the home. Being mindful of this fact while cooking, will help to keep you safety-conscious.
- Focus on the Food you are cooking. Though is seems like it will only take a few seconds to check something in another room, it can really turn out to take much longer, and untended cooking is a major cause of cooking fires.
- Cook Clutter-Free. You should maintain a clutter-free zone around your stove and counter while you are cooking to avoid unintended fires. Dish towels and loose sleeves on your clothing can easily catch fire and cause damage and possible injury.
- A "Kid-Free Zone" should be created in the area around your cooking appliances. Not only does this help to prevent accidental burns, but it keeps little hands from turning up the heat, or pulling on pot handles or reachable hanging electrical cords. A line marked by coloured masking tape line can provide an easy visual zone-boundary without damaging flooring or becoming a trip hazard itself.
- **Use a Timer** as an **audio signal** to remind you that your cooking pot(s) needs to be checked. While you cook, you can use your smartphone as the alarm, even while you are using it for other activities.
- "Put a Lid On It" Unfortunately, the automatic response of many cooks when a pot catches fire, is to try to remove the burning pot from the kitchen, and get it outside. The quickest and safest way to stop a fire in most pots or pans is to smother the flame by placing a suitable lid on top of the burning pot. Just remember to let the pot cool before you remove the lid. If it is opened too soon, the fire may restart.

In the past, NES has celebrated the start of Fire Prevention Week in Neebing by; holding an **Open House** "Meet and Greet" at Fire Hall #1 at the corner of Highways 61 & 608, showing-off fire trucks, providing 'FPW' mes-



saging emblazoned giveaways to help remind everyone of the key fire safety message of the year, and holding a draw at the end of the evening for items useful for ensuring the winner's home fire safety. 2020 has proved to

home fire safety. 2020 has proved to be a different year all around, and the enjoyment of meeting residents face to face to talk about fire safety, and to answer any questions directly, will have to wait for another time. The Rural Pharmacist: Updates from the 2020-21 Flu Season

As we begin to roll into flu season one thing has become apparent to me : much like the rest of 2020, the policies outlining the influenza immunization program continue to develop and change. There are small tweaks, but tweaks nonetheless. There have been a lot of people asking about the availability of the flu vaccine this year; we started receiving inquiries at the beginning of August. But that is with good reason. This year has already been tough enough on everyone. With a vaccine available to help stop the spread of a preventable infection, many people are taking action to protect themselves and those around them. So, what are some of the

The first change is in regards to the "high-dose" influenza vaccine for seniors. This vaccine has been available in Ontario for a few years now. However, it was previously only available from your physician or nurse practitioner. This season the high-dose flu vaccine will become available in community pharmacies. Did you know that this vaccine is not recommended for all individuals? The Ministry of Health has outlined who is eligible to receive this vaccine. Individuals who are over the age of 65 and who are considered high risk for complications of the flu are candidates. At the time of writing this article the Ministry was still determining how many doses of this high-dose vaccine to make available. With that in mind, it's never a bad idea to call ahead and check if we have one avail-

The second change to this year's program will be the increased availability of the community pharmacist. In years past the pharmacy-led administration of flu vaccines was essentially restricted to within the walls of a pharmacy. However, offsite administrations have been approved for

this year. Henry has already reached out to the folks at the Kakabeka Legion. We are working with the Legion to organize a flu shot date in October to allow more people access to the vaccine and to help promote social distancing. Things can get a bit cozy in the pharmacy if multiple groups show up at the same time! We are also hoping to have a location and date set up in Rosslyn soon.

Unfortunately, the third change did NOT happen. Pharmacists in Ontario are still not able to administer vaccines to individuals under the age of 5. Over the past few years this has become only a topic for discussion. It would appear that 2020 will be no different. For those interested in having their children who are under 5 receive a flu vaccine a trip to your family doctor or nurse practitioner will be required. If I were to go out on a limb I would predict this change to come in anticipation of the 2021-22 flu season.

If you have any questions or concerns regarding the flu season and/or how to have your vaccine administered please feel free to reach out. Community pharmacies are anticipating the first shipments of the vaccine in mid to late October, possibly earlier. It can appreciated that this flu season has the potential to become very busy. However, our pharmacists and our staff are ready to help. One thing to note is that we're going to get pretty close in proximity to one another during your visit! For that reason, we ask that everyone continue to follow standard safety protocols. That includes washing your hands and wearing a face mask. To track the development of our flu vaccine status please follow our Facebook page and keep an eye out for our highway signage which will indicate when vaccines become available!

After many months of below average precipitation, July and August received near normal precipitation, which has resulted in the LRCA undeclaring the Low Water Condition; however, groundwater levels in some area private wells remain well below normal for this time of year. Lake Superior levels continue to remain well above average, with the beginning of September level 26 centimetres above the long-term average, 4 centimetres lower than the same time last year and only 6 centimetres below the record-high level of 1950. It is expected that the lake will remain above average for a prolonged period of time; however, will begin the annual seasonal decline into the fall and winter.

Attention teachers: we want to remind you that the LRCA is still able to provide modified outdoor education programs. Please feel free to reach out to us and we will strive to create a custom program that fulfills your classroom's learning requirements while adhering to your school's COVID-19 safety protocols, either in a Conservation Area if pos-

sible, or at an outdoor program on your school grounds. Please contact Rena Viehbeck, Education Coordinator, at (807) 344-5857 ext. 233 for more information.

The weather is starting to cool off and the colours are starting to change, which makes Autumn a particularly excellent time of year to visit a Conservation Area. If you do plan on visiting a Conservation Area this fall, please remember to physically distance while on the trails, and be sure to stay up to date with the current local Health Unit recommendations on gathering sizes.

While visiting, all pets must be onleash at all times and picked up after, please remove all of your own garbage as our garbage removal process is currently overwhelmed and remember that campfires and overnight camping are prohibited. Don't forget your \$2.00 parking fee; it is most appreciated now more than ever, and coin box and Explore Card Parking Pass revenue goes directly to Conservation Area maintenance and upkeep.

The Good Food Box Program will resume in October 2020with a few changes:


- Only 1 size of Good Food Box is available

Adventure Awaits you on the Path of the Paddle in Neebing

The 27,000 km of Canada's Great Trail (Trans Canada Trail) is maintained by its citizens including trail groups, communities and Associations. In Northwestern Ontario, the stewards of the 1100 km section that runs from Fort William Historical Park to the Whiteshell in Manitoba is an organization called Path of the Paddle Association (POPA).

POPA, incorporated in 2013, has 4 Regional Trail Committees (RTCs) that maintain sections of the trail and a Board of Directors which has representation from all the RTCs. The Thunder Bay's RTC should be renamed Neebing RTC as it has always been made up of Neebing residents. Ed Shields was the original

Chair of the Non- Profit Board and now continues as the chair of the "Neebing" RTC. Clara Butikofer and Gary Davies are currently Chair and Vice Chair of the Board with Gary volunteering his carpentry, project organization and Natural Resources background to the team while Clara brings her administration and event planning knowledge to the table. Pam Cain, Bruce Holmes and Erwin Butikofer, all have played their part and support the organization when needed.

A large portion of the Animikii Water Trail section, which begins at Fort William Historical Park and ends at Pigeon River Provincial Park is in Neebing boundaries. Neebing's

Lake Superior boat launches are entry points. As Trans Canada Trail's goal is to be a connection across Canada, the trail also incorporates hiking and cycling to connect waterways. Pigeon River Prov Park includes a hiking trail that concludes at Middle Falls and from there it becomes a cycling route to an entry point on Old Border Rd where the Pigeon River Hiking Trail begins and ends on Arrow Lake Road. From Arrow Lake Road the trail is designated for cycling and follows Arrow Lake Rd to North Fowl Lake Rd and ends at North Fowl Lake where the Omimi Water Trail begins. The Omimi water trail extends through LaVerendrye Park and the lakes and rivers adjacent to Minnesota's Boundary Waters to the Cache Bay Entry of Quetico Provincial Park Entry points are also at Arrow Lake and Northern Light

To plan a trip for any length of time requires a navigation tool. POPA partnered with funder Destination Northern Ontario to develop an overview map for trip planning. The map, which was launched recently, is available for \$12.95 on the POPA website and in Thunder Bay at Wilderness Supply or Chaltrek Work & Play Outdoors.

With funding from Trans Canada Trail, the local RTC was able to add several improvements. Each campsite on Lake Superior now boasts a "Thunder Box", a bench is installed at the lookout on the Middle Falls Trail and you will note bluebird and duck boxes with POPA signage when you are at boat launches or in natural habitat areas. Volunteers groom trails and ensure signage is visible. It is a never-ending project and sometimes disappointing when souvenir hunters remove signs.

This trail belongs to all Canadian citizens and each of us can do our part to ensure it is available for future generations.
