Harry Mintenko passed away on September 25, 2020.

He and his wife Joan were fixtures down in Sturgeon Bay for decades. A better friend or neighbour couldn't be hoped for.

I remember moving to Margaret St almost 30 years ago from Thunder Bay and one of the first people we met were "the Mintenkos" Harry had been on Council and was still on the volunteer fire department. We were told about an insurance saving we could access because of the proximity to a water pumper stationed at his location. We went down and he told us about it, and after that many more stories, [or tales if you wish], about the history, the people, the events, etc. I was amazed by his energy, his recall, his sense of fun and after that, we returned to our building site, and felt more confident that all would be well, 'living in the country,' especially with neighbours like Harry and Joan.

One of my favourite stories was about their wonderful Christmas displays that we looked forward to every year when winter brought so much darkness. The lights, the decorations on the Mintenko place were out-

standing, often better than all we saw in town. And then we saw what they did in preparation one fall, when we stopped by to chat. Harry was in his tractor, and Joan was in the bucket of the tractor, PUTTING UP THE LIGHTS ON THE ROOF, SOME 10 FEET UP OR MORE.....chatting and laughing and arguing about what to put where. Yikes!

They enjoyed dancing every Saturday night and family gatherings of which there were many, until Harry's health began to fail and they moved to the city.

Joan became his caregiver even when she had health issues herself. Whenever we would meet at the grocery store or doctor's office, she would be in good spirits and Harry would smile and nod. Amazing people, amazing neighbours and friends.

I now know why his nickname was Harry the Hat after reading his obituary .He did so many things in his life, his works, his jobs, his family responsibilities including so much community service on Council and our NES So many hats..

A man of many talents was Harry Mintenko. We will miss him.

Neebing Emergency Services

Brrrr ... Can It Really be 'November' Already?

Why is it, that as much as the COVID situation (with its requirement for social distancing, mask wearing and 'stay at home' messaging) has seemed to slow things down, the months seem to be going by faster?

November is the month that starts with 'NO', as in **NO** more fire permits 'til next Spring, **NO** more wondering how to costume up the kids for this Halloween and **NO** more hoping for just a few more days of warm weather! Instead, our thoughts begin to change to wishes for a lovely White Christmas.

The declaration of the first week of November as being **Carbon Monoxide Week (CO)**, is another reminder of seasonal change. As our activities move inside, heating systems start running full time, windows and doors get shut tight, and the threat of possible CO poisoning increases. The servicing of your heating system to make sure it is operating correctly is important in reducing the risk of CO leaks. In addition, testing your **CO alarm** regularly to make sure that it is operating properly is essential. It is meant to provide a level of assurance that if CO does develop inside your home, the CO alarm will provide an early warning of the detected danger, and afford residents the opportunity to immediately exit the house before they become incapacitated by

If you have a seasonal property and use battery powered CO and smoke alarms, something to be aware of is that the ability of batteries to generate power is greatly reduced when the temperature of their environment is lowered, but that they will in fact return to normal operation once they warm up again. This issue is not a problem if you are fully seasonal, and will not be returning until next spring. However, if you are using your seaproperty intermittently throughout the winter, and not maintaining a warm inside temperature, you should be aware that the batteries in your alarms will take some time to warm up before they are operating fully again. It would be wise to test the alarms before your tuck in at night, to ensure the batteries have warmed up enough to activate in the event of a smoke or CO hazard.

November is also time to ensure

you are ready for the coming winter;

- Check the **chimney**, and clean it if required.
- Make sure your snow shovel and snow blower are ready for action to keep your **driveway** clear, not only for day-to-day use, but in case an emergency vehicle needs to gain access to your residence should you need help.
- Changeover to your **winter tires**, to allow for improved/safer winter driving.
- Ensure your **winter travel kit** is ready for emergency use stocked with some spare mitts, a flashlight, a foil blanket and a candle with matches.

Hoping everyone who picked up the fire engine red canna lilies this spring has remembered to either dig them up if they were planted in your garden, or move the pots inside for the winter. If you store them in a cool dark place over the winter, they will provide many future years of enjoyable foliage and flowers. Speaking of 'fire engine', see below an updated progress picture of our new Neebing fire pumper truck.

Open Burning of Garbage

What Is Open Burning?

Open burning refers to burning garbage in barrels, open pits, outdoor furnaces, woodstoves, or fireplaces. Open burning of garbage is much more harmful to your health and the environment than you may think. Even seemingly harmless materials like paper, cardboard, yard waste, and construction debris -- releases a hazardous mixture of cancer-causing compounds and other toxic substances when open-burned.

Open Burning Bylaws

Many Canadian communities including Neebing have developed bylaws prohibiting open burning or restricting the types of materials that can be open-burned. Neebing Bylaw 2009-829 is a by-law to provide for the regulation of burning of noxious materials in the Municipality. Any person/owner who contravenes any conditions of Bylaw 2009-829 is guilty of an offence and upon first conviction is subject o a minimum fine of \$250 and a maximum fine of \$5,000.

Dioxins, Furans, and Your Health

One of the greatest concerns with open burning of garbage is the health risks posed by the release of dioxins and furans into the environment. Exposure to dioxins and furans has been linked to certain types of cancers, liver problems, impairment of the immune system, the endocrine system, and reproductive functions and effects on the developing nervous system and other developmental events.

In Canada, the open burning of garbage produces more dioxins and furans than all industrial activities combined.

Dioxins, Furans, and Your Environment

Since open burning of garbage is more common in rural and agricultural areas, there is particular concern for high levels of dioxins and furans settling on crops, in our streams, and in our lakes. Dioxins and furans produced by the open burning of garbage are deposited on plants, which are eaten by animals. The dioxins and furans are absorbed by these animals and stay in the food chain until they ultimately end up in our meat and dairy products. In fact, over 90 percent of our intake of dioxins and furans is from our diet.

Safer Alternatives

Following the 3Rs (Reduce, Reuse, Recycle) principle and disposing of your garbage in a safer way will help you protect your health and the environment.

Reduce: Avoid disposable items. Buy products in bulk instead of individually wrapped or single-serving sizes. Buy durable products and products that can be recharged, repaired, or refilled.

Reuse: Donate items you no longer need such as clothing, furniture, books, magazines, and toys to relatives, friends, or charities. Mend and repair rather than discard or replace.

Recycle: Separate the recyclable items from your garbage and prepare them for drop off at the recycling depot at the landfill.

Compost: Install a backyard compost bin for composting your kitchen and yard waste or participate in your community's organics collection program.

Dispose: Bring your garbage to your local landfill.


IN MEMORY OF LOCAL FIREFIGHTER HARRY MINTENKO














The Rural Pharmacist: Flu Shots Are Back in Stock!

Is it just me, or did October disappear faster than our flu vaccine supply?! The Ministry of Health's initial allotment of flu vaccine for each pharmacy in Ontario was equal to 50% of their total doses administered last flu season. We got our supply Tuesday, October 6th and we were out of stock at both our Rosslyn & Kakabeka locations by Saturday, October 10th! We did half the amount of last year's total flu shots in less than a week! We wish we could reorder vaccines right away, but the Ministry of Health was very strict and would not allow reorders to occur until October 26th. Patient uptake is way up thus far, with recommendations from health experts that this year it is very important to be up to date on your vaccines.

Like Rick Mercer said, on CBC's This Hour Has 22 Minutes "You've never been hit by a car before, but you still look both ways when you cross the street, right?" Just because you haven't had the flu in the last few years doesn't mean you shouldn't get the flu shot to protect you and your loved ones. It's the best thing you can do to protect against the flu, especially in a year when you want to avoid being any type of sick.

As Devon wrote last month, this is the first year that pharmacies are able to administer both the High Dose (HD) Senior flu vaccine and regular flu vaccine. We've had many requests for the high dose flu vaccine, and also many questions asking what really is the difference between the high dose flu vaccine and the regular vaccine?

The senior vaccine is a "High Dose Trivalent Influenza Vaccine" (HDTIV). It covers 2 influenza A strains and 1 influenza B strain. In a study where it was compared to its regular strength trivalent flu vaccine counterpart (which is no longer used), it resulted in less hospitalizations for seniors. The HDTIV vaccine is only available to people ages 65+.

The regular vaccine offered at pharmacies this year is a "Quadrivalent Influenza Vaccine" (QIV). It covers 2 influenza A strains and 2 influenza B strains and is indicated in ages 6 months+. The extra B strain that the QIV covers is a strain that is prevalent in young children, which one could argue might be beneficial for grandparents who are in regular contact with young children. Note that the HDTIV and QIV vaccines have not been directly compared in a study and there is no evidence to support one to

be superior or inferior to the other. The Ministry is only providing pharmacies with a limited supply of the HDTIV vaccine, and they will not provide us with the quantity that will be made available to each pharmacy. Ask our pharmacists which vaccine they recommend for you. Patients with COPD, cancer, immunocompromised, heart failure or over 80 years old may benefit from the HDTIV, but rest assured the regular QIV offers good influenza protection. You should not skip the QIV in hopes of finding an HDTIV at another pharmacy, as they also have limited quantities and may also be out of stock. The sooner you get your shot, the sooner you are protected (it can take two weeks for your body to build immunity after receiving the flu vaccine). The best flu shot you get is the one you get today.

At the time of writing, we are expecting to resume flu shots in our pharmacies Monday, October 26th. We have been doing our best to book and maintain appointments for flu shots, in an effort to control patient traffic and prevent crowds. Walk-Ins may be accepted depending on appointment availability. Please call the pharmacy and speak with our friendly staff to book an appointment for you and your family. Please remember that flu shots are subject to availability and unfortunately it can be out of our control, due to Ministry allocation.

We will also be holding a Flu Clinic at the Kakabeka Legion (and possibly Oliver Paipoonge Community Centre) in early November. We are unable to announce a date in this article because we want to make sure we will have appropriate stock on hand to properly serve a clinic. We should know more the week of October 26th. Stay tuned for signage in the pharmacy and around the village along with highway sign in front of the Legion for clinic dates!

Thanks for your patience through the first wave of flu shots. If we were unable to serve you because of supply issues then we look forward to seeing you again in November to ensure you're protected!

Municipal buildings including the Municipal Office, Public Works Garage and Fire Halls remain CLOSED to the public. We continue to provide essential municipal services and are available by phone 474-5331 and email **neebing@neebing.org**. We appreciate your patience as we continue to protect the health of the public and our staff.

Mobile Health Clinic:

The NorWest Community Health Centre advises that all mobile health clinic programs are temporarily paused until further notice. This includes flu clinics.

Flu Shots:

- The Thunder Bay District Health Unit offers by appointment only flu shot clinics for children under 5 and their families. Those over the age of 5 can be immunized by their health care provider or a pharmacy.

Landfill and Recycling:

- Both the Scoble and Sand Hill landfill sites including the Good Neighbour sheds are OPEN running normal hours of operation.
- Operating hours: Saturdays 9 am 5 pm and Sundays 12 pm - 4 pm.
- Annual Municipal Garbage Bag Tag allotments should be picked up at either landfill site. You must present photo ID to the attendants in order to receive your tags.
- Household battery recycling is offered at both landfill sites. Bring in your batteries for proper disposal. Accepted batteries are AA AAA C D 6 and 9-volt (including rechargeable), watch and cellphone batteries.

Building Permits and Inspections:

- Building permit applications are being accepted, reviewed and approved to facilitate all types of construction, and inspections will continue for all permitted projects.

- Please contact our Chief Building Official, Ken Yanishewski at (807) 708-9944 to discuss to your building project and permit needs.

Property Tax Payments:

- Property tax payments can be made using your online banking program, through Payments by credit card, or by dropping a cheque, money order or bank draft in the mail or in the secure mailbox at the office located in the entrance alcove.
- We are currently unable to accept cash and debit payments as the office is closed to the public.

Municipal Council Meetings:

- Council passed a by-law to allow members of Council to participate and vote at council meetings electronically during this emergency.

Grab 'N Go Service Coming Soon to Rosslyn Library

Rosslyn Library will be opening soon. The hours, times, and number of people that can be in the Library at any one time will be limited. Under the limited reopening plan that was approved by Council, Rosslyn will begin to reopen one day per week. The exact date that the Rosslyn Library will be open for "in facility" grab'n go loans will be announced. Watch for information on the Library's facebook page or the website.

Special thanks to Chris Bowles – Director of Operations and Fire Chief – Sean Horan for reviewing the plan and inspecting the facility to make sure that we have everything in place to maintain a safe facility for patrons. Once again, Oliver Paipoonge's CAO/City Clerk – Wayne Hanchard provided invaluable guidance and review of the plan to make sure it provides for the health and safety of our residents and staff.

Like most services that you may have used over the last several months, we want to continue to keep people safe in our community and therefore, we are limiting how patrons can use the library. Key things you need to know when coming into Rosslyn Library:

The grab'n go service will be available at Rosslyn Library on Tuesdays from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. (Start date to be announced).

There will be a limit of 3 patrons in the Library at any one time or if a household has more than 3 people, then a single household unit will be permitted into the Library.

Children ages 9 and under must stay within arm's length of parents/guardians.

There will be a limit to the amount of time that each person/ household can be in the Library. The limit is 15 minutes per person/ household.

Before entering the Library, a hand sanitizing station will be set up and you must use it before coming into the library.

Masks or face coverings must be worn when entering the Library (Oliver Paipoonge Mandatory Mask Policy By-Law No. 65 2020) and must cover the mouth, nose, and chin as outlined in the Policy and recommended by health authorities. Toys and equipment including computers will not be available at this time.

The used book area with book sales by donation will be open under the same limitations as the main library area. Donation envelopes will be available.

There will be limited patron access to the public washrooms.

Patrons' movement in the library will be guided by tables/ shelves. Please respect physical distancing amongst patrons and staff.

Curbside pick up will continue at Rosslyn, however, once the grab'n go service opens at Rosslyn, the date for curbside pick up will change to Thursdays from 2 p.m. to 7 p.m. Here, Oliver Paipoonge residents **Kelsea Chon**y and sons, **Liam and Ehron** enjoy a quick stop at the Rosslyn Library curbside pick up.



The reopening of Murillo Library will occur at a future date yet to be determined. Murillo Library curbside pick up is available to patrons on Wednesdays, 2 p.m. to 7 p.m. At this time, we are moving cautiously and at a pace that we feel is in the best interests of everyone to continue maintaining a safe and healthy environment.
