

Neebing Fire and Rescue



Neebing Municipal Services During COVID-19

Updated January 1, 2021

Municipal Buildings:

All Municipal Buildings will be **CLOSED** to the general public until the Provincial Lockdown is lifted. Essential municipal services continue being offered during the lockdown. Contact us by telephone **474-5331** or email **neebing@neebing.org**.

On January 11, 2021, pending provincial approval, the Municipal Office will re-open with **entry restrictions** and COVID-19 safety protocols in place for the public and our staff. Entry restrictions include:

- Only one visitor at a time is permitted inside the building
- The wearing of face masks is MANDATORY

Municipal matters requiring in-person consultations must be scheduled in advance. Please call the office at 474-5331 to book an appointment.

Stay safe and avoid unnecessary interactions with others not from your immediate household. We strongly recommend using options other than in-person contact to conduct business whenever possible.

The Rural Pharmacist:

HELLO 2021! WHERE IS MY COVID VACCINE?!

Welcome 2021! We've been patiently... or let me correct that.. We've been eagerly awaiting your arrival to bring us closer to the normal sense of reality and freedom that we so dearly miss from pre-Covid times. We have all experienced a different type of lifestyle in the past year and I hope that there were some highlights and memories that you are able to reflect on in a challenging year.

Dr. Anthony Fauci, lead physician and expert on America's COVID taskforce, has recently said that the US can return to normal if the vaccine rollout is efficient and diligent. There are differing opinions on the timeline for "return to normal", but most can agree that mass vaccination is a huge step in the right direction.

Now, at the time of writing, it has been frustrating to see the poor execution of the rollout of vaccination for the public in Canada. Studies show that the vaccines are more effective in preventing COVID-19 infections once administered to humans instead of staying locked in freezers. This would be a funnier joke if there was a better plan to get these vaccines in Canadians' arms. Hopefully by the team you're reading this there is some progress.

We've been getting a lot of questions about when we will start administering the COVID vaccine in our pharmacies. We are eager to help with vaccinating the public, but we have not yet received any direction from the Ministry of Health with respect to timelines or protocols for vaccine rollout in pharmacies. I anticipate that perhaps pharmacists will be involved once more vaccine stock is shipped to Canada; initial vaccine rollout will likely be more tightly regulated for frontline workers and long-term care residents. There is also some physical distribution

challenges as the vaccines need to be kept at extremely cold tempera-

People have had questions about the safety of the vaccine, citing concern that it all happened too fast to be safe. When the vaccine is offered to me, will I get it? Absolutely! And I will likely recommend it for you too.

Canada has approved the Pfizer and the Moderna vaccine, with the likelihood that more COVID vaccines will be approved in the future as they check the right boxes. How do these vaccines work? Past vaccines, like the flu vaccine, use a live, but weakened/inactivated virus. The COVID vaccine doesn't actually contain the COVID virus; the COVID vaccine contains mRNA, which essentially is a memory cell that, once exposed to the vaccine, will help your immune system remember how to fight the COVID virus if you were to be infected with it. Once you get the COVID vaccine your body basically has the instructions how to fight and eliminate the infecting virus quickly and effectively, rather than starting from scratch to figure out how to fight the virus while you're infected and the virus is racing to spread throughout your body. Complicated? The science might be, but luckily all we have to do is roll up our sleeves once it's offered!

Should we be concerned about it being new? No, this technology isn't entirely new and has been studied in cancer research. Should we be concerned about the speed at which it was developed? Didn't they cut corners to get it approved quickly? No and no. The reasons vaccines generally take so long to get developed is that there is so

much red tape. Think of the pile of trial applications that sit on the desk of Health Canada/FDA to be approved. Instead of waiting months for their trial applications to make it to the top of the pile, the COVID vaccine trials had priority treatment and was addressed as a priority. Also, Chinese scientists had already provided us with the genetic code of the virus in January, months before COVID even reached our city. Less red tape, more technology and funding to give them a head start.

Between the Moderna and Pfizer vaccines, they were tested in about 37,000 people (and an additional 37,000 people received placebo). This is comparable with testing populations for other vaccines, and the trials didn't have to wait months to recruit people as people lining up to try the vaccine in the middle of a pandemic.

What about side effects? How do we know there aren't bad side effects down the road we don't know about? Decades of vaccine research shows us that side effects generally occur quickly after receiving doses, from days to weeks following the dose. I'm not concerned about side effects from the vaccine in the slightest. I'm more concerned about the long-term effects that they've seen from COVID infections such as long-term lung damage.

The more people that get vaccinated the sooner we will return to normal. I will be rolling up my sleeve at first opportunity and I encourage everyone else to as well. Do it for you and do it for your community. Hopefully I'll see you in a socially-distanced line soon as we wait with our sleeves rolled up!





- Volunteers are always needed. Volunteers are needed throughout the Spring/Summer getting the Grounds ready, and during Fair Weekend.



Notice of a Public Meeting being held to consider an Application for a proposed Severance

Please take notice that the Council of The Corporation of the Municipality of Neebing, sitting as Committee of the Whole, will hold a Public Meeting on Wednesday, January 20, 2021, at 5:00 p.m., via electronic meeting to consider a proposed severance under Section 53 of the Planning Act, R.S.O. 1990, c. P.13, as amended. The Committee's recommendations to Council will be considered for ratification at the Regular Council Meeting on the same evening, commencing at 6:00 p.m.

The Application (B05-2020) is brought by Norman and Bonnie Bernauer, the property owner. The land parcel which is the subject matter of the application is a vacant parcel with no municipal address, located at the corner of Cloud Bay Road North and Jarvis Bay Road East. The legal description of the land is: North Part Lot 1, Concession 3, Parcel 5819, within geographic Crooks Township, Municipality of Neebing, in the District of Thunder Bay. This is referred to as the "Subject Property".

The proposed severance would result in one new lot (7.2 hectares), and the retained lot (46.6 hectares). A sketch showing the lot configuration is included with the application, a copy of which is available on the Neebing website (www.neebing.org) or by contacting the Municipal Office. The retained lot will have frontage of approximately 533 meters on Jarvis Bay Road East and 380 meters on Cloud Bay Road North. The severed lot will have frontage of approximately 230 meters on Jarvis Bay Road East and 314 meters on Cloud Bay Road North. The severed lot will be rectangular in shape with a depth (from Cloud Bay Road North) of approximately 230 meters, and an area of approximately 7.2 hectares. The retained lot will be L-shaped, with a depth of approximately 787 meters from Cloud Bay Road North, and an area of approximately 46.6 hectares in area. All measurements are "approximate", and will be finalized when the required survey has been completed.

ANY PERSON may attend the Public Meeting and/or make written or verbal presentations either in support of, or in opposition to, the proposed severance.

How to provide input: Although in-person meetings have been cancelled, there are several ways in which the general public can provide input on the application, such as:

- a) Submit comments in writing by email, to clerk@neebing.org or by regular mail to the address below. Comments shall be submitted by 4:30 p.m. on Wednesday, January 20, 2021.
- b) Register to speak at the electronic meeting by email, to clerk@neebing.org. After registering, you will receive a confirmation email containing information about joining the meeting by following the link provided through email. Please note that neither a computer, nor a video sharing device is required to participate in the electronic meeting via. You may also opt to call in from a cell or landline. A toll-free number will be provided for this purpose. To register by phone please call: 807-474-5331.

Finally, 2021!

I don't remember the sound of many celebratory fireworks on New Year's Eve, but I am pretty sure I "heard" a collective, worldwide sigh of relief that the year **2020** was

finally over and gone!

In reality, and according to the calendar, **2020** was just another year – another 365 days that had just passed us by. Unfortunately, it's unlikely that in the years ahead, **'2020'** will be remembered with positive fondness as a year that provided, for our enjoyment and pleasure, some of the most consistently wonderful summer weather in recent memory, or allowed us the safe "fire season" we experienced (good job Neebing), with so few accidental or brush fire events!

It is more likely that 2020 will go down as 'the year of COVID', which included a year of lockdowns and 'social distancing', with distillers making hand sanitizer (to augment the benefits of required 'frequent hand washing') rather than Canadian whiskey. There were masks to be worn, and line-ups to shop indoors (with directional arrows to dictate shoppers 'traffic flow') or outdoor 'pick-up only' services for those who had preordered required supplies. For most, there were cancelled holiday travel plans, and most everyone got used to the social 'bubbles' that allowed for some small social get-togethers with family and friends, and 'through-the-window-only' kisses with precious grand-children. Fortunately, *ZOOM* and other virtual tools served as quasisubstitutes for 'face-to-face' interactions – facilitating conversations needed by some businesses to continue operations, and transmitting a semblance of the usual hearty hugs that serve and help to bond human families.

Interestingly, as we enter 2021 - with the promise of newly available vaccines that will 'soon' render the world safe once again - it seems that the rules of **2020** will still apply in order for us to remain safe. The prospect of things returning to 'normal' anytime soon in 2021 [at least for the first six (6) months] will depend on all of us adhering to many of the rules and regulations we just left behind in 2020. The good news is that we now have a lot of experience, and we know what we need to do to stay safe. And instead of dark uncertainty, there is light at the end of the tunnel! However, even as the rules gradually loosen, it will be interesting to observe those habits that 'stay the same'. While some will gleefully and quickly shed their face masks, it will not be a surprise if the wearing of masks becomes the norm for many when in social gatherings of strangers. As well, frequent hand-washing, the use of hand sanitizer, and the disinfecting of high-contact points may continue for some time to come - visible reminders of the changes wrought by COVID and the year 2020.

Now back to the main raison d'etre of this piece, which is to share recommendations on staying 'fire safe' in Neebing, during this and every month of **2021**. Firstly, I wish to congratulate all our residents for following fire-safe practices during the pandemic, thereby helping to make **2020's** total activity numbers for Neebing Emergency Services (NES) one of the lowest since Neebing's amalgamation in


1999. Interestingly, almost half the calls for the year occurred before the first COVID lockdown in mid-March.

Fire Safety tips for January are focused on safely managing; heating systems, electrical heaters and cords, cooking fires in the kitchen and remaining diligent in our awareness of the dangers of Carbon Monoxide, especially during the winter. In Neebing, checking and cleaning of chimneys and ensuring that any exhaust vents are kept clear of snow buildup, should be regular safety checks throughout the winter months. It is also recommended that you review your home Fire Escape Plan, update it for any household changes and ensure that it is suitable and ready for use during cold winter night situations. You also encouraged to view the OAFC website which provides broad reference of winter safety tips.

Winter Fire Safety Tip | Ontario Association of Fire Chiefs (oafc.on.ca). On a local, practical level, I am also inspired (as the result of a recent occurrence in the community) to remind residents of the **value of fire extinguishers** in and around the home. Especially on rural properties, where there are often a plethora of outbuildings, machinery and recreational vehicles, a fire extinguisher, used properly can, in the early stages of a fire, help reduce fire growth and spread. Remember even a serviced and ready fire extinguisher is only designed to provide a first line of suppression when a fire starts. You will also want to call 911 to make sure that the fire trucks are on the way, and ready to provide fire suppression when the fire extinguisher runs out. Practice makes perfect in most things including the use of a fire extinguisher so be sure to take advantage of fire extinguisher training when you have the opportunity - it only takes a few minutes to learn the proper techniques to safely and effectively use your extin-


On your **SMARTPHONE**, touch the 3 horizontal bars in the upper righthand corner then on the Report a Concern link.

Snow Clearing Reminder!

As we head into winter, the Municipality would like to take this opportunity to remind everyone that placing snow from private property onto municipal road allowances is not permitted. This practice is contrary to municipal by-laws and the Province's Highway Traffic Act. Section 181 of the Highway Traffic Act states:

181. No person shall deposit snow or ice on a roadway without permission in writing so to do from the Ministry or the road authority responsible for the maintenance of the road

Placing snow on the roadway creates safety hazards for vehicle traffic and makes road maintenance more difficult. Please help keep the roads safe for everyone!








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As of 12:01 AM on Saturday, December 26th, 2020, the government of Ontario has issued a province-wide shutdown. The COVID-19 Response Framework: Keeping Ontario Safe and Open Framework (colour-coded system) has been suspended for 14 days in Northern Ontario and 28 days in Southern Ontario. When the province-wide Shutdown has ended, the COVID-19 Response Framework will be re-enacted.

It is strongly recommended that you:

- stay home
- limit trips outside the home to essential reasons (work, grocery/pharmacy shopping, medical appointments)
- work from home if possible
- mark special occasions by meeting online, especially over the holiday season

Follow all public health measures:

- Physically distancing from those outside your household.
- Not travelling unless you have to (e.g. medical appointment)
- Washing hands frequently or using alcohol-based hand sanitizer.
- Wearing a mask or face covering that is tightly fitted to cover the nose, mouth, and chin. Face shields are not a substitute for face masks. Scarves and bandanas are insufficient.
- Staying home if you are unwell.

What is "Shutdown"?

The goal of the province-wide shutdown is to limit the movement of people to slow down the spread of COVID-19 and allow the Ontario health care and public health systems time to recover from the spike of COVID-19 that could happen during this holiday season.

This list below is an overview of the measures:

Indoor Gatherings

- Only gather with the people you live with.
- Those who live alone and single parents may consider close contact with only one other household.

Outdoor Gatherings

- Limited to 10 people;
- Must keep 2 metres (6 feet) physical distance from all others.

Travel

- Do not travel outside of the Thunder Bay region if it is not essential.
- Individuals and families arriving or returning to Ontario during the shutdown period should self-isolate for 14 days.

- Elementary and secondary schools will learn from home from January 4 Janu-
- Northern Ontario schools can open to students on January 11.

Child Care

All types of child care stay open.

• From January 4 – January 8, 2021, licensed child care centres and authorized recreation and skill-building providers cannot provide services to school-aged children. Before- and after-school programs must be closed during that time period.

Restaurants and bars

• Take-out, drive-through, and delivery only

Outdoor recreation

- Ski hills are closed.
- Playgrounds, tobogganing hills, ice rinks, show-shoe and cross-country trails, and more are open but certain rules will apply.

Indoor recreation

Closed
