The COVID-19 vaccine: five things you need to know

Ontario's vaccination rollout is well underway. You can protect yourself, your loved ones, and your community by getting vaccinated. Here's more information about the COVID-19 vaccines

No steps were skipped in developing these vaccines. While the COVID-19 vaccines were made available quickly, they were developed using mRNA research and technology used by scientists since the early 1990s. This research is well developed and the technology has been used effectively and is proven safe and reliable.

COVID-19 vaccines will not give you COVID-19. Unlike other vaccines, COVID-19 vaccines don't contain the virus itself. Instead, these types of vaccines teach our cells how to make a protein that will trigger an immune response and create antibodies

The vaccines have been reviewed and approved by Health Canada. In order to be used in Canada, all drugs, including vaccines, must meet the regulatory requirements for safety, efficacy and quality. Usually this review process can take a long time because new drugs and vaccines get added to the bottom of the list, and must wait their turn for review. However, these vaccines are so important they went right to the front of the line, allowing the process to be much quicker than usual.

Two doses deliver stronger immunity. It is important to receive both doses of the vaccine to complete the vaccine series. Protection offered by the first dose helps your body build immunity and the second dose boosts your immunity. For example, the Pfizer-BioNTech and Moderna vaccines are 94-95% effective after two doses.

When a large percentage of the population becomes immune to COVID-19, the spread of the virus will slow down or stop. You can protect yourself, your loved ones and your community by getting the COVID-19 vaccine.

P.13, as amended. The Committee's recommendations to Council will be considered for ratification at the Regular Council Meeting on the same evening, commencing at 6:00 p.m.

The Application (B02-2021) is brought by Linda Christiansen, the property owner. The land parcel which is the subject matter of the application is a vacant parcel with no municipal address, located at Highway 597 and Coulson Road. 



Please take notice that the Council for The Corporation of the Municipality of Neebing (sitting as Committee of the Whole) will hold a Public Meeting on Wednesday, June 16, 2021 at 5:00 p.m., at the Neebing Municipal office to consider an application to sever one land parcel into two under Section 53 of the Planning Act, R.S.O. 1990, c. P.13, as amended. The Committee's recommendations to Council will be considered for ratification at the Regular Council Meeting on the same evening, commencing at 6:00 p.m.

The Application (B01-2021) is brought by Andre Agarand and Deborah Park, the property owners. This application is a re-submission of Application B03-2019 that was approved on October 2, 2019 but the timelines to complete the conditions have lapsed. The land parcel which is the subject matter of the application has municipal address 35 Nicolson Road. The legal description of the land is: Part of the North half of Lot 7, Concession 3, now identified as Part 2 on Reference Plan of Survey 55R-6369, all within geographic Pearson Township, Municipality of Neebing, in the District of Thunder Bay.

The proposed severance would result in one new lot, and the retained lot. A sketch showing the lot configuration is included in the application, available either on Neebing's website (www.neebing.org/notices), or by contacting the Municipal Office. The retained lot will have frontage of approximately 665 meters on Nicolson Road, and the severed lot will have frontage of approximately 220 meters on Highway 597 and 134 meters on Nicolson Road. The retained lot will contain the existing residence and outbuildings, and the severed lot will be vacant. The severed lot will be approximately 4 hectares (10 acres) in area, and the retained lot will be approximately 25 hectares (61 acres) in area. The severed lot will have a depth of approximately 134 meters measured from Highway 597. The retained lot will have an irregular shape, with depth varying between approximately 266 meters and approximately 396 meters measured from Nicolson Road. All of these "approximate" measurements will be finalized when the required survey has been completed.

THE CORPORATION OF THE MUNICIPALITY OF NEEBING ENVIRONMENTAL SCREENING STUDY EAST OLIVER LAKE (SCOBLE) LANDFILL EXPANSION

NOTICE OF COMPLETION

BACKGROUND

The Corporation of the Municipality of Neebing, the owner and operator of the East Oliver Lake (Scoble) Landfill, has completed an Environmental Screening Study for the proposed expansion to increase the landfilling area within the landfill property boundary from 0.28 to 1.62 hectares, increasing the disposal capacity by approximately 80,000 m³ and extending the landfill life by an estimated 32 years. The work also includes the establishment of a downgradient contaminant attenuation zone. The landfill is located on East Oliver Lake Road (see Key Map) and has been in operation since 1984. The landfill presently accepts household waste, electronics, compost, metals, brush, tires and recyclables.

ENVIRONMENTAL SCREENING PROCESS

The study followed the Ministry of Environment Conservation and Parks (MECP) Screening Process for landfills undergoing an expansion between 40,000 m³ and 100,000 m³ of additional waste capacity, in accordance with Ontario Regulation 101/07 under the *Environmental Assessment Act*. The Study was conducted in accordance with the planning and design process outlined in the MECP's "Guide to Environmental Assessment Requirements for Waste Management Projects" (March, 2007).



The screening process involves identifying and applying screening criteria to determine and describe potential environmental effects, public/external agency consultation, and the development of measures to mitigate identified environmental effects. The results of the Study were documented in an Environmental Screening Report, which is being made available for a 60-calendar day review period starting on **May 8th**, **2021** and ending **July 8th**, **2021**. The Environmental Screening Report is available for public review at **www.neebing.org**. As a result of the current COVID-19 pandemic, hard copies will not be placed on display at public locations. However, if you are unable to access the digital copy of the Environmental Screening Report posted on the Municipality's website, or require an alternative format, please contact the Project Team members listed below.

If concerns regarding this Project cannot be resolved in discussion with the Municipality of Neebing, a person or party may request that the Minister of the Environment, Conservation and Parks make an order for the Project to comply with Part II of the *Environmental Assessment Act* (referred to as a Part II Order), which would elevate the Project to an Individual Environmental Assessment. As of July 1, 2018, a **Part II Order Request Form** must be used to request a Part II Order. The Part II Order Request Form is available online on the Forms Repository website (http://www.forms.ssb.gov.on.ca/) by searching "Part II Order" or "012-2206E" (the form ID number).

Please submit the completed form to each of the following three individuals. If there are no requests to change the status of the project to an Individual EA after the end of the 60-calendar day review period, then the Municipality of Neebing may proceed with submission of an Environmental Compliance Approval Application to the Ministry of Environment Conservation and Parks for the proposed expansion.

What's Been Happening at Council Meetings?

Since the May edition, there have been two regular Council meetings on May 5 and May 19. A Special Council meeting was also held on May 12.

At the regular Council meeting on May 5, the following matters were considered:

- Council adopted the Prudent Investor Standard.
- Council passed by-laws to adopt the 2021 budget and set tax rates.
- Administration was directed to proceed with work towards the Thunder Grinder and the development of snowmobile trails.
- Council supported resolutions from other municipalities regarding the provincial prohibition on golf, bus stops on dead end roads and the Day of Action Against Asian Racism.

At the Special Council meeting on May 12 Council sitting as Committee of the Whole reviewed the draft Strategic Plan.

At the regular Council meeting on May 19, the following matters were considered:

- Council approved a revised roads maintenance policy.
- Council made a ruling regarding the definition of guest cottage in the Zoning By-law.
- Council scheduled the summer regular Council meetings for July

7 and August 11.

- Council authorized a submission for funding to make improvements at the Alf Olsen outdoor rink.
- Council supported resolutions from other municipalities regarding the funding for fire departments and hospital capital equipment.

If you don't have internet capabilities, you can always contact the office for copies of approved minutes.

Lakehead Region Conservation Authority

The 2020 Lakehead Region Conservation Authority Annual Report is now available on our website. Physical copies are being distributed via the Chronicle Journal and will eventually be available at our Administrative Office once it reopens. We are proud of the work completed during 2020 and look forward to continuing our mission to lead the conservation and protection of the Lakehead Watershed in service of our vision of a healthy, safe and sustainable Lakehead Watershed for future generations.

Lake Superior water levels continue to be above average, with the beginning of May level 20 centimetres above average; however, 10 centimetres lower than the level last year. After below average precipitation recorded in January, February and March, April received above average precipitation recorded in area gauges (83 millimetres, compared to the average of 52 millimetres), with the 3-month precipitation average near normal levels.


With the weather getting nicer and more people getting out to explore nature for their physical and mental well-being, the LRCA is seeing huge increases to the number of visitors at our Conservation Areas. We would like to ask for your continued patience, understanding and support as LRCA staff do their best to ensure areas are free of garbage and trails are cleared of trees, etc.

If you are visiting a Conservation Area for exercise, it is mandatory that all Provincial and local health unit orders and recommendations surrounding COVID-19 are followed. All Conservation Area rules and regulations must also be adhered to while visiting, including keeping your dog on-leash and picked up after, and payment of the \$5.00 per vehicle fee. Explore Card Parking Passes are also available for purchase online for \$40.00 +HST each. This is a great and economical way to support the LRCA, and to forgo the parking fee, especially if you plan on visiting one of our properties more than eight times this season.



Neebing Emergency Services

It's June, 2021 as together we prepare for our 2nd 'Covid Summer'!

With the arrival of June, we find ourselves positioned at the start of a summer season which, it appears, will continue to be impacted to some degree by the COVID virus and its pandemic protocols. Initially it had been expected that management of the pandemic situation in 2020 would take just a

few weeks (or maybe even a couple of months) to control. As I write today, although there are still some 'lock-down', 'stay home' situations in place in our province, the rapid ramp-up of vaccinations against the virus has led to the prospect of more outdoor activities being allowed to take place this summer. We are now developing a more optimistic outlook to the potential for a "quasi near-normal", summer ahead!

During the month of June, the top fire-ignition sources are found to be: **cooking equipment**, **cigarettes** (and their careless disposal), and **electrical** distribution equipment. **Cooking** with the use of a **Barbeque** can be a source of particular concern. **Distraction** while cooking has been shown to be a common precipitator of cooking fires. Whether cooking inside at the stove/oven, or outside on the BBQ, it's a **good fire safety habit** to **stay close** and **be attentive** when you are **cooking anything** (especially French **fries**), so that you can catch situations that are "going wrong" before they become a serious fire threat.

BBQ's bring a whole new range of seasonal fire threats, regardless of their heat source - from improper handling of pressurized gases and the unsafe disposal of hot ashes, to the risk of burns from lighter fluids, hot contact points or open flame. Acknowledging that BBQing is a welcome part of our summer life-style, be sure that you remain safety conscious and aware of any common potential fire threats, and make a point to avoid them! Sometimes it is the simplest of actions (such as tucking the BBQ too close to the house for convenience, or to get out of the wind) that can result in a serious fire event. If the BBQ is placed too close to walls or other combustibles, the heat it emits can melt, or even ignite, the siding near it, which could result in fire spread and damage to other parts of the house as well. For more hints on safe BBQ practices check out BBQ Safety Information Sheet - English (gov.on.ca).

For those of us who live in the North, and especially in our community of Neebing - who are, surrounded by endless forests - the other ever-present summer fire concern is the issue of **wildfire**, either causing one, or having to defend your property against one. Although May is now behind us, and we are through the spring fire 'flash point' (occurring between snow loss and green up), anytime over the summer that we experience a weather combination of; **high heat**, **low humidity**, the **absence of rain**, and strong **winds**, wildfire conditions are known to escalate rapidly. As we view the magnitude of wildfire events on the news, it is sometimes difficult to imagine what we might need to do to protect ourselves, and our property from such threats, should they occur.

There are **two (2)** simple **fire safe habits** that you can adopt at a personal level, both of which can contribute to your ability to protect your property from a wildfire threat. **First**, following **safe burning practices** on your own property; making sure that your fires are **small** and **contained**, and that you only burn at times and when all environmental conditions are safe. **Second**, working to manage the area around your **home** and **outbuildings** to reduce the location of combustible materials (available for fire to consume) in close proximity to your valuables. Fire doesn't much care what the available fuel consists of – whether it be deadfall, dead grass or dry duff – fire will simply work its way through whatever fuel is available to support it. Breaking the **chain of fuel** that fire can follow and consume, is the simplest way to improve your protection from a fire that is moving into the living portion of your property.

There is a wealth of excellent advice available (from wildfire experts across the country) under the *FireSmart* banner, with suggestions on actions you can take to protect your property from wildfire. These actions range from: choosing more **fire-resistant materials** when you build your home, and developing a **two (2) metre border** - free of combustibles - around all buildings and valuables, to **landscaping** suggestions that will help reduce fuels that would support a fire that is encroaching close to your home. Following are two (2) links to FireSmart information in Ontario where you will find valuable references

to help you to enhance your property's resistance to wildfire threats. FireSmart (firesmartcanada.ca), provides, along with a number of other tools, a schematic reference with target distances aimed at helping you to reduce combustibles at various distances from your home!



Chix in the Stix **Country Birds**

It's Tourette Syndrome Awareness Month! If you're reading this it means that our uber-publisher has given me the opportunity to share with you, and I promise to work in a country theme somehow. I am joined with permission and input from my daughter, 20. She has Tourettes - a neurological disorder that causes involuntary movements and vocalizations. These tics can be simple and minor or complex and severe. They can wax and wane. The tics themselves can be widely varied from person to person, and unique - anything from clapping, grimacing, barking, laughing – really the list is endless. My daughter has severe complex motor and vocal tics. She also has copralalia. That's the fancy word for the tics that usually get all the attention in movies. It's the involuntary swearing or use of other obscene words or phrases. And she has copropraxia, also popular in movies and includes obscene gestures. Like the middle finger. Flipping the bird as they say. In individuals with Tourettes these types of tics are both fairly rare (she always was an overachiever.) Her tics increased significantly when Covid hit – which is not surprising. Tics can be exacerbated by anxiety or fear, and even by happiness or excitement – any strong emotion really. They can sometimes be suppressed for short periods of time. There are no definitive answers about cause and no cure although some people respond to medication. The good news is that in our case it doesn't stop her from working and living life! It neither defines her nor holds her back. When she is focused and engaged in a task her tics often quiet down. Our family is big on learning lessons from the things life throws at us, and big on sharing what we can so others can learn too. We are still learning a lot from this journey. There are some aspects of Tourettes that you truly can barely imagine until you are living it, and I am sure it is even stranger to be the one having the tics. We have some days filled with fear and uncertainty, and we have done our fair share of crying. But most days we find the humour among the strangeness of it all and we just keep on going. Because it really is a strange and curious diagnosis. My own personal knowledge of Tourettes was zippo before this. And I'm not proud of my perceptions or the assumptions I made. Which is why I

can find compassion when I see the looks on the faces of people we encounter in public when she is tic-ing. It can look like she's a little crazy. The assumption is that she must have a physical or intellectual disability. People try not to make eye contact. We still feel kinda bad for the woman in Metro. Kyra flipped her the bird (might have been a double) and the woman thought she had waved. And there was the time waiting at the lights when she double-birded the car next to us. They were big burly guys and we started to imagine that one day this would be our demise – chased down by some dudes who got the wrong impression. With so many stores using selfcheck-outs now, shopping adventures are common. Think about it. Self check-outs beep. They beep a lot. Which triggers tics. Tics that are beeps. And the beeping can continue for hours. And like I said, we are good with laughing it off and rolling with it, but there are hard days too. It might seem funny to tap the counter, or the wall, or your chest, head, face once or twice. But do it 200, 300 or more times in a day and next thing you're treating bruises and sore muscles. Sadly, wearing a mask is a bit of an issue. It might muffle some of the f-bombs but mostly it makes them, and other tics worse. Tourettes and other tic disorders are not as rare as you would think, and often go hand in hand with other diagnosis and while they generally appear during childhood, it's not uncommon for them to appear in teens and young adults as well. Like most things, once you become aware of something you begin to recognize it more around you. It means a new perspective on life, and on the challenges and struggles people face. And insight into the courage folks have as well. You never really know what the people you encounter are dealing with. So we aren't as quick to judge or make assumptions. As for the country stuff! Well it's no secret that I love all those farmer's fields! This is really my favourite time of year with all the order and busy-ness of planting and fertiliz-And when those little green sprouts come up I think I might be just as excited as the famers! The farmers on their tractors. Who we may or may not be accidentally 'waving' to when we drive by. Hope you understand.

Be 'Bear Wise' and Prevent Bear Encounters

Prevent and report encounters with black bears and learn who to contact.

Who to contact

Not every bear sighting is an emergency situation. Here is who to call if you encounter a bear:

Emergency situations

Call 911 or your local police if a bear poses an immediate threat to personal safety and exhibits threatening or aggressive behavior, such as:

- enters a school yard when school is in session
- stalks people and lingers at the site
- enters or tries to enter a residence
- wanders into a public gathering
- kills livestock/pets and lingers at the site

Police will respond first to an emergency situation, but may request assistance from the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry during daylight hours.

Non-emergency encounters

Call the toll-free Bear Wise reporting line at 1-866-514-2327 (TTY 705-945-7641) if a bear:

- roams around or checks garbage cans
- breaks into a shed where garbage or food is stored
- is in a tree
- pulls down a bird feeder or knocks over a barbecue
- moves through a backyard or field but does not linger

This line operates 24 hours a day, seven days a week, from April 1 to November 30.

If you encounter a black bear

When bears are caught off guard, they are stressed, and usually just want to flee.

Stop. Do not panic. Remain calm.

Generally, the noisier the bear is, the less dangerous it is, provided you do not approach. The noise is meant to "scare" you off and acts as a warning signal.

DO

- Slowly back away while keeping the bear in sight and wait for it to leave.
- If the bear does not leave, throw objects, wave your arms and make noise with a whistle or air horn.
- Prepare to use bear spray.
- If you are near a building or vehicle get inside as a precaution.
- Drop any food you may be carrying and slowly move away.
- If a bear is in a tree, leave it alone. Leave the area. The bear will come down when it feels safe.

DO NOT

- Run, climb a tree or swim.
- Kneel down.
- Make direct eye contact.
- Approach the bear to get a better look.
- Attempt to feed a bear.

Bear warning signs

Black bear attacks are **extremely rare**. A threatened or predatory black bear will give off warning signs to let you know you are too close. A black bear standing on its hind legs is not a sign of aggressive behavior. The bear is trying to get a better look at you or catch your scent.

A defensive bear

A bear that feels threatened will:

- salivate excessively and exhale loudly
- make huffing, moaning, clacking and popping sounds with its mouth, teeth and jaws
- lower its head with its ears drawn back while facing you
- charge forward, and/or swat the ground with its paws (known as a 'bluff' charge)

A predatory bear

The bear will approach silently, usually in rural or remote areas, and may continue to approach regardless of your attempts to deter them by yelling or throwing rocks. If the bear attacks:

- use bear spray
- fight back with everything you have
- do not play dead unless you are sure a mother bear is attacking in defense of her cubs
