

Since the July edition, there has been one regular Council meetings on July 7. A Special Council meeting was also held on July 13.

At the regular Council meeting on July 7, the following matters were considered:

- Council heard deputations regarding parking at West Oliver Lake.
- Council awarded the tender for gravel hauling on Oliver Creek Road, McCluskey Drive and Candy Mountain Drive.
- Council adopted the Community Safety and Wellbeing Plan.
- Council supported a proposal for a new OPP Police Services Board structure.

At the Special Council meeting on July 13, Council awarded the con-

tract for engineering services to replace bridges on Farm Road over Slate River and Pardee Road over Friendly Creek.

Step Three: Road to Reopen

Public Health Guidelines:

Face coverings in indoor public settings and physical distancing requirements remain in place throughout Step Three.

Everyone must maintain a physical distance of at least two metres from others (except for other members of their household or their caregivers):

- in indoor area of business or facility that is open to the public
- at an indoor organized public event

Everyone must wear a mask or face covering that covers their mouth, nose and chin (with limited exceptions):

- in an indoor area of a business or organization that is open
- at an indoor organized public event and within two metres of another individual

- indoor capacity for the facility limited to permit two metres physical distancing up to 50% or 1,000 people, whichever is less, including:
- o maximum of 50% capacity for each rentable room
- o rooms must be separated by a partition with a hard, nonporous surface that can be routinely cleaned and disinfected
- outdoor capacity for the facility limited to 75% or 5,000 people, whichever is less
- maximum capacity must be posted
- the person responsible for the business must record the name

- and contact information of every member of the public who attends a meeting or event and must actively screen individuals. The COVID-19covid 19 customer screening tool may be used to meet this requirement
- rented space must be configured so patrons at different tables are 2 metres apart or separated by a barrier
- if covered (i.e., roof, tent, canopy, etc.), an outdoor dining area must have at least two full sides of the dining area or one full side and the roof open and unobstructed
- certain requirements, including capacity limits, do not apply if rented for:
- o day camps and overnight camps
- o child care
- o social services
- o court services
- o government operations
- o certain professional sports leagues or associations or for certain international sport events (for example, by organizations funded by Sport Canada or recognized by the Canadian Olympic Committee or the Canadian Paralympic Committee)
- additional restrictions apply if rented space is used for events that permit patron dancing:
- o the provisions related to food or drink establishments with dance facilities outlined in the regulation (for example, 25% capacity or 250 per-

sons whichever is less) would apply where food or drink is sold or served while dance facilities are provided For weddings, funerals and other reli-

- all people attending the gathering must comply with pubic health guidance on physical distancing







Neebing Emergency Services

Looking at the calendar, I see that we still have 3 more weeks of potentially hot, humid 'Dog days of Summer' weather to enjoy before things start to cool down, and August finally gives us a break from a July that has been "wonderfully punishing". Though heat-loving plants - like tomatoes, grapes and eggplants - have thrived in the high temperatures, the grass does not look 'happy'. Last week even the grass on the septic field had succumbed to the heat and synced with the rest of the lawn to provide a continuous carpet of brown around the house. It's hard to imagine that with a little rain and some cooler days, it will quickly return to its normal green, and be ready to cut again in no time.

Assuming that the forecasters are right and the dry hot weather of July continues, we can expect to experience several more weeks of brown grass, high fire threats and smoke in the air. The pervasive smoke in Neebing over the past few weeks has prompted a number of calls to the fire department from concerned residents. Though the old adage that 'where there is smoke, there is fire' may normally be applicable, in a year like 2021 - when there are virtually hundreds of fires burning across the western half of the continent – generating a tremendous amount of suspended smoke- it is able to move around the country on prevailing wind systems in such volume as to be highly visible and odiferous far from the original fire location. Breathing this continual odour, can also make us 'nose blind' to the smell of smoke, and fail to register it as a trigger to suspect the threat of an actual close by wildfire.

Though you should never hesitate to **call 911** if you are concerned that there is a wildfire in your area, there are a couple of signs that can help you to visually filter seen 'background smoke' from that of a nearby wildfire:

- Visible Smoke Column: Commonly, in the case of a close-by fire, the smell of smoke will be accompanied by a visible column of smoke, or a glow or even flames in the sky. A call to 911 to report what you can see, and what direction it is from where you are viewing it, will help fire crew(s) to locate the fire site, and to then engage in suppression activities. You should also start thinking about what actions you might need to take, to protect yourself and others from the fire danger if it gets closer. It is wise to monitor local TV, radio, and social media for situation updates.
- Suspended Smoke: If the smoke appears to be suspended in the air and appears cloudy or foggy (with no obvious fire source) as has been the case over much of the past week in Neebiing there is a good chance that the fire is some distance away, and that the smoke is moving into the area on wind currents. Smoke forecast information is readily available at: https://firesmoke.ca/forecasts/current/ and can help provide a quick visual forecast of smoke movements, both across the country and locally. Though this information can be helpful, be careful not to become complacent about the possibility of an actual local fire start. Smoke from afar may make a new local fire-starts harder to detect, and it is important to remain on alert as new fire starts are an ever-present possibility during high and extreme fire hazard conditions.
- **Fire Map:** The MNR produces a **Forest Fire Information Map** that provides a plethora of useful information regarding current fires in the area and their status. It includes data on **Fire Danger Ratings** and identifies **Restricted Fire Zones**. This fire map, available at:

.html?viewer=FFIM.FFIM, is a great resource for a maining informed about fire dangers in the area.

As I write, Neebing remains in an area of Extreme Danger rating. This rating in itself is a warning to be extra cautious and fire-conscious in all our outdoor activities. There have been many instances in the past, whereby normal everyday activities (that are usually harmless in themselves) have, in periods of High Fire Danger, resulted in wildfire starts where dried fine fuels (such as grasses) were present. Seemingly safe sounding activities - such as welding something on a driveway, cutting grass, turning an ATV around on the side of the road, having a bearing on a boat trailer axle fail as you are driving, or inadvertently dropping an ash from a cigarette onto dried grass - have all resulted in unintended fire-starts that required a full fire response by NES fire fighters to manage and suppress.


While taking extra care with all of our outdoor activities right now is the best immediate strategy, there are steps that you can take can be take to better prepare yourself and your property for the possibility of a wildfire event: Mitigating Actions: This column has for a number of years encouraged Neebing residents to become familiar with, and pursue the guidance of the *FireSmart* initiatives with regard to protecting your home and property from wildfire threat occurrences. Many of the recommendations are landscape-focused, and can be pursued by the homeowner on an ongoing basis, thereby continually reducing the ability of a wildfire to threaten, reach and damage the home. There is considerable *FireSmart* information available on line in Ontario. An excellent starting point may be found at: https://www.ontario.ca/page/firesmart .

Evacuation Preparation: While Neebing residents may not be familiar with 'evacuation' situations, there are provisions and procedures for evacuations outlined in the **Neebing Emergency Plan** that provide guidance. The plan identifies: **preparations** residents can make ahead of time, **key items** that should be taken with you if you have to evacuate, how you will be informed regarding **when to evacuate**, and the site to head for when you do evacuate.

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



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The Rural Pharmacist: **Changes to Senior Co-Payment** and Website Launch

It's that time of the year again: Ontario Drug Benefit (ODB) deductible season. Maybe this is your first year being eligible for coverage through the provincial drug insurance program. Maybe it's your 25th! Regardless, it's always worth a mention as August 1st seems to sneak up on all of us. Why don't we start off with a refresher of what the deductible represents? Subsequently, I'd like to touch upon a change that will take place starting August 2021. For our readers it may be worth following along as the updated program might save eligible households a few

The ODB program allows individuals 65 years of age and older to receive coverage for an array of medications in Ontario. However, to gain access to the program individuals must pay an annual deductible of \$100. Most people are familiar with the concept of a deductible. Imagine driving down Highway 11/17 and a transport throws a stone into your window. Crack! Hopefully that didn't hit home with anyone. It's not like it happened to me recently or anything. Anyway, in order for your windshield to be fixed you may have to pay a deductible before your insurance kicks in. That's essentially it. The same concept applies to the deductible paid through the ODB program. The good news is that once your deductible has been satisfied the regular co-pay, the amount paid per prescription, goes back to normal.

Some seniors get additional coverage through what is known as the Seniors Co-Payment Program (SCP). This program is intended to help reduce the cost of medications for individuals who have an annual income below a certain threshold. In this program, recipients do not have to pay an annual \$100. They also have smaller co-payments with each prescription. It is the SCP that is undergoing modifications which could prove beneficial for our patients.

Starting August 2021, the income eligibility for the SCP is being updated from \$19,300 to \$22,200 (for single seniors) and \$32,300 to \$37,100 (for senior couples). The application process is pretty straight forward. An application form can be found on the Ontario Ministry of Health's website. Can't find it? We can help you out! Just ask for a copy at the pharmacy. Once you've completed the application the government will ask for certain documents in order to verify your income. That's it. If you think you may qualify it's definitely worth a few minutes to check out. If you don't qualify, recommend the program to a friend. Everyone can use a hand.

Lastly, we launched a new website for our patients to peruse! Our web address is evergreenrx.ca. Jump on and give it a view. There's a lot of information that we share on our website. We also catalogue our monthly articles which is helpful if you ever lose your print copy. Our functional website allows you to fill prescriptions, sign up for email newsletters and also transfer prescriptions. Still have neighbours that haven't utilized our local service? Direct them to our website and they can begin the pain free process from the comfort of their couch. If you're already signed up for our email newsletter, the link for the SCP application form can also be found there.

On June 14, 2021, the Ministry of Environment, Conservation and Parks received a report of suspected Blue Green Algae at Hazelwood Lake Conservation Area. Further testing confirmed the presence of Blue Green Algae, resulting in the closure of the beach at Hazelwood Lake.

While the Blue Green Algae has now dissipated and the beach has since been re-opened after a two-week closure, we are asking visitors to Hazelwood Lake to remain vigilant. Blue Green Algae are microscopic, plant-like organisms that occur naturally in ponds, rivers, lakes, and streams. They are not normally visible in the water; however, populations can rapidly increase to form a large mass or scum, known as a bloom, during favourable conditions. Blooms typically occur in late summer or early fall, and thrive in shallow, slow moving and warm water. Blooms appear bluish green, like a green pea soup or a turquoise paint, and may even appear as solid looking clumps when very dense blooms are present. Some Blue Green Algae can produce toxins that pose a health risk to people and pets. If a bloom is suspected, avoid entering the water, drinking the water, and prevent pets and children from accessing the water.

If you spot a Blue Green Algae bloom, report it to the Spills Action Centre at 1 (800) 268-6060. Refer to the Thunder Bay District Health Unit for more information about the health risks posed by Blue Green Algae.

Registration is now open for the LRCA's Watershed Explorer and Junior Explorer programs. Space is extremely limited, pre-registration is required, and all COVID-19 regulations will be followed. Topics include Fish & Aquatics, Trees & Fall Colours and Nature Journaling. Pre-registration is also open for the LRCA's Fall Mushroom Hikes, Fall Photography Workshop, and Fall Waterfowl Viewing Day. Visit store.lakeheadca.com to pre-register. Remember, spots are filling up fast so act quickly!

We are in the height of busy season at our Conservation Areas, and we would like to remind all visitors of the \$5.00 per vehicle fee. Better yet, purchase an Explore Card Parking Pass for \$40.00 +HST and forgo the parking fee altogether! If you visit Conservation Areas more than eight times in a season, the pass pays for itself. Explore Cards (as well as online payment of parking fees) can be purchased at store.lakeheadca.com.

SLATE RIVER WOMEN'S INSTITUTE MONTHLY RECIPES

This is the month for berries: strawberries, saskatoons, blueberries and raspberries..All are very high in vitamin C and antioxidants. Here is one of my favourite recipes that isn't all that well known - great for a simple but delicious salad dressing or to use as a base for a refreshing beverage.

RASPBERRY VINEGAR

10 cups of raspberries 2 cups of cider vinegar

White sugar

Put the berries into a large glass or ceramic bowl.Do not use metal.. Mash the berries using a wooden spoon.Cover the berries with the cider vinegar. Mix together.Let stand for 24 hours.Stir often.Then strain through two layers of cheesecloth.Measure the juice. Add an equal volume of sugar. Bring to a boil and then simmer for 20 minutes. Pour into hot sterile jars and seal.This makes two cups.

To use as a salad dressing combine a couple of tablespoons with your favourite oil and just mix and use. It really is delicious.

To use as the base to a beverage put an ounce or two of the raspberry vinegar into a glass, add cold water or sofa and ice. This is a really refreshing drink. Submitted by Dodie LeGassick.

MARY'S CHUNKY PICKLES

6 quarts of cucumbers cut into chunks

1 quart of onions cut into chunks

1/2 cup of pickling salt

Red sweet peppers

Pour boiling water over the above.

Let stand three hours then drain.

In the meantime:

Boil together

1 quart of vinegar

6 cups of white sugar,

1 teaspoon of mustard seed,

1 teaspoon of celery seed

1 teaspoon of turmeric

Add the drained cucumber, onions and pepper mix.

Bring to a boil.

Bottle and seal.

Scant cup of brown sugar - not packed.


1 tsp.Vanilla

Notice of a Public Meeting being held to consider an Application for a proposed Severance

Please take notice that the Council for The Corporation of the Municipality of Neebing (sitting as Committee of the Whole) will hold a Public Meeting on Wednesday, August 11, 2021 at 5:00 p.m., at the Neebing Municipal office to consider an application to sever one land parcel into two under Section 53 of the Planning Act, R.S.O. 1990, c. P.13, as amended. The Committee's recommendations to Council will be considered for ratification at the Regular Council Meeting on the same evening, commencing at 6:00 p.m.

The Application (B03-2021) is brought by Rudy Stajkowski, the property owner. This application is a re-submission of Application B03-2019 that was approved on September 4, 2019 but the timelines to complete the conditions have lapsed. The land parcel which is the subject matter of the application has municipal address 1697 Pardee Road. The legal description of the land is: Part of the Southeast Quarter Section of Lot 8, Concession 3, excluding Parts 1 through 4, inclusive, on Reference Plan of Survey 55R-13526, within geographic Pardee Township, Municipality of Neebing, in the District of Thunder Bay.

The proposed severance would result in one new lot, and the retained lot. A sketch showing the lot configuration is included in the application, available either on Neebing's website (www.neebing.org/notices) or by contacting the Municipal Office. The retained lot will have frontage of approximately 500 meters on Pardee Road at the south, and approximately 592 meters on Pardee Road at the east, and the severed lot will have frontage of approximately 212 meters on Pardee Road. The severed lot will contain the existing dwelling on the property, and the retained lot will be vacant, apart from a barn. The severed lot will be rectangular in shape, with a depth (from Pardee Road) of approximately 94 meters, and an area of approximately 2 hectares (5 acres), The retained lot will be irregular in shape, with varying depths, and an area of approximately 58 hectares (143 acres) in area. All measurements are "approximate", and will be finalized when the required survey has been completed.

ANY PERSON may attend the Public Meeting and/or make written or verbal presentations either in support of, or in opposition to, the proposed severance.

How to provide input: Although in-person meetings have been cancelled, there are several ways in which the general public can provide input on the application, such as:

Be 'Bear Wise' and Prevent Bear Encounters

Prevent and report encounters with black bears and learn who to contact. Not every bear sighting is an emergency situation.

Here is who to call if you encounter a bear.

>Emergency situations

Call 911 or your local police if a bear poses an immediate threat to personal safety and exhibits threatening or aggressive behaviour, such as:

- enters a school yard when school is in session
- stalks people and lingers at the site
- enters or tries to enter a residence
- wanders into a public gathering
- kills livestock/pets and lingers at the site

Police will respond first to an emergency situation, but may request assistance from the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry during daylight hours.

>Non-emergency encounters

Call the toll-free Bear Wise reporting line at 1-866-514-2327 (TTY 705-945-7641) if a bear:

- roams around or checks garbage cans
- breaks into a shed where garbage or food is stored
- pulls down a bird feeder or knocks over a barbecue
- moves through a backyard or field but does not linger

This line operates 24 hours a day, seven days a week, from April 1 to November 30.

IF YOU ENCOUNTER A BLACK BEAR

When bears are caught off guard, they are stressed, and usually just want to flee. >Stop. Do not panic. Remain calm.

Generally, the noisier the bear is, the less dangerous it is, provided you do not approach. The noise is meant to "scare" you off and acts as a warning signal. DO

- Slowly back away while keeping the bear in sight and wait for it to leave.
- If the bear does not leave, throw objects, wave your arms and make noise with a whistle or air horn.
- Prepare to use bear spray.
- If you are near a building or vehicle get inside as a precaution.
- Drop any food you may be carrying and slowly move away.
- If a bear is in a tree, leave it alone. Leave the area. The bear will come down when it feels safe.

DO NOT

- Run, climb a tree or swim.
- Kneel down.
- Make direct eye contact.
- Approach the bear to get a better look.
- Attempt to feed a bear.

BEAR WARNING SIGNS

Black bear attacks are extremely rare. A threatened or predatory black bear will give off warning signs to let you know you are too close. A black bear standing on its hind legs is not a sign of aggressive behaviour. The bear is trying to get a better look at you or catch your scent.

>A defensive bear

A bear that feels threatened will:

- salivate excessively and exhale loudly
- make huffing, moaning, clacking and popping sounds with its mouth, teeth and jaws
- lower its head with its ears drawn back while facing you
- charge forward, and/or swat the ground with its paws (known as a 'bluff' charge)

>A predatory bear

The bear will approach silently, usually in rural or remote areas, and may continue to approach regardless of your attempts to deter them by yelling or throwing rocks. If the bear attacks:

- use bear spray
- fight back with everything you have
- do not play dead unless you are sure a mother bear is attacking in defense of her cubs

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
