

Fire Ban in Neebing Lifted

Neebing has been in a severe moisture deficit situation much of the summer and all of August and when the provincial Restricted Fire Zone declaration for the Thunder Bay District was lifted on Thursday August 26th, the local conditions meant that the municipal fire ban was left in place. Light rain and drizzle which started on Friday have provided initial improvement in surface moisture conditions and humidity levels and the forecast for additional rain and cooler temperatures tonight and over the coming week is rapidly improving the local fire situation.

Based on the improved conditions and favourable forecast for the next week, the municipal fire ban in Neebing was lifted at 6:46 pm Saturday August 28, 2021. The online fire permitting system was activated that afternoon for new permits, and existing permit holders should have received an automatic email advising that their existing seasonal permits are once again valid. While surface conditions are generally dampened across the community, all residents are reminded that the community remains in a moisture deficit condition and it may be necessary to return to fire ban conditions quickly if weather conditions change and fire hazard ratings increase.

- (c) Are you comfortable with a 7-member Council when most other rural municipalities opt for 5-member Councils?



Since the August edition, there has been one regular Council meetings on August 11. A Special Council meeting was also held on August 11. At the Special Council meeting on August 11, Council sitting as Committee of the Whole heard an application for a proposed new lot on Pardee Road and a minor variance application for a reduced side yard for a property on Griffis Road. Recommendations from the Committee were ratified by Council at the regular meeting held later the same evening.

At the regular Council meeting on August 11, the following matters were considered:

- Council heard a deputation regarding a pilot program to reduce household food waste.
- Council authorized Administration to move forward with the sale of surplus assets.
- Council authorized the use of the municipal office parking lot for a local vendor market.
- Council adopted an updated Emergency Response Plan.
- Council supported resolutions

from other municipalities relating to drought or other disasters experienced in other Northwestern Ontario municipalities.



Overdue Property Tax

During the past 10 months of the pandemic, the Council of the Municipality of Neebing did not apply penalties on overdue property taxes. This reprieve from penalties provided all residents with flexibility when it came to making payments. In 2020 tax sales were also postponed for properties that had an overdue tax balance of more that two years. Beginning at the end of

October, a monthly penalty charge of 1.5% on overdue tax accounts will be reinstated. Owners of properties that are eligible for tax sale will receive a letter from the Municipality informing them of that fact, so they can make arrangements to pay overdue amounts and avoid the tax sale process. Laura Jones coordinates tax billing and collection at the Municipal office,

and people can contact her if they are interested in a property tax payment plan.



The Rural Pharmacist:

Moderna AND Pfizer Vaccines Now **Available at Evergreen Pharmacies!**

A few updates regarding COVID vaccinations in Ontario and how that relates to you and our pharmacy services. Our pharmacies were originally only assigned Moderna vaccines from the Ministry, but ordering the Pfizer vaccine is now available to us so starting September we will now have Moderna vaccine days and Pfizer vaccine days at each of our locations. Although mixing and matching the interchangeable mRNA vaccines (Pfizer and Moderna) has proven to be safe and effective for adults, getting the Pfizer vaccine is important so that we can provide COVID vaccine services to children ages 12-18 (Moderna vaccine has only been approved for ages 18+). Further to children and COVID vaccines, in August the Ontario government announced that any child turning 12 in 2021 is eligible to get the vaccines; basically, anyone born anytime in 2009 or earlier is eligible to receive their Pfizer COVID vaccine.

We've been starting to get questions about booster doses/third doses for the COVID vaccine as well. At the time of writing, there is only a limited population that is eligible for booster doses of the COVID vaccine in Ontario, which falls in line with recommendations from the CDC. (Contrary to the announcement in the US recently where all American adults that received two doses of the COVID vaccine are eligible to get their third dose 8 months after the second dose. The controversy over this strategy is for another day!) In Ontario, eligible populations for third doses include: transplant recipients, patients with hematological (blood) cancers and on chemotherapy or patient with certain treatment regimens (Anti-CD20 medications) and residents of higher risk congregate settings (long-term care homes, higher risk licensed retirement homes and First Nations elders' lodges). Transplant recipients, patients with hematological cancer and receiving the abovementioned treatments are eligible to receive their 3rd dose 8 weeks after their 2nd dose. Residents living in higher risk settings are eligible to receive their 3rd dose 5 months after receiving their 2nd dose.

At the time of writing, our Ontario Pharmacist Association is awaiting further direction from the Ministry of Health on the process for administering 3rd doses in pharmacies (ie. Will there be a requirement of a letter from the patient's primary care provider or specialist to confirm whether they meet the criteria?) We will be sure to update via our email newsletter (you can sign up on our website at www.evergreenrx.ca), our Facebook page or in store as we get updated!

Still haven't got your COVID vaccine? Hesitant about it effectiveness or safety? Being hesitant or anxious about something like this is okay! What's important is that you are making a decision based on GOOD information to overcome your hesitancy. At this point in the vaccine journey, we not only have great studies pointing towards their effectiveness and safety, but now we have real world experience in giving them to hundreds of millions of people over the last 9 months to affirm their safety. Everything in medicine has risks and whether it be a vaccine or a new blood pressure pill, we are always weighing the benefits vs the risk. COVID is real and serious, and the risks of the virus will always trump the risk of the vaccine. The vast majority of COVID hospitalizations today are persons who are unvaccinated, and a smaller portion of hospitalizations are those who are partially vaccinated (1 dose). Yes, you can still get COVID if you are double vaccinated, but it is extremely unlikely for it to result in severe infection/hospitalization; the vaccine gave your body the instructions on how to fight the virus as it entered your body so it doesn't progress to serious symptoms, as opposed to an unvaccinated person where an infecting virus has a chance to further infiltrate the body's defense mechanisms before the immune system can come up with a strategy to fight the infecting virus. Unvaccinated persons are also at high risk for COVID long haul symptoms, which can have a significant impact on your day-to-day life.

Do you have kids going back to school in the eligible age ranges for vaccinations? I understand it can be difficult to decide for your child to get a vaccine that is new, with all the information out there. It is not true that COVID can't result in serious illness for a child. The best thing you can do for your child is vaccinate them as soon as you are able to in order to maximize protection. In teens, it seems that the COVID vaccine carries

a very small risk of myocarditis (heart muscle inflammation), to the tune of 50 cases per million doses given for boys and 12 cases per million doses given in girls. These symptoms are typically mild and resolve in 1-2 weeks. Teens who are infected with COVID get myocarditis at a much higher incidence (500-3000 cases per million infections). Again, COVID infection risks outweighs the risk of the vaccine and it's not even

Adios to August

And Salude to September!

I am not certain that our summer of 2021 was a temperature record breaker for Neebing, but it did provide us with many of the most continuous hot summer days that I can recall in recent times. Some moans and groans have recently been heard from residents who are looking forward to a return to more moderate temperatures with some fickle weather folks even daring to mention the "W" word.

Looking ahead at the forecast, it would appear that we will begin to see some temperature changes and a downward cooling trend as we move into September. Hopefully, we will receive sufficient rainfall to allow for the lifting of our **current fire ban**, which remains in place as I write. I cannot recall the last time we spent the majority of the summer under an enforced fire ban, and experienced so many days with High and Extreme fire hazard conditions. While hopefully the need is passed, in this issue of Neebing News you will find a copy of an MNR Fact Sheet outlining what can and cannot be done when a RFZ or fire ban has been declared.

We send a note of appreciation to our Neebing residents, who have been very careful with handling fire since the fire ban was put in place on July 10, 2021, and who have kept a sharp eye out for (and reported) any signs of smoke. With the use of a drone, one resident was able to locate a lightning strike fire located some 1500' off the roadway, and to guide fire fighters into the area to begin suppression activity. To date, NES has responded to four (4) fires in the community during the fire ban period. Two (2) of those fires

were the result of lightning strikes, and two (2) were generated by resident activities. All incidents were caught early, and were extinguished before they became problematic. It is important to note that early detection and extinguishment of wildfires at the source is critical to avoiding fire spread.

We also extend a sincere Thank You to our partners at the MNR, who assisted with both air and ground crew support in extinguishing both of Neebing's naturally-caused When they come to help, the MNR crews remain with the fire 24/7, until it is

We have had an interesting summer with regard to our fire scene activity, and unless we get significant soaking rains in the coming weeks, we may have an interesting fall fire season ahead of us as well. It has been noted that Neebing once experienced a season when conditions remained dry well into the Fall, and we were responding to grass fires even after the regular fire season had ended on October 31st. We are hopeful that such will not be the case this year, as we would all appreciate some time to do our routine Fall property clean-up without having to deal with fire outbreaks.

Once again, September is the month to begin thinking about getting your home and yard ready for the inevitable winter season ahead. It's time to check your CO and Smoke Alarms to ensure that they

are working properly. Remember to note the replacement date on your alarm units – units older than 10 years past their manufacture date must be replaced, even if they still appear to work when tested. Batteries, unless they are full life cycle batteries, must be tested and replaced on a regular basis as well. September is a good month to begin necessary tree trimming and to enact Fire Smart plans intended to enhance the outdoor resiliency of your property to discourage external fire threats. For those unfamiliar with FireSmart, or who are looking for advice with regard to what improvements they may make on their property to improve their wildfire resiliency, the following Homeowners Manual; FS Generic-HomeOwnersManual Booklet-November 2018-WEB.indd (firesmartcanada.ca) is a great reference to provide an understanding of how fire spreads, and to suggest actions that can be taken to reduce your properties' vulnerability to external fires.

With the anticipated return to classroom schooling this month for all levels of education, we will be in a position to experience the most significant indoor group activity that has taken place over the past 19 months. It will be nice to see activity patterns beginning to reflect those seen in our pre-Covid era. However, we are reminded that COVID 19 has not 'gone away'. Recent reports indicate that case numbers of the virus are rising due to other new viral

variant(s). Ongoing reminders from health experts caution us that the COVID virus remains present and active in various forms, and care must be taken to minimize its threat to yourself, your family and the community at large. Hopefully, by next month we will have some experienced some much-needed rain, seen the end of the 2021 fire ban, and enjoyed a smooth, drama-free start to the school year. Stay Safe, Stay Well

What You Should Know **About Restricted Fire** Zones



It's important! And it's the law!

A Restricted Fire Zone is a specific geographic area where the use of open fires, like

campfires or debris burning, is restricted.

It is a temporary measure put in place by the Minister of Natural Resources and Forestry when the fire danger is extreme to prevent human caused fires. A Restricted Fire Zone order may last from a few days to weeks depending on conditions. The restrictions are lifted as soon as conditions allow.

When a Restricted Fire Zone is declared, it is illegal to set a fire within the affected area. Failure to comply could result in a fine of up to \$25,000 and three months in jail, as well as the financial responsibility for any costs incurred in fighting a forest fire caused by the illegal act.

You can still go camping, hiking, fishing, and have fun outdoors, but if you need heat for cooking and warmth, you'll have to use a portable gas or propane stove.

Portable charcoal equipment (e.g., BBQs, Hibachis, etc.) are illegal for use during a Restricted Fire Zone except close to a dwelling that you legally own or occupy or in an organized campground.

Commercial campground operators may allow their guests to continue enjoying campfires during a Restricted Fire Zone period provided certain conditions are met.

How will I know if I'm in a Restricted Fire Zone?

The Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry posts highly visible green and red Restricted Fire Zone signs along roadways. Restricted Fire Zone posters are posted at popular camping spots, and in sport lodges, gas stations, and stores.

Advisories are issued to radio, television, print media and the internet, indicating the specific areas affected using the Zone numbers on the Restricted Fire Zone map.

For areas below the -- line on the map call your local Municipal Fire Department.

Yes, that incredible number of pop and non-alcoholic beer cans, weighing ~340 pounds(!), was diverted from our landfills by Neebing residents who placed them into NFRA collection bins instead!! \$119 was also raised for Neebing Emergency Services from those donations. Well Done!

Amazingly, through NFRA's recycling and can collection efforts \$1676.20 was raised between the end of June and the end of July. In large part thanks to your donations of returnable beer cans and bottles.

From there our intrepid member Kris loads the filled bags into his truck and brings them to his farm. NFRA volunteers meet there 1 to 2 times per month to count and sort through the collection, dividing by type. This is where your thoughtful pre-sorting helps tremendously! When returnable beer cans and bottles arrive already separated from non-alcoholic beer and pop cans, NFRA's work is cut in half. Thank you to you who make that extra effort!

Kris then makes the many trips to town need to deliver the metals for recycling and to cash in the returnables, turning the monies received





The LRCA declared a Level I Low Water Condition on July 29, 2021, based on observed flow conditions in area streams. During a Level I Low Water Condition, water users are asked to voluntarily reduce water consumption by 10%. In July area gauges recorded an average of 20 millimetres of precipitation, 26% of the monthly average; area streams averaged 15% of their mean monthly discharge. The Lake Superior beginning of July level was 9 centimetres above the beginning of July monthly average, however 15 centimetres below the July level last year.

SLATE RIVER WOMEN'S INSTITUTE MONTHLY RECIPES

The apple season has already begun, if you are like me, and have Norlands and Hyers apples.

As children we always heard that "an apple a day keeps the doctor away". There's a lot of truth in that adage. For example, a medium sized apple is just 92 calories and can hold about 3 grams of soluble fibre, and a good dose of vitamin C, K and potassium amongst other benefits. So, enjoy eating them right off your trees; share the bounty with your friends and the wildlife. In the middle of winter retrieve those memories by pulling out a container of frozen apple pie filling for a crisp or a pie. Here's Marie Hamilton's longtime recipe.

Frozen Apple Pie Filling

6 quarts cut up apples

1 1/4 cups of water

2 cups or less of sugar depending on the sweetness of the apple 1/3 cup of minute tapioca

3 tablespoons or less of cinnamon

Place the ingredients into a large pot and bring to a boil stirring constantly for five minutes until apples fall loosely. Pour into containers ,let cool and then freeze. Makes one gallon. Enjoy!

For those of you who have been drying your tomatoes, here's a yummy recipe that tells you how to use those dried tomatoes as a gift or just on a nice slice of crusty bread.

Dried Tomałoes in Olive Oil

In a medium pot place a few jars worth of dried tomatoes. Cover with water and boil for five minutes to rehydrate them. Empty the water, put the tomatoes on paper towelling or a towel and pat dry. Into each sterilized jar place the rehydrated tomatoes in vertical layers along with cut cloves of garlic, a few small sprigs of dried oregano and one bay leaf ending with some of the herbs on the top. Fill with olive oil. Remove any air. In a few days, check to see if it needs more oil. Keep in the fridge and wait three weeks for the flavours to develop. Get a nice piece of fresh crusty bread and place a piece of tomato on top. Delicious!

Be 'Bear Wise' and Prevent Bear Encounters

Prevent and report encounters with black bears and learn who to contact. Not every bear sighting is an emergency situation.

Here is who to call if you encounter a bear.

>Emergency situations

Call 911 or your local police if a bear poses an immediate threat to personal safety and exhibits threatening or aggressive behaviour, such as:

- enters a school yard when school is in session
- stalks people and lingers at the site
- enters or tries to enter a residence
- wanders into a public gathering
- kills livestock/pets and lingers at the site

Police will respond first to an emergency situation, but may request assistance from the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry during daylight hours.

>Non-emergency encounters

Call the toll-free Bear Wise reporting line at 1-866-514-2327 (TTY 705-945-7641) if a bear:

- roams around or checks garbage cans
- breaks into a shed where garbage or food is stored
- pulls down a bird feeder or knocks over a barbecue
- moves through a backyard or field but does not linger

This line operates 24 hours a day, seven days a week, from April 1 to No-

IF YOU ENCOUNTER A BLACK BEAR

When bears are caught off guard, they are stressed, and usually just want to flee. >Stop. Do not panic. Remain calm.

Generally, the noisier the bear is, the less dangerous it is, provided you do not approach. The noise is meant to "scare" you off and acts as a warning signal.

DO

- Slowly back away while keeping the bear in sight and wait for it to
- If the bear does not leave, throw objects, wave your arms and make noise with a whistle or air horn.
- Prepare to use bear spray.
- If you are near a building or vehicle get inside as a precaution.
- Drop any food you may be carrying and slowly move away.
- If a bear is in a tree, leave it alone. Leave the area. The bear will come down when it feels safe.

DO NOT

- Run, climb a tree or swim.
- Kneel down.
- Make direct eye contact.
- Approach the bear to get a better look.
- Attempt to feed a bear.

BEAR WARNING SIGNS

Black bear attacks are extremely rare. A threatened or predatory black bear will give off warning signs to let you know you are too close. A black bear standing on its hind legs is not a sign of aggressive behaviour. The bear is trying to get a better look at you or catch your scent.

>A defensive bear

A bear that feels threatened will:

- salivate excessively and exhale loudly
- make huffing, moaning, clacking and popping sounds with its mouth,
- lower its head with its ears drawn back while facing you
- charge forward, and/or swat the ground with its paws (known as a 'bluff' charge)

>A predatory bear

The bear will approach silently, usually in rural or remote areas, and may continue to approach regardless of your attempts to deter them by yelling or throwing rocks. If the bear attacks:

- use bear spray
- fight back with everything you have
- do not play dead unless you are sure a mother bear is attacking in defense of her cubs




