Help us <u>not</u> be last - Get your Vax!

According to the Thunder Bay District Health Unit Neebing residents are falling behind in regional vaccination trends. The CLE Clinic is open for walk-ins 5 days a week, and a rural Vaccination Clinic is being planned.

CLE COVID VACCINATION CLINICS

WALK-IN APPOINTMENTS: Anyone born in 2009 or earlier is eligible to receive a first or second dose of COVID-19 vaccine.

Walk-in appointments at the CLE Clinic are available during the following hours:

Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Tuesdays and Thursdays from 11:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m.

NOT GETTING YOURS?

Coronaviruses have been around a long time. The common cold is one form of coronavirus. The SARS (severe acute respiratory syndrome) coronavirus outbreak in 2003 and MERS (Middle East respiratory syndrome) epidemic in 2012 accelerated the development of the SAR-COVID-2 vaccines that have been approved by governments around the world.

THERE ARE TWO VALID EXEMPTIONS FOR REMAINING UNVACCINATED

- serious adverse events following the administration of the first COVID-19 immunization
- those with certain medical conditions that may affect their response to immunization

According to the Province, people who have the above exemptions may still be able to be vaccinated under controlled conditions with expert consultation. More information on medical exemptions is available from the Thunder Bay District Health Unit (TBDHU) or the Ministry of Health

TBDHU - Ask a Nurse

The Thunder Bay District Health Unit has nurses available to answer questions related to COVID-19 vaccines.

Contact Ask a Nurse if you:

- have questions about the safety or effectiveness of the COVID-19 vaccines and can't find credible information elsewhere.
- are an international student or someone who has been immunized in another province/country and have questions about recording vaccines in Ontario or if you qualify as fully vacci-
- have unique circumstances and would like to discuss options for accommodating your vaccine appointment.

Notice of a Meeting being held to Adopt Neebing's Official Plan (Subject to Provincial Approval)

Please take notice that the Council of The Corporation of the Municipality of Neebing, will be meeting on Wednesday, November 17, 2021 at 6:00 pm, via web conference, to adopt the final wording and map schedules to Neebing's proposed new Official Plan under Section 26 of the Planning Act, R.S.O. 1990, c. P.13, as amended.

A review process was commenced in May of 2013 and finalized late in 2017. Council adopted (subject to Provincial approval) a revised Official Plan in late 2017. The Provincial review in 2017-2018 resulted in recommendations for significant wording changes to the plan adopted by Council. Because of the municipal election held in October of 2018, consideration of the Provincial comments was delayed. The review by the new Council concluded in 2019, and a revised Official Plan was submitted to the Province for consideration in early 2020. Many of the Provincial wording changes suggested in 2019 were considered appropriate by Neebing Council, and incorporated in the revised Official Plan. Some suggestions were not incorporated. Further, Council also considered other changes, including adding language to enable the adoption of some property standards, and the removal of a parcel of land from the "Agricultural" designation and inclusion of that parcel of land in the "Rural" designation.

The COVID-19 pandemic, which originated in mid-March, 2020, further delayed matters.

A further public meeting was held on March 24, 2021, to update the public on the proposed new Official Plan.

Wording changes were formally adopted by Council on April 7, 2021. Mapping was not available at the time, however, verbal descriptions of mapping changes were provided at the public meeting.

Apart from some technical amendments (i.e. changes to the titles of provincial ministries) no wording changes are being considered by Council on November 17th, from those previously approved April 7th.

The purpose of the public meeting is to consider the final wording for Neebing's proposed Official Plan, as well as the map schedules to the plan.

The Rural Pharmacist:

It's Still Vaccine Season, and the Flu Shot is the Familiar Character

Don't roll that sleeve back down yet.. Show me that shoulder. It's a new season with a new (but familiar) character. The flu shot is back, and it's as important as it's ever been.

Many have received their COVID vaccines in the last few months, and more people are still coming to get vaccinated, which is great to see! With the pandemic, there has been an increased awareness about the positive impact vaccines can have on an individual's health, along with the health of those close to them. We saw this firsthand at our pharmacy last year, with a significant increased uptake on our flu shot offerings.

National polls leading up to this flu season support these concepts. 58% of Canadians who responded to the poll said they intend to get the flu shot, and 53% of those who intend to get it said they are likely to get it a pharmacy. 34% of respondents mention that the pandemic is more likely to increase the likelihood of them getting the flu shot rather than reduce the likelihood of getting the flu shot.

It's also worth noting that the flu (influenza) and COVID-19 are different viruses and that the vaccine for one will not protect you from the other virus. The symptoms of infection from both viruses can present similarly in early stages (fever, shortness of breath, sore throat, cough). We are still in the pandemic and public health is recognizing these symptoms as a potential case of COVID-19. The flu shot is important in preventing the flu and reducing your chances of undergoing unnecessary COVID-19 testing/isolation and missed time from work/school. And, of course, if you're young and healthy then getting your flu shot is still important to protect your family (grandparents/children) from getting the flu, even if you're at low risk for having serious complications from the flu.

We have three different flu vaccines available, but it is important to remember

to get the vaccine available to you that day. Vaccine shopping delays your immunization and increases yours and your family's risk of contracting the flu virus. ALL FLU VACCINES are safe and effective in protecting against the flu virus. The flu vaccines available this year are high dose senior 65+ dose vaccine and two different standard doses. Don't forget... the kids! This year Ontario pharmacists are eligible to administer flu shots to children ages 2+!

Another important thing to note, NACI has updated their recommendations and now allow two vaccines, particularly the COVID vaccine, to be administered in one day. So if you need multiple vaccines then don't wait! Make one appointment to get them in the same day. (There is one type of adjuvanted flu vaccine that needs to be separated by 1 or 2 weeks from the shingles vaccine, so let our pharmacist know if you've gotten you shingles vaccine recently!)

For the initial wave of flu vaccines, we are going to be operating by appointment only. Book your vaccine with us by visiting our website www.evergreenrx.ca. You can find the links to book at either Kakabeka or Rosslyn on our home page. Once we move through the first wave of flu shots and things slow down then we will move to a hybrid appointment and walk-in model.

Please remember.. this is a really busy time for us in our pharmacies! If you can, please try to call in your prescription refills at least one day in advance. Wait times can be longer at the beginning of flu season and we appreciate your patience and cooperation! We appreciate you δ

PS: Have you seen the action next door on the construction of our new location in Kakabeka?! We get to watch (and hear!) the action all day long.. and it's music to our ears!

What's Been Happening at Council Meetings?

Since the October edition, there has been two regular Council meetings on October 6 and 20. There have also been three Special Council meetings on September 22, September 29 and October 6.

At the Special Council meeting on September 22, Council sitting as Committee of the Whole reviewed information on property line issues related to a tennis court on Memory Road. No decisions were made. Administration was directed to obtain a survey of the municipal land around the tennis court.

At the Special Council meeting on September 29, Council heard comments from members of the public related to possible changes to election wards and the size of Council. No decisions were made.

At the Special Council meeting on October 6, Council sitting as Committee of the Whole heard an application for a re-zoning to allow a second dwelling on a property. Recommendations from the Committee were ratified by Council at the regular meeting held later the same evening.

At the regular Council meeting on October 6, the following matters were considered:

- Council reviewed changes to the Roads Maintenance Policy
- Council directed Administration to bring forward a by-law to make changes to the reserve funds.
- Council authorized Administration to issue a requests for proposals for engineering services.
- Council authorized a trial for a new Building Permit Module.
- Council approved the installation of a new porta potty at the Little Pigeon Bay Boat Launch in the spring.

• Council directed Administration to circulate a follow-up survey relating to Council Composition

- At the regular Council meeting on October 20, the following matters were considered:
- Council reviewed the information from the Highway 61 Preliminary Design Public Information Centre.
- Council proposed changes to the Crown Forest Sustainability Act, Professional Foresters Act and Public Lands Act.
- Council approved a correction to the name of Willowdale Road in the Roads Maintenance Policy in order to match the Road Names By-law.
- Council discussed attendance at the 2022 Rural Ontario Municipal Association and Ontario Good Roads Association Conferences.

The minutes of each meeting are approved at the following meeting, and are posted on the website once they have been approved and signed. If you don't have internet capabilities, you can always contact the office for copies of approved minutes. Meeting agendas are always posted online on the Friday prior to the Wednesday meeting. 





Neebing Emergency Services

November – Getting Ready for Winter Months is Here!

As I write, the first day of 'Fall weather' has arrived at last, and the air is cold and damp. However, in this unusual year, we were still harvesting ripe tomatoes from the garden until mid October! We have enjoyed a spectacular Fall as the trees changed colour, with frequent clear skies and warm temperatures. We were even fortunate in receiving and some welcome (but not enough) rain to help green up the grass and get the ground ready for winter.

November 1, 2021 is an important day to Neebing residents for a number of reasons:

- Fire Season 2021 comes to an End: Residents no longer require a municipal fire permit(s) to have a campfire or to burn some brush. Although the requirement for a valid fire permit is lifted until April 1, 2022, residents are reminded that they should still follow safe fire practises when engaging in any type of burning.
- Clock Time Change: Ontario switches from Daylight Savings Time (DST) to Eastern Standard Time (EST). Residents are reminded to turn their clocks back 1 hour and, if necessary, adjust their activity schedules to meet the changes in sunrise and sunset times.
- "Carbon Monoxide (CO) Awareness Week" (November 1-7): All residents are reminded that CO is a deadly gas, both odourless and invisible, and is a common by-product of fuel combustion. Its presence in your home can only be detected by a <u>working CO alarm</u>. If your home has a fuel-burning appliance, a fireplace or an attached garage, you must have a working CO alarm adjacent to each sleeping area of the home. Additionally, you should have all your fuel-burning appliance(s) inspected annually.

November in Neebing is all about getting things ready for winter; ensuring that everything outside is put away, so that it doesn't get covered by the first serious snowfall and then 'disappear' for 4 months, getting your firewood split and piled, servicing your furnace, checking smoke and CO alarms, and cleaning your woodstove and chimney to make them ready for the coming 'heating season'. It is also time to switch to winter tires on your vehicle(s), and plan that your winter socks, boots, hats and jackets are all 'ready to wear' and placed in handy locations.

I would like to move on now to a "Neebing Good News (but still fire related) Story"! As you can see in the picture below, the weather on Wednesday, Sep-


tember 29th, this year gave no hint of the pending seasonal change soon to head our way. Instead, it provided an excellent backdrop for a small ceremony held at Blake Hall to officially welcome our new NES fire pumper - P108 - into full service in Neebing. While it had been hoped that the official welcoming could take place earlier in the fall at a larger community event, COVID realities necessitated a much scaled-down celebration. However, it is hoped that we are able to hold a more extensive community gathering – one that would allow for a formal introduction to, and demonstration of the new pumper - once COVID restrictions are safely relaxed.

The new fire truck was 'revealed' to attending guests at Blake Hall, where the new P108 was welcomed to our NES fleet by traveling a short way under two fire-stream water arches delivered by two 'long service' Neebing fire pumpers. Following this 'ceremony', our new fire Pumper 108 demonstrated some of the many interesting features it has available on-board to assist with the provision of superior fire-suppression services in Neebing. The truck possesses a retractable remote-controlled turret gun on the top of the truck that can deliver a serious stream of 'fire-stopping' water to a fire incident several hundred feet away, as well as automatic tire chains, which can be deployed to assist in making timely responses to fires even when snow and ice conditions are present. The presence of extensive LED lighting on the truck is available to provide bright light - even on the darkest night - to allow for scene safety and accurate operating conditions.

Welcoming P108 to Neebing was only possible due to the many efforts and contributions made by all those who, in so many varied ways, helped to bring our dream of this new pumper to fruition. To the many who worked on; the details of truck design, the tendering and budgeting, the innovative fundraising efforts of the Neebing Fire and Rescue Association (NFRA) members and to the broader community and extended non-resident "friends" of Neebing, NES sends a huge and sincere Thank You! It was the individual actions taken by the many that brought NES to this day, and to all we are truly grateful.

WOMEN'S INSTITUTE RECIPES



Brrr! The leaves are off the trees and the cold weather is settling in. Soon there will be snow and our thoughts will be of Christmas and preparing foods for Christmas. November is a good time to get a step ahead with baking and foods to freeze for the holiday season. This month we are highlighting Mary Germaine's perogy recipe and from another longtime but now past member we have a favourite cookie recipe from Kay Greer. Both recipes freeze beautifully and will make a lot of people happy.

MARY'S PEROGIES

The secret to Mary's dough is the addition of potato flakes which makes the dough easier to roll out.

DOUGH:

5 cups flour

1/2 cup instant potato flakes

1 teaspoon salt

Mix the above ingredients together

ADD:

1/2 cup oil

2 cups of boiling water

Knead the dough then let it stand for 10 minutes

FILLING:

Boil a Dutch oven sized pot of potatoes using 1 teaspoon of salt in the water. Once the potatoes are cooked, drain, then mash well. Grate 1 pound of old cheddar cheese and mix into the potatoes. Make 1 tbsp size balls. May refrigerate these overnight.

To make the perogies, roll out the dough. Cut 3 inch circles using a cookie cutter or empty can. Place a ball of dough onto each circle. Fold over to create a semi circle and crimp the edges together.

To cook the perogies, boil 6 at a time until the perogies rise. Once cooked, drain and either serve with fried onions or bacon and a dollop of sour cream. You can also fry the perogies and serve them in the same way. Perogies may be frozen for later use. This is a favourite recipe amongst the Slate River WI Women.

KAY GREER'S SCOTCH SHORTBREAD

This was Kay Greer's favourite Christmas cookie, which she gave to many as their Christmas gift. She told me that it was important to knead the butter and sugar into the flours together by hand. Each handmade cookie was crafted with love. These cookies literally melt in your mouth.

- 1 lb. butter at room temperature
- 1 cup of fruit sugar
- 4 cups of flour
- 1 tablespoon of potato starch or cornstarch flour

Knead the butter and sugar together by hand. Add the flour gradually kneading until the mixture is a soft ball. Make small cakes 1/2 to 1/3 inch thick. Prick the top of each with a fork and bake until cooked but not too brown. Oven temperature 350 degrees F.

ROSSLYN W.I. ONE BOWL APPLE CAKE

2 eaas

1 3/4 cups sugar

2 heaping teaspoons cinnamon (yes you need this)

1/2 cup oil

6 medium apples

2 cups flour

2 teaspoons baking sod's

Preheat own to 350'.

In large bowl, mix eggs, sugar, cinnamon and oil.

Peel and slice apples and add to liquid mixture (coating apples as you stir so apples don't turn brown).

Mix together flour and baking soda and add to apple mixture. Hand mix with a fork till all the flour is absorbed by wet ingredients

Pour mixture into greased 9x13" pan or two greased 9" round pans. Bake for 55 minutes until golden brown and cake springs back. Cool and cut into pieces or serve slightly warm with whipping cream or ice cream.

This is a lovely dessert that cuts into 15 pieces. Freezes well. Sent in by Sandy Vibert

Authority to close roads is found in Section 34 of the Municipal Act, 2001.

Autumn Fire Safety



Outside the Home

 Never park your car or truck over a pile of leaves. The heat from the vehicle's catalytic converter or exhaust system can ignite the leaves below.



The resulting fire could destroy your vehicle.

· Flammable liquids should not be stored in inside the home or in an attached garage or shed. This includes any unused fuel still in the fuel tank. Store this equipment away from your home or drain excess fuel out of the tank before storing. This simple safety precaution will help prevent accidental fires from escaping fuel vapors.

•Remove fuel from lawn mowers before storing them for winter.

· Contact your utility company if trees or branches are not clear of power lines Prune back trees, and rake up leaves and debris. If you live in an open area with a lot of natural vegetation, consider creating a defensible fire zone around your home. • Prune the bottom branches from trees and remove shrubs and trees within

• Don't store cardboard boxes, paper or other flammable materials in the backyard. These materials provide ready fuel for a fire and all it takes is one spark.

Heating your Home Most Important!

 Check all smoke and carbon monoxide detectors to make sure they work, and change the batteries. It is the law for all Ontario homes to have a

working smoke alarm on every storey and outside all sleeping areas. This covers single family, semi-detached and town homes, whether owner-occupied or rented.

Have a useable fire extinguisher available.

Central Heating

 Get your central heating system cleaned, inspected and serviced by a certified HVAC (heating, venting and air conditioning) contractor every year before using it.

• If you have a gas heater, make sure that you have a sufficient quantity of fully functioning carbon monoxide detectors installed in your home.

 Keep all flammable materials away from your furnace. This includes, clothing, paint products, toxic materials, cardboard and more.

Fireplaces and Woodstoves

- · Have heating appliances serviced and chimney flues examined for defects.
- Have fireplaces and fireplace dampers checked.

• Fireplaces should be equipped with an appropriate screen or glass enclosure to prevent sparks from flying out.

- · Wood burning stoves should be examined and the flue and chimney checked for creosote buildup. Creosote is a deposit from smoke that can build up in a chimney and can start a fire.
- Use only seasoned woods, and avoid soft woods like Pine, etc.

• Never use a flammable liquid to start a fireplace.

Never overload the hearth with wood or artificial logs, the resulting fire may be too large for the unit.

Put all ashes outdoors and away from the house in a metal con-

Space Heaters

Make sure that any space heaters are surrounded by at least three feet of empty space.

Never place clothing or any other objects on a space heater to dry.

 Do not place space heaters near furniture or drapery. Turn space heaters off when you leave the house or go to bed.

Avoid storing any combustible items near heaters

In The Home

- · Cooking fires are the number one cause of home fires and home injuries. The leading cause of fires in the kitchen is unattended cooking. Stay in the kitchen while you are frying, grilling, or broiling food. If you leave the kitchen for even a short period of time, turn off the stove. If you are simmering, baking, roasting, or boiling food, check it regularly, remain in the home while food is cooking, and use a timer to remind you that you are cooking. Keep anything that can catch fire — oven mitts, wooden utensils, food packaging, towels or curtains — away from your
- · Do not overload electrical outlets or use extension cords in the place of additional outlets.

· Check electrical appliances regularly for wearing cords and plugs. Do not leave electrical appliances plugged in if they do not need to be.

 Lack of maintenance is the number one cause of dryer fires. That is why it is critical to clean the lint filter before and after each use, and wipe away any lint that has accumulated around the drum. Perform periodic checks to ensure that the air exhaust vent pipe is unobstructed (lint accumulation) and the outdoor vent flap opens readily. Do not run the dryer without a lint filter. You are encouraged to not leave the dryer running if you go out, in case it malfunctions.

Candles

- · Extinguish candles when leaving the room or going to sleep. Keep lit candles away from items that can catch fire
- Place candles in sturdy, burn-resistant containers that won't tip over and are big enough to collect dripping wax.
- · Don't place lit candles near windows, where blinds or curtains may close or blow over them.
- · Don't use candles in high traffic areas where children or pets could knock them over. · Never let candles burn out completely. Extinguish them when they get to within two
- inches of the holder or decorative material. • Never leave children or pets alone in a room with lit candles.
- Do not allow older children to light candles in their bedrooms. A forgotten candle or an accident is all it takes to start a fire.
- During power outages, exercise caution when using candles as a light source.
- Many destructive fires start when potential fire hazards go unnoticed in the dark.
- · Never use a candle for light when fuelling equipment such as a camp fuel heater or lantern.

- Keep candle wicks short at all times. Trim the wick to one-quarter inch (6.4 mm).
- · Be wary of buying novelty candles. Avoid candles surrounded by flammable paint, paper, dried flowers, or breakable/meltable containers.
- Extinguish taper and pillar candles when they burn to within two inches of the holder, and container candles before the last half-inch of wax begins to melt.
- · When buying or using novelty candles, try to determine if they pose a potential fire hazard (if they contain a combustible component for instance). If they do, or if you suspect that they might, inform your local fire department.
- Use extreme caution when carrying a lit candle, holding it well away from your clothes and any combustibles that may be along your path.


