

Julie's Story - A Bonded Community Rescue

We adopted Julie, a 7 year old rescue Shih Tzu, from The Thunder Bay Humane Society on Saturday morning, October 30th. Amber, the Humane Society handler informed us of Julie's situation and that Julie will need time to adjust and it may take months before she will trust people. Julie came from an extremely abusive and cruel situation. Julie lived in a cage her entire life, sleeping



and eating in her own feces. Julie was never groomed, never saw any love and was only removed from her cage to be bred. When we adopted Julie you could easily count her pertruding bones. Around 5:30 on that same Saturday, with collar on and leash in hand, we took Julie outside to see if she needed to do potty business. Within seconds of being outside, Julie just jumped frantically from my husband's arms and ran into the bush. This now became a 5 day search for our little princess that had nights as low as -8. Julie was newly groomed and 5 days from being spayed. Needless to say, we went into panic mode and the search began. We had lots of sightings all the way from our place (1067 Highway 608) to end of 608/highway 61.

As we began our search, which started immediately, word went out via Facebook and posters. From that moment on, the outpouring of love, support and compassion from the community of Neebing was so amazing. People stopped on the side of the road when they saw us searching, parked their car and joined the search. In my entire life, I personally, have never seen such a coming together of a community to help with the search of a fragile broken pet. We were overwhelmed with all the emails, text messages and phone calls of support.

Together we want to say Thank You from the bottom of our hearts. There are too many people to list, many that I had never met, but we must mention the following:

The entire Wasilewski family under the guidance of Sharon, Julie would never be found if not for you on that Wednesday afternoon, November 03rd. Peter and Val Major, Kim Olson and Tim Olson who searched from daybreak till dark. Wanda Major for the making and distribution of the posters. Tim and Margo Janssens for the loan of a live trap. Lionel Smith for open access to your property on 597. And to Amber from The Humane Society who was successful calling Julie from the bush on Highway 597 on the Wasilewski property. I could go on and on.

To each and every single person who advised of the sightings, searched and kept us in their prayers; May our Heavenly Father bless you and keep you safe.

Julie has now gained a few pounds and is stuck to me like glue. We have found a new purpose in life and love her immensely. She plays with all her new toys and has shown an affection for us that is so heartwarming.

Notice of Adoption of By-law to Change Ward Boundaries and Council Composition

Please take notice that the Council of The Corporation of the Municipality of Neebing, at its regular meeting held on November 3, 2021, passed Bylaw 2021-043 to change the ward boundaries and Council composition, pursuant to Section 222 of the Municipal Act, 2001.

Effects of the change:

Under the current structure, there are seven (7) members of Council, made up of a Mayor, a Councillor elected at large, and five (5) ward Councillors (one each for electoral wards made up of the geographic townships of Blake, Crooks, Pardee, Pearson and Scoble).

Under the new structure, there will be five (5) members of Council, made up of a Mayor and four (4) ward Councillors (one each for electoral wards made up of the four geographic townships of Blake, Crooks and Scoble; and one for the combined geographic townships of Pardee and Pearson).

How to appeal:

Under Subsection 222(4) of the Municipal Act, 2001, any person or agency may appeal to the Ontario Land Tribunal (OLT) by filing a notice of appeal with the Clerk-Treasurer of the Municipality of Neebing.

The Notice of Appeal must:

- be filed within 45 of the by-law being passed;
- set out the objection to the by-law and the reasons in support of the objection; and
- be accompanied by the fees required by the Ontario Land Tribunal (certified cheque or money order payable to the "Minister of Finance").

The by-law will not take effect or be in force until after the appeal period has passed without an appeal, or, in the case of an appeal, until after the appeal has been heard. If there are no appeals, the by-law will take effect for the 2022 Municipal election.

For the by-law to be effective for the 2022 election, one of the following must occur:

- No notices of appeal are filed;
- If notices of appeal are filed, they are withdrawn before January 1, 2022;
 or
- If notices of appeal are filed, the Ontario Land Tribunal either affirms or amends the by-law before January 1, 2022.

If the by-law comes into force after January 1, 2022, then it will be effective for the 2026 election.

The deadline to file a notice of appeal is Monday, December 20, 2021 at 5:00 pm.


December always seems to be a **Already!** busy month, what with adjusting to seasonal weather realities as well as preparing for seasonal fes-







What's Been Happening at Council Meetings?

Since the November edition, there has been two regular Council meetings on November 3 and 17. There has also been one Special Council meetings on November 17

At the regular Council meeting on November 3, the following matters were considered:

- Council passed a by-law to reduce the size of Council to five members and combine the Pearson and Pardee wards.
- Council authorized Administration to apply for expanded plastics recycling through the Resource Productivity and Recovery Authority.
- Council supported the Great Lakes Waterfront Trail expansion project which will go through Neebing.

At the Special Council meeting on November 17, Council sitting as Committee of the Whole heard an application for a severance to create a lot for the purposes of correcting an encroachment. A request to close a historic road in Pearson that is no longer maintained was reviewed. Recommendations from the Committee were ratified by Council at the regular meeting held later the same evening.

At the regular Council meeting on November 17, the following matters were considered:

- Council passed a by-law to adopt the revised Official Plan.
- Council passed a by-law to enable participation in

the ONE Investment Joint Investment Board as a prudent investor.

- Council reviewed a request for additional road signage on Little Trout Bay Road near the conservation area.
- Council reviewed the response from the Ministry of Transportation regarding roadside herbicide spraying.

This article contains only highlights from Council meetings – visit the website to see the approved minutes from each of the meetings. The minutes of each meeting are approved at the following meeting, and are posted on the website once they have been approved and signed. If you don't have internet capabilities, you can always contact the office for copies of approved minutes.

Meeting agendas are always posted online on the Friday prior to the Wednesday meeting. Come out and see what your Council is doing on your behalf. Feel free to contact the Municipal Office for further information or with input into any of the items that Council is considering. During the pandemic, all meetings are being held virtually. 



This pump is similar in size to the volume pumps in use and would readily fit into onboard storage compartments. It is capable of flowing enhanced volumes of water at higher pressures, and is able to push water further and faster, helping overcome the realities of long transfers. The higher operating pressures are sufficient to make this pump useful in assisting with fire suppression activities in difficult to reach areas such as camp or lakefront areas or where a secondary attack approach is desirable.



The Rural Pharmacist:

Who is Eligible for a Covid-19 Booster

Vaccine? by Devon Myers, Pharmacist/Owner of Evergreen Pharmacies

Over the past few months there have been several changes to the immunization strategy in Ontario regarding the fight against Covid-19. First there was the introduction of booster shots. Next came the announcement that children 5-11 years of age could get vaccinated. Following is a summary of some the recent changes and what that means for our patients as we move out of 2021 and into 2022.

Let's start with the introduction of booster vaccines. At this time, a twodose vaccine series has been shown to work! Data has emerged that demonstrates that a full vaccine series maintains high vaccine effectiveness with no evidence of waning against serious illness, hospitalization and death. But if that's the case, why are we bothering with a booster? Despite its effectiveness for preventing serious complications from Covid-19 infection, vaccine effectiveness against asymptomatic infection and mild Covid-19 disease may decrease over time. In addition, currently authorized vaccines may be less effective against the Delta variant, a more easily transmissible strain. For these reasons, booster vaccines have become available for certain populations to provide durable protection.

Believe it or not, booster vaccines have been available for several months. At rollout, however, it was only accessible for specific groups of people. The first patient population to have access to the booster vaccine was high-risk individuals. What does that mean? High risk individuals are those most likely to have severe complications if they were to contract the

Covid-

19 virus. An example of a high-risk individual could be someone undergoing chemotherapy or, a recipient of an organ transplant. Protect the most vulnerable, that makes sense. At the time, these patients needed a note from their doctor that specified the need for a booster dose. Policies have changed a bit since then.

The next group eligible for a booster vaccine were those over the age of 70 who had had their second dose of a Covid-19 vaccine at least 6 months prior. Please note the placement of the underline. A booster vaccine is believed to be more effective if given 6 months after the second dose; our immune systems seem to respond more efficiently. Also included in this second group were certain health care workers or first responders, as well as First Nations, Inuit and Metis adults.

Does this sound familiar? If you can remember, these were the initial groups of people to receive their first dose of a Covid-19 vaccine at the beginning of 2021. Subsequently, the general population began receiving their vaccines shortly after. If the Ontario government takes a similar approach to vaccine accessibility for booster doses, one could imagine that boosters for the general population will be available within the coming weeks to months. With that being said, we are still administering many first and second doses at our pharmacies. You have not missed the boat if you are still looking to be vaccinated.

At the time of writing, the announcement that children 5-11 years of age could receive their first dose of

a mRNA vaccine was just being made. From literature provided to date, the vaccine manufactured by Pfizer has been approved by Health Canada for use in this age group. This is the same vaccine that has been provided in individuals 12 years of age and older. Children 5-11 years of age will receive a smaller dose of the vaccine. Specific lots of these vaccines will likely have arrived in Ontario by the time this article is published. This marks a milestone in our effort to combat Covid-19. Stay tuned for more updates regarding vaccine use in this age group in our future articles.

Lastly, December marks the 4-year anniversary for our pharmacy in Rosslyn. I would like to take this opportunity to sincerely thank all our patients and customers who continue to support us. The past two years have been exceptionally demanding as we've navigated the new healthcare landscape. But our patients have remained understanding and supportive

throughout the pandemic. It is a privilege to work in this community and we look forward to serving you for years to come. Thank you. See you in the new year!

WOMEN'S INSTITUTE RECIPES

SLATE RIVER W.I.

This month we're heading into Christmas then New Years and as we do we look out for different snacks that are somewhat nutritious but have that crispy, salty bite we all tend to savour. This recipe for Homemade Nuts and Bolts is a favourite in my home. It makes a lot . So, get some jars ready for the extras, fill the jars up, wrap them with ribbons and there you have a small gift for those unexpected guests to take home.

HOMEMADE NUTS AND BOLTS

1/2 to 1 cup of butter melted

2 tbsp. Worshestershire sauce

1 tsp. each of garlic powder and onion powder

1 tsp. salt

Mix the seasonings and melted butter together. You can add a touch more or less and may want a tsp of celery salt as an option.

In a large roast pan mix together the following

One 300 gm box of plain Cheerios

300 gm. pretzel sticks 2 cups of peanuts

1 cup water 1 cup brown sugar 1/4 cup vinegar 1/3 tsp.ginger 3 tbsp.ketchup 2 tbsp. cornstarch

Bring the water, ginger ,sugar, and vinegar to a boil. Add ketchup and cornstarch.Mix with a little cold water and simmer 'til desired consistency. Serve in little side bowls or on top of the chicken balls.

1 and 1/4 teaspoons ground ginger

1 teaspoon cinnamon

1/3 tsp. salt

Preheat oven to 350'

Cream shortening and the 1 cup of sugar until light and fluffy. Beat in egg and molasses.

In another bowl combine next 5 ingredients and gradually add to creamed mixture and mix well.

Shape level tablespoons of dough into balls. Dip one side of gingersnap into the remaining 2 tablespoons of sugar. Place 2" apart on greased baking sheet or parchment lined baking sheet.




