## Enbridge Gas Assists Neebing Emergency Services in Supporting Firefighter Training

Neebing, ON, January, 7, 2022 – Enbridge Gas is helping Neebing Emergency Services (NES) purchase firefighting training materials, through Safe Community Project Assist–a program with the Fire Marshal's Public Fire Safety Council that supplements existing training for Ontario volunteer and composite fire departments in the communities where Enbridge operates.

"At Enbridge Gas, safety is our priority. We're proud to support Ontario firefighters who share our commitment to keeping our communities safe," says Luke Skaarup, Director, Northern Region Operations, Enbridge Gas.

This year's \$250,000 donation from Enbridge Gas will be shared by 50 Ontario fire departments, including Neebing Emergency Services. Funds will be used to purchase educational materials for firefighters to enhance life-saving techniques.

Since the launch of Safe Community Project Assist in 2012, 244 grants have been provided to Ontario fire departments for additional firefighter training.

"Safe Community Project Assist improves access to training materials for fire departments," says Jon Pegg, Ontario Fire Marshal and Chair of the Fire Marshal's Public Fire Safety Council. "Firefighting can be dangerous and unpredictable, and these training materials positively contribute to the health and safety of firefighters and the broader community."

"With the support Neebing has received from Enbridge's Safe Community Project Assist, our department has been able to acquire key training materials that can provide our volunteer members with up-to-date knowledge and enhance their own safety while carrying out often dangerous duties to provide community safety," says Neebing Fire Chief Dale Ashbee.

#### **COVID-19 Restrictions**

The new COVID-19 restrictions announced by the Ontario Government include:

- · Indoor dining at restaurants and bars closed.
- Only outdoor dining, takeout, drive through and delivery permitted
- Social gathering limits reduced to five people indoors and 10 people outdoors.
- Retail stores, malls, public libraries and personal care services limited to 50 per cent capacity.
- Saunas, steam rooms and oxygen bars closed.
- Capacity at weddings, funerals and religious services limited to 50 per cent capacity per room.
- Outdoor services must have two-metre distancing between all attendees.
- Employees must work remotely unless their work requires them to be on site.
- Gyms and other indoor recreational sport facilities closed, except athletes training for the Olympics and Paralympics and certain professional and elite sports leagues.
- Outdoor facilities are permitted but with a 50 per cent capacity limit on spectators.
- Museums, galleries, zoos, science centres, historic sites, amuse-

ment parks, festivals and other attractions

- Outdoor establishments allowed with restrictions and ca-
- pacity limits.

  Indoor meeting and event spaces closed with limited exceptions, except those with outdoor spaces, which can operate with restrictions.

The new measures kicked in on Wednesday, Jan. 5 at 12:01 a.m. and will remain in effect for at least 21 days, until Jan. 26.

Ontario Resource Development Support Fund (NORDS) to the resurfacing of Sturgeon Bay Road.

At the Special Council meeting on December 15, Council sitting as Committee of the Whole heard an application for a severance to create a new lot on Sturgeon Bay Road. Recommendations from the Committee were ratified by Council at the regular meeting held later the same evening.

At the regular Council meeting on December 15, the following matters were considered:

- Council heard two deputations. One relating to the condition of Cloud Lake Road and the other related conservation of the Cloud River wet-
- Council accepted the annual municipal insurance renewal proposal.
- Council approved the annual reserve fund transfers.
- Council reviewed the pre-design reports regarding the replacements of the Farm Road and Pardee Road bridges.
- Council passed a by-law to close an unmaintained road in Pearson leading to the Pine River.

This article contains only highlights from Council meetings – visit the website to see the approved minutes from each of the meetings. The minutes of each meeting are approved at the following meeting, and are posted on the website once they have been approved and signed. If you don't have internet capabilities, you can always contact the office for copies of approved minutes.

Meeting agendas are always posted online on the Friday prior to the Wednesday meeting. Come out and see what your Council is doing on your behalf. Feel free to contact the Municipal Office for further information or with input into any of the items that Council is considering. During the pandemic, all meetings are being held virtually. The links to login to the meetings are posted on our website in the calendar details.

#### Covid-19 Testing

Starting Dec. 31, the province is limiting eligibility for publicly funded PCR tests to high-risk individuals who are symptomatic or who are at risk of severe illness from COVID-19. This includes hospital patients and staff, people who live, work or provide care at long-term care or other congregate settings, and people from or who work in Indigenous communities.

The province says members of the public with symptoms of COVID-19 who don't meet the new eligibility criteria should assume they are infected and follow the new self-isolation guidelines (see section below).

In addition, most people who test positive on a rapid antigen test will no longer be required to confirm their diagnosis with a PCR test or a molecular test.

While previously anyone with symptoms of COVID-19 could get a PCR test at an assessment centre, Moore said the province's public health system simply doesn't have the capacity to test everyone amid the surge in cases.

#### **Self-Isolation Guidelines**

Vaccinated people and children under the age of 12 who are sick with COVID-19 will only be required to self-isolate for a minimum of five days following the date when their symptoms started, instead of 10. Their household contacts will also be required to isolate alongside them. If, after five days, their symptoms have improved for at least 24 hours they can end the isolation period.

Close contacts of people with COVID-19 who are fully vaccinated, asymptomatic and who don't live with the positive case, won't have to self-isolate at all. Instead, they're being advised to self-monitor for symptoms and to not visit any high-risk settings or vulnerable individuals for 10 days.

People who are unvaccinated, partially vaccinated or immunocompromised will still be required to isolate for 10 days.

#### Winter Road Maintenance

With winter operations in full swing, Council would like to assure Neebing residents that our staff are working hard to keep the roads clear and safe. Unfortunately, with approximately 500 lane kilometers of road to manage by five staff members, it is not always possible to have all roads cleared in the early morning, especially when there is a big snowfall.

Council asks you to remain patient, and to keep the following in mind with respect to winter road maintenance:

- Snow clearing routes are based on geography, as well as available staff and equipment. Generally, if all equipment is functional and all staff are available, the roads are divided into five areas. Routes are followed in a pattern to clear the highest traffic roads as early as possible, but routes may change as circumstances require.
- Under the current COVID situation, there is a high possibility of staffing shortages and winter maintenance could be delayed.
- The Municipality does not have the resources to prioritize road clearing on any particular road over others based on reasons such as school bussing, persons with illnesses or unusual work hours.
- The current minimum maintenance standard is that the roads are cleared after an accumulation of 10 cm, within 24 to 72 hours (depending on the road classification). In most cases, this standard is exceeded.

There are ways you can help protect yourself and make snow clearing activities easier.

- Avoid unnecessary travel during bad weather. If you must travel, please slow down. Every municipal road in Neebing has a speed limit of 60 km/hr or less.
- Do not park on municipal roads or road allowances. This creates obstacles that the roads crew must work around.
- Do not place snow from private property onto municipal roads or road allowances. This practice is contrary to municipal by-laws and the Province's Highway Traffic Act. Placing snow on the roadway creates safety hazards for vehicle traffic and makes road maintenance more difficult.

But hey, this is science in motion. We need to listen to the top medical leaders in the province to keep everyone safe and prevent our healthcare system from being overwhelmed.

The omicron variant is extremely transmissible and case counts are high at the time of writing.

What is important to monitor going forward, with respect to the health-care system: hospitalized COVID infections, and cases that impact the staffing of healthcare workplaces. If there are critical staff shortages due to staff having to isolate because of positive COVID cases then there is going to be a negative ripple effect across the whole healthcare system.

As I mentioned, lots of rules/guidelines has changed! We have been getting lots of questions and inquiries daily about the changing recommendations. Where are we now? See below:

- Our pharmacies are offering both Moderna and Pfizer booster COVID vaccines to ages 18+. As it stands at time of writing, Pfizer is in a provincial short supply and the Thunder Bay District Health Unit is recommending that all Pfizer vaccines are reserved for eligible persons aged 12-29, while Moderna is used for those aged 30+.
- Pfizer vaccines are to be prioritized in the 12-29 age group as there have been observed lower rates of heart inflammation in that specific age group.
- Moderna induces somewhat higher antibody levels compared to Pfizer. Protection (against infection and severe disease) from a primary series with Moderna may be more durable than Pfizer. Immunocompromised and ages 70+ may have less robust immune function (elderly) or a diminished immune response to the vaccine. These populations receive a full dose (100mcg) of the Moderna booster vaccine whereas those less than 70 and not immunocompromised receive a half dose of the Moderna booster vaccine (50mcg).
- Moderna and Pfizer vaccines are both of the mRNA class and can be used interchangeably. Mixing vaccines is a practice that occurs regularly in the medical field. Waiting for the availability of a preferred vaccine brand delays your opportunity for vaccination and increases your risk of infection.
- Persons are eligible to receive their booster COVID vaccine 84 days (3 months) after their second dose of the COVID vaccine. An immunocompromised person can receive their person 56

days after their second dose.

- We haven't received any pediatric COVID vaccines yet. Unfortunately, our order wasn't filled in early December and our wholesaler is out of stock with no estimated date of shipments. We've been a bit left in the dark here.
- Rapid Antigen Tests: We ran out of stock over the holidays and are awaiting our next shipment. Once we do get more then we will continue to perform the tests in store for \$40 a test for nonsymptomatic persons. This test is meant as a screening tool for work/travel, and not as a diagnostic tool. At the time of writing, pharmacies are still not permitted to sell Rapid Antigen Test Kits for home use.. I know, we think it makes sense that people could purchase and uses these at home too.

IMPORTANT TO NOTE: We are booking COVID vaccines on our website at www.evergreenrx.ca. (Found on our homepage where it says "Flu Shots, COVID Vaccines, COVID Tests"). Please note that we are booking into the end of January at the time of writing. HOWEVER, we are exploring options to open up more appointments so that we can help to get more people vaccinated as soon as possible. (We will be having a nurse help out! NURSES ARE GREAT AND DESERVE YOUR LOVE) Once we confirm increased capacity for appointments, we will update people through an email blast to our email subscribers (again, you can sign up on our website!). Also, LIKE our facebook or Instagram page where we may also communicate available appointments. LAST THING: THANK YOU TO EVERYONE FOR YOUR CONTIN-UED PATIENCE AND SUPPORT

#### Neebing Emergency Services by Dale Ashbee, Fire Chief, Neebing Our Warm "WEŁCOME" to 2022!

New Year's .... that one time at the end of each calendar year when we are encouraged to look back over the past 12 months .... to reflect on what changes have taken place in our lives, and to gamely layout planned changes and adjustments for the coming year.

Before I go further in either reminiscing on the past or dreaming about the future, I would like to take a moment to express our sincere appreciation to all those who have assisted NES, in anyway, over the course of the past year. Whether offering needed assistance at a scene, installing a new station outdoor light, recognizing services received or supporting one of the NFRA fund raising initiatives (as well as however else you may have assisted our team), we say THANK YOU!

Unfortunately, the 'elephant in the room' the past few years has been the pandemic. Although by now I'm thinking most of us were hoping that references to COVID would be delivered in terms of the past, here we are starting 2022 with yet another virus variant spreading and restricting our return to 'normal'. At this time last year, the prospect of the arrival of new anti-COVID vaccine therapies brought with it the expectations of a potentially speedy return to 'things' being the "way they were". However, reality has hit, and the pandemic is not expected to end as quickly as was hoped. It is

unfortunately going to continue to impact our daily lives well into this New Year. Although the COVID pandemic has proved to be disruptive to our daily living, the past year has induced in us adjusted expectations and new 'habits' – both of which have helped us to carry on and function in these unusual times.

While the pandemic impacted the delivery of such social events as our annual NES Fish Fry and Family Potluck Dinner at Christmas, looking back there were still some memorable moments for our members during 2021. There was the excitement of the arrival in Neebing of the new Pumper truck (P108) in March, the many issues involved in responding to (and managing) several wildfire threat situations during the prolonged drought of Summer and Fall and then the holding of our first Halloween Trick or Treat 'drive-through' event at Hall 1 (which was very successful, and proved to be popular with our 'big and small' community residents).

Despite the pandemic disruptions and related conditions, NES (with appropriate PPE and COVID protocols in place) was able to continue to respond to calls for emergency assistance from our Neebing community. With adjustments and team co-operation, volunteers were able to move from the 'virtual' classroom to 'inperson instruction' classes at Blake Hall, and to resume practical training

exercises as planned on our training calendar. Essential safety gear and equipment continue to be available, although delivery schedules are often prolonged for many items. Happily, some essential Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) - such as N95 masks - are more readily available today than a year ago.

There is little doubt that the pandemic has 'messed things up' badly, slowing everything down and impacting how we do things (on so many levels) to carry out our day-to-day family activities. Regular schooling, work, recreation, and simply socializing – all were disrupted to some degree. It is encouraging to note how people have adapted and made changes to what they do (and how they do it), all in an effort to keep doing 'what needs to be done' while still remaining as safe and healthy as possible. Con-

gratulations to all who contributed to our Neebing community's well-being in 2021!

There doesn't appear to be a magic crystal ball out there to tell us when this pandemic will be officially over, and the recurring pandemic 'cycles' (with their changing virus variants) sometimes make things feel like we are in a remake of the Bill Murray 'Groundhog Day' movie. 
- $oldsymbol{X}$  Charging laptops or phones on the bed

## **Fire Safety Checklist**

Use this Fire Safety Checklist to keep you and your family safe.

- Install working smoke alarms on every level of your home and outside all sleeping areas.
- Plan and practice a home fire escape plan.
- Install carbon monoxide alarms outside all sleeping areas.
- Ensure your Fire /House Number is visible at all times.
- · Look while you cook, never leave cooking unattended.
- Smoke outside and discard cigarette butts in non-combustible containers that are kept outside. Never smoke in bed.
- Keep combustibles away from any heat source (furnace, heaters, stoves etc).
- · Never use extension cords in place of permanent wiring.
- Don't overload electrical outlets, use CSA approved power bars.
- Blow out candles when you leave the room and use stable, noncombustible candleholders.
- Keep matches and lighters out of the reach of children.
- Make sure to have your chimney cleaned and inspected every year by a professional!

## **WOMEN'S INSTITUTE** RECIPES **SLATE RIVER W.I.**

Snowy days and Covid is keeping many of us housebound. So why not turn to baking for comfort? Instead of making a loaf of bread try making some focaccia. You can experiment with it and add a different topping in each quarter to find out which you or your family likes best. Foccacia is known as a hearth bread originally from the Mediterranean.

#### **FOCACCIA BREAD**

1 cup of warm water 1 tbsp. or packet of yeast 1 tsp. sugar 2 cups flour 1 tsp. salt 1 tbsp. olive oil

Mix together the sugar and then the yeast into the cup of warm water Let the yeast activate for about ten minutes.

Add this to two cups of flour, one teaspoon of salt and one tablespoon of olive oil. Mix well then knead the dough for about five minutes. Place the dough ball into a lightly oiled bowl and cover. Let the dough rise until doubled in size.

Once risen, shape the dough onto a 9 by 13 inch baking sheet or a circular pizza pan. Stretching it so that it is 1/2 to 3/4 inch thick.

This next part is fun because you get to make indentations with your finger, so the bread looks uniformly dimpled. The indentations will help prevent bubbles from appearing on the top of the bread.

Now you can drizzle or brush a little olive oil on the dough and add your favourite toppings. Here are the most popular toppings to

Rosemary, sea salt, a favourite cheese, a bit of garlic. I have put an olive or small pieces of sweet red peppers into the dimples. Now you can experiment with your favourite toppings in different quadrants to suit everyone's tastes.

Bake until it's a golden colour about 30 minutes.

#### **IDA'S CREAMY ONION SOUP**

Ida Towell, a lifelong member of the Slate River Women's Institute was known to always remind us to save our potato water, any veggie water for that matter to use in our soups or when liquid was needed. She was well known for so many recipes especially her soups. On this recipe she wrote "Real good!"....from Norway.

> Ingredients: 1/4 cup of butter 1 or 2 large onions sliced fine 1/4 tsp. curry 3 tbsp. flour 2 cups of water 4 beef boullion cubes 2 cups of milk

Melt the butter and in it sauté the onions with the curry. Stir in the flour and then the water. Stir constantly. Next add the beef bouillon cubes and finally the milk. Simmer until the onions are completely tender. If necessary thin with light cream or milk.

Now, pour yourself a yummy bowl full, take a piece of the focaccia and dip it into the soup.Ah! Delicious!

Take great care everyone. Enjoy our winter wonderland and your homemade food.

In 2018, the Thunder Bay District Health Unit published a report on Oliver Paipoonge and Marathon showing high levels of radon were detected in both communities.

In Oliver Paipoonge, 188 homes conducted tests using long-term radon test kits. These are certified by the Canadian - National Radon Proficiency Program. Of these 188 tests, 65% of homes tested high! *This is an incredibly high number.* Nationally, the average is 7% of homes test high.


What is radon?

Radon is a radioactive gas, that is naturally caused when uranium in the soil breaks down. Uranium is also naturally occurring. However, just because radon gas is a natural process, it can be very hazardous to your health. The only way to know if you're being exposed to radon is to test your home.

Radon can enter your house through an open sump pit, cracks in the foundation, weak window seals or any other opening where your home contacts the soil

During the winter months, radon enters the home and easily accumulates. With our windows and doors shut tight during the heating months, radon doesn't escape.

When you breath in radon gas, the radioactive particles release energy bursts in your lungs. This damages cells and can lead to lung cancer. Thankfully, by testing and fixing your home, you can stay safe.



Lung cancer is the only known risk of being exposed to radon.

The risks of radon are compounded by:

- High levels of radon in your home
- Low ventilation
- Length of time exposed to high levels of radon and;
- Smoking habits



Have you tested your home yet for radon?

The best way to do this, is to buy a long-term radon test kit. These results are the most accurate.

- Winter months need to be part of the testing period
- Tests are a minimum of 3 months, maximum 12 months

 Place detector in the lowest room in your home that you spend 4 or more hours a day

 Don't move the device around during the testing period

After you test your home, you will receive the results. The results are measured in Becquerels per meter cubed (Bq/m³). If you have 200 Bq/m³ or higher, you need to mitigate.

Short Term detectors at the Library



For a variety of reasons, purchasing a long-term test kit may not be possible or accessible to everyone. The Rosslyn and Murillo libraries are equipped with short term radon detectors that residents may borrow. These are simple screening tools with the purpose of further educating homeowners about radon. It is Health Canada's hope that anyone who borrows a short-term detector. will follow up with a long-term test.

When borrowing a short-term detector, use it for as long as you're able to borrow it from the library. Only

use it during the winter months – using them in the summer can provide falsely low levels of radon. Don't move it around the house and keep it in a place that is representative of the air you breath.

Mitigation Techniques

Mitigation is the process of fixing your home, so that less radon enters. The goal is to get radon down to a safe level (below 200 Bg/m³).

A board member of EcoSuperior tested their home a couple years ago and discovered their levels were over 400 Bq/m³. This individual had the skills to build a sealed cover over the sump pit, onto which they attached a radon fan. Radon fans are vented outside, and run constantly, reversing

the air pressure that invites radon into the home in the first place. When they tested again after the mitigation the radon level was 35 Bq/m<sup>3</sup>! The mitigation worked.

Thunder Bay also has four radon mitigation professionals that can advise and do the work for you. See above.

Each home is unique, which is why every home should test for radon. The uniqueness of every home also means the mitigation techniques, if required, will also be very specific. Thus, the costs can vary greatly between homes, ranging from \$300-\$3000 depending on your house. Regardless, the most important step is to test!

EcoSuperior's Radon YouTube Video

In November (which is radon awareness month), a series of webinars were offered to the community. A recording of the presentation can be found on YouTube - google EcoSuperior Radon.



The video is about 30 mins long and goes over all of this information in a bit more detail.




