


At the regular Council meeting on September 7, the following matters were considered:

#### **Thunder Bay Growing Project**

2022 has delivered a glimpse of our pre-covid world, but also has highlighted the ways in which our world has changed. This stands true for the Thunder Bay Growing Project (TBGP), a local program raising funds in support of the Canadian Foodgrains Bank. When the project began back in the early 1980's the idea was simple: grow a crop of grain using donated machinery, land, seed, fertilizer, and time; then send the harvested grain overseas to countries in need. This was an excellent structure that ran well for decades, but with the increasing cost of input and decreasing availability of volunteer time, as well as our everchanging unpredictable weather conditions, it was time for this project to evolve. In November -2019, the first Thunder Bay Community Growing Project Gala was held, this event was a success and there was great excitement for the upcoming year. Unfortunately, in 2020 plans were put on hold and the TBGP remained mostly inactive for the two worst summers of the pandemic. 2022 presented new opportunities and renewed excitement for the project. For this season the project has had a complete overhaul, with a plan that involves the broader community and is able to assist hunger on both a global AND local level.

The structure of the TBGP this year is one inspired by local producers and will support both local and global communities. First, fundraising to cover the input costs of raising 4 calves to market age. Next, dividing animals into 2 portions: one to be auctioned off, and the other to be donated to local food charities. The money that is raised by the auction will be donated to the Canadian Foodgrains Bank by the Canadian government for world hunger relief programs.

The UN estimates 20 million more people will experience hunger, and more will experience food insecurity, in 2022 due to both climate issues and international conflicts. This significant increase foreshadows future growing seasons and demonstrates the important role that programs such as the Canadian Foodgrains Bank play. The Canadian Foodgrains Bank's unique focus on supporting international relief programs designed to educate and empower, rather than purely providing immediate crisis relief, helping communities to not just survive but thrive in these times of uncertainty. This "hand up, not hand out" approach is key in the battle against world hunger at all levels, a stance which gains the support of our Canadian government who matches all project donations 3:1. This means that for every dollar raised, \$4 is invested in building community level food security projects internationally.

Feeding our world starts at home, and it needs your support! TBCP is currently accepting both monetary and in-kind donations; sponsorship opportunities are also available. The first TBCP Local Beef Auction and Gala will be held November 12 at Fort William Historical Park, tickets are on sale now and can be found by searching Local Beef Auction and Gala on Eventbrite.com. # Chix in the Stix Mung Beans

I'm one of those people profoundly affected by the changing seasons. Especially Fall with the change in light, coolness in the air, the metaphor of letting go, resting, and preparing for growth and rebirth. It causes a lot of inner reflection and deep thoughts. Add to that that there have been more than a few events in our lives (and in our world!) this past year that have caused us to pause and consider our mortality. So I have been thinking a lot about legacy this month. What memories my kids will carry forward. What legacy we will leave behind. I mean hopefully we have many years left. I guess we are just at that age where these things become reality. I just feel this new phase of our lives starting. I can see our kids looking at us differently. They are recognizing that time passes quicker as you get older. They see the gap widening between our generations but at the same time becoming smaller as we become closer. More than ever they are becoming our best friends. They step up when they see us slowing down a bit or struggling with a few aches and pains during tasks that were once a breeze. We don't want them to remember us failing or ailing so accepting help is not always easy. Nor is accepting that we are entering the last chapter of our lives. But it's there. So we're trying to embrace it and carve out as many memorable moments as we can. Make it one of the best chapters. Trying to make sure there are great memories for them to look back on one day. To encourage the kind of legacy we are hoping for.

Last night I was explaining to my daughter that the blanket she was snuggled under had been made many years ago by the grandmother she never got a chance to meet. Crocheting was one of my mom's talents and when my siblings and I share memories it always gets mentioned. That and her love of country music. Decades later I still carry Juicy Fruit gum in my purse because it reminds me of her. If we talk about our late dad the conversation includes references to taxi's, spaghetti dinners, and his kitchen table 'office.' When I think about my grandmother I can practically smell her hand lotion and taste her shortbread cookies. Even the shape of the

bar of soap in her tiny bathroom is etched in my memory. I drink Tetley tea because my grandfather did. I know all the words to his favourite hymns.

I wonder now what my kids will remember about me. I hope it's my faith, my servant heart, my efforts to be kind and compassionate. I fear it will more likely have something to do with my dark sense of humour, my swearing, and my constant cleaning. Or maybe they will talk about my love of scented candles. Or coffee. Or how I loved medical shows or court room dramas. How I was always writing. I honestly don't know. And I wonder what their memories of their dad will be like. Probably his work ethic and his propensity for teasing. Maybe something about eating lots of garlic and onions and the resulting consequences in enclosed spaces. Or how you could never go to town with him without stopping to talk with soooo many people because he seems to know EVERYBODY! And mung beans. I think even now if you mention mung beans to my kids you don't have to say much more. Seems my hubby can't pass a bag of mung beans in the grocery store without tossing them into the cart. Which is funny because I have never once in my life actually cooked mung beans. I have sprouted them, but even that is only an occasional thing. But still I guarantee if I look in my pantry right now there will be more mung beans than any family needs.

These may seem like small things but I think it's these quirks or little habits that make us stand out from the crowd. They are the things that will stand out when our kids think about us in years to come. And we all have them. I guarantee you do! It may not be mung beans or cleaning. But I guarantee it's SOMETHING! And while I do still hope that I can pass along the legacy of caring, faith, family and friends, I'm fine if there are other things my kids remember me for too. Especially if it makes them smile. I don't mind at all if they laugh about or even at me when I'm gone. Legacy. I think the trick is to not focus so much on the legacy but to just focus on family. To water those mung beans and see what grows.



October - Celebrating "100 Years of the Annual "Fire Prevention

**Week" Program** 



As the month of October appears once again on our calendars, we are reminded that it is time to direct departmental focus to our annual Fire **Prevention Week messaging**. This program encourages all fire services to reflect on the overall level of fire safety in their community, and to ensure the dissemination of the critical life/safety message that Fire Prevention serves as the 'first line of fire defense' in every community. The original Fire Prevention Week was celebrated in 1922, which dictates that 2022 be recognized as its Centennial Year. While the fire service has seen many changes over the past 100 years, fire prevention remains as the 'corner stone' to the creating a community that is fire safe. Fire fighting is an essential service (as it is critical to preserve both personal and community safety) if/when a fire does occur. However, the importance of residents being aware of fire safety concerns, and the actions that they can enact to help prevent fires from occurring are equally important to the development of a fire safe community. That is why throughout the year, and especially during Fire Prevention Week, you will encounter firefighters continuing to remind friends and neighbours of possible fire dangers, safe steps they can take to prevent unwanted fires, and safe actions they can undertake if they are actually confronted by a

A unique fire safety theme is adopted for every annual Fire Prevention Week. For 2022, that theme is titled:

fire situation.

#### "Fire Won't Wait! Plan Your Escape."

Although 'Fire Escape' themes have been the focus of previous fire safety campaigns, the addition this year of the extra caution 'Fire Won't Wait' is meant to address the changing reality with regard to the increasing pace of fire spread, as well as the release of toxic gases during modern building fires (including in our homes). As a result, if/when a fire does occur, there is an urgent need to exit the building as quickly as possible - to ensure your safety, as well that of your family or guests. In your home, the two (2) best actions you can take to ensure a safe exit if there is a fire include;

- Ensure your **SMOKE ALARM** is working: It is designed to detect any smoke hazard, and provide an early alert of a fire occurrence in your home, and
- Create and practise your family FIRE ESCAPE PLAN, so that you have already thought about, and planned and actioned the safe exit routine. Occupants need to leave the house, call 911 from outside, proceed to the designated meeting place, and ensure

that everyone is accounted for. It was disappointing to learn recently that fire investigators have found that many Ontarians who died in house fires in recent years did not have working smoke alarms in their homes, and therefore did not receive an early warning of the fire threat. In today's house fires, a speedy alert to the fire threat and a speedy exit are critical to remaining safe. Remember to check your Smoke alarms at least monthly to ensure they are working, and do prepare and practise a Fire Escape **Plan** with all household members. When travelling, it is also important to familiarize yourself with the fire safety plans posted in your room (found on the back of the room's entry door) so you are aware of the recommended exits from the building.

Some family members (for whatever reason) may require special consideration(s) to ensure their safe exit in a fire situation. Include these needs in your Fire Escape planning. Things as simple as having a walker escape route, or having necessary medications or other designated necessities in a pre-determined location so they can easily be picked up upon exiting the building. Preparedness, and familiarity with the action plan is key to a safe exit for

With the coming of October, Fall has officially arrived! Regardless of the weather, our focus reluctantly turns to the usual but necessary tasks of fall – yard and garden clean up, as well as making preparations for the coming winter. Look for the Autumn Fire Safety piece in this month's Neebing News, for a selection of good fall home and yard fire safety reminders.

While Fire Prevention Week is the most significant fire safety activity of the month, there are a few other events in October worthy of note:

- Thanksgiving: Falling on the Monday of Fire Prevention Week, Thanksgiving is a significant time of family gathering and celebration. It is an important time to remember fire safety considerations related to group activities such as cooking, smoking and/or 'drinking'.
- Halloween: October 31st is notable as the last day of the regulated seven (7) month Fire Season in Northern Ontario. However, it is more commonly celebrated as Halloween, when the ghosts and goblins and trickor-treaters go door to door seekgoodies from their neighbours. For a number of years now, Neebing Emergency Services (NES) has held a **drop**by event at Fire Hall #1 (at the intersection of Highway 608 and 61) for young Neebing visitors -

to show-off their fancy costumes, and of course pick up treats. Although COVID did disrupt the event for two (2) years, last year's drive thru/ hand-out event was well received, so for 2022 we are looking forward to another suc-

cessful walk-thru event. Event: Halloween - "Drop By / Walk Thru"

#### The Rural Pharmacist: Bivalent COVID Vaccine, Flu Shots, Norwest Clinic

PSA: Don't forget! Our new Kakabeka Coffee Shop, The Early Refill Coffee is OPEN EARLY! Starting at 7:30am Monday-Friday and 8:30am on Saturday! Grab a coffee, espresso or latte for your daily commute!

Trick or treat! We've got a new flavour of COVID vaccine and a flu shot coming soon! Leave your pillowcase candy sacks at home, roll up those sleeves and show me that shoulder. The new Moderna Bivalent vaccine (aka Omicron Booster) is now available at both Kakabeka Falls and Rosslyn locations. Bivalent means that the vaccine is developed to protect against the original coronavirus strain and the more common omicron variant circulating now. The Moderna bivalent vaccine can be received by any person, regardless of whether they have received Pfizer or Moderna vaccines in the past, as these mRNA vaccines can be used interchangeably. At the time of writing, the Ministry of Health has only released the Moderna bivalent vaccine. We expect to receive this Pfizer Bivalent vaccine once it is released, but we don't have information on when that will be available. Sign up for our email newsletter on our website www.evergreenrx.ca to receive email updates when we receive Pfizer Bivalent, along with other pharmacy updates (like flu shot availability!)

All individuals aged 18 years and older may receive a COVID-19 bivalent booster dose, regardless of the number of booster doses received.

<u>How long to wait between COVID-19 vaccine doses?</u> The current guidance from the Ministry states that booster doses may be given if <u>at least 6 months</u> have passed since the individual's last dose of a COVID-19 vaccine, regardless of how many boosters they've received. However, with informed consent, eligible individuals may receive a booster dose if <u>at least 3 months</u> have passed since their previous dose.

Recently had a COVID-19 infection and wondering how soon you can get a bivalent booster dose? A booster dose is recommended after a minimum of 3 months after symptom onset or positive test (if asymptomatic); however, a 6-month interval may provide better immune response regardless of the product given. Currently, data is limited regarding the immune response provided by prior COVID-19 infection and the length of protection provided. However, there is early evidence that immunity from previous COVID-19 infection without vaccination does not provide the best protection against reinfection with COVID-19. The vaccines are available on various days throughout the week at each location. We are hoping to open up clinic days, where we can do a large volume of patients in an efficient manner as well. Visit our website and find "BOOK YOUR COVID VACCINE HERE/FLU SHOT WAITLIST" on the homepage, then click on your preferred location to book an appointment and find more info about availability.

FLU SHOTS! We've just received information that the flu vaccines will be made available mid-October for limited availability ordering, then full time ordering/availability late October Flu vaccines will begin by appointment only due to high demand, then we will make walk-ins available once demand slows. You can sign up for our flu shot wait list on our website on the homepage where it says, "BOOK YOUR COVID VACCINE HERE/FLU SHOT WAITLIST". Note: it is safe and effective to get both your COVID vaccine and flu shots on the same day. There is no requirement wait any period between these vaccines, except for children under 5 who are recommended to wait two weeks between vaccines.

We will be carrying the standard flu shot (Quadrivalent) and the high dose 65+ flu shot (Trivalent). As we expect every year, the Ministry of Health is usually in shorter supply of the high dose 65+ flu shot, but the standard flu shot is still very effective and recommended for those 65+. Vaccine shopping is not recommended, and we recommend getting whichever vaccine is available to you.

In fact, the standard flu shot (quadrivalent) protects against four strains of the flu, whereas the high dose 65+ flu shot (trivalent) protects against three strains of the flu; however, the high dose 65+ shot offers better protection against the strain that is most common to hospitalize seniors. Both vaccines have their benefits!

The Norwest Community Health Centre Kakabeka Clinic is NOW OPEN! They are still getting their feet under them as they get started and evolve. They have started with footcare and Nurse Practitioner appointments for their rostered patients and will have information available soon for when they plan to run Walk-In Clinics and other services. You can reach the clinic at 807-473-5528 or drop by to inquire about services. Interested in being rostered to their clinic? Pick up a patient intake form from their clinic.
