Staff and volunteers of the Municipality of Neebing welcome our new Council and look forward to this new term.

In the last edition of the Neebing News, it was reported that the election for the Crooks seat ended in a tie. A recount was held and the votes were still tied. As required by the Municipal Elections Act, a name was drawn from a hat. Obie Egbuchulam's name was drawn and he was declared the elected candidate. Unfortunately, Mr. Egbuchulam was unable to accept the seat due to a conflict with his employment.

The Inaugural Meeting of the new Council was held on November 15th where the new Council members made their declarations of office. Due to the employment conflict, Mr. Egbuchulam did not make the declaration of office and the seat was declared vacant. Once a seat becomes vacant, Council has the authority to appoint an individual to the seat. At the first regular meeting of the new Council, Brian Wright was appointed to the Crooks seat.

Statement from Obie Egbuchulam to Council and Neebing Constituents:

This is a happy moment for me. Thank you, Crooks Township residents/neighbors. The 2022 Neebing Municipal Elections have ended.

As the declared winner of the Crooks Township municipal election, I feel humbled by this result. Meeting residents and having meaningful conversations remains the highlight of my campaign— the best part.

I have had some conversations with my competition, Brian Wright. I hope this process added to his experience and resolve going forward. I believe he now appreciates the needs and interests of Crooks residents more and will work harder to deliver.

Due to personal and career-related reasons, I cannot accept this win, the councilor position for Crooks Township, in this dispensation. The council position presented a conflict of interest with my job, I was told by HR much later. The organization's policy states that employees can't run for elective positions. If an employee wants to run, they must resign first.

It was a tough decision for me to make, but I pray that the good people of Crooks Township and Neebing understand. This is not the last you'll hear from me; actually, it is the beginning of our long and prosperous relationship as I will use the years ahead to better prepare to serve my community and provide stellar stewardship!

Show Me the Money

Almost all of us want to pay as little as possible for property tax. But how are property taxes determined? Budgets are set each year by the Municipality that affect how much property tax residents will pay.

Legislation requires that Municipalities must have a balanced budget. This means that what comes in must match what goes out; and, just like a personal Budget, if the Municipality want to spend more in certain areas, we either must make more (or borrow), spend less in other areas, or do both.

However, Municipalities can also save for future events such as the replacement of a bridge. These savings for the future are called reserves. Determining the amount to contribute towards reserves are an important part of budget decision making, but these amounts are also venerable to budget cuts, as decisions that affect current year items tend to be viewed as having a higher priority.


The budget cycle in Neebing begins the pervious Fall with the passing of the Capital Plan, and discussions with staff and various committees are held. Budgets are typically reviewed at least four times by Council before being passed, this review begins at the end of January and the final review is completed in May when the budget is passed.


Why is the budget not set earlier? The exact amounts that the Municipality must pay to different organizations and the amount of money coming in can change in the early part of the year, and these changes can affect the Budget. In larger Municipalities these changes have less of an effect on the overall budget.


The Public is welcome to Budget meetings. Council will set the date for the first budget meeting soon, so check the website the Neebing News in early January to find the date.






Notice of a Public Meeting being held to consider an application for a proposed Land Severance (Application Number B06-2022)

THE CORPORATION OF THE MUNICIPALITY OF NEEBING

Please take notice that the Council of The Corporation of the Municipality of Neebing, sitting as Committee of the Whole, will hold a Public Meeting on Wednesday, December 7, 2022, at 5:30 p.m., at the Neebing Municipal Office to consider a proposed severance under Section 53 of the Planning Act, R.S.O. 1990, c. P.13, as amended. The Committee's recommendations to Council will be considered for ratification at the Regular Council Meeting on the same evening, commencing at 6:00 p.m.

The Application (B06-2022) is brought by Mary Hodder, the property owner. The land parcel which is the subject matter of the application has municipal address 213 East Oliver Lake Road, and is legally described as "Concession 4 South Part Lot 6, MR68, Parcel 1550, in the geographic Scoble Township, in the Municipality of Neebing and Province of Ontario". This is referred to as the "Subject Property".

The purpose of the proposed severance is to sell a portion of the property to a neighbouring landowner to increase the size of their property. The parcel that is being severed was originally a separate lot but was merged in title under the Planning Act with the property at 301 East Oliver Lake Road. The parcel of land to which the severed parcel is proposed to be added is 211 East Oliver Lake Road. The severed parcel will be rectangular in shape, and does not have road frontage. A sketch showing the lot configuration is included with the application, a copy of which is available on the Neebing website (www.neebing.org/notices) or by contacting the Municipal Office.

ANY PERSON may attend the Public Meeting and/or make written or verbal presentations either in support of, or in opposition to, the proposed severance. If a person or public body that files an appeal of a decision of the Committee of the Whole in respect of the proposed severance does not make oral submissions at this public meeting, or does not provide written submissions prior to the decision of the Council in the matter, the Ontario Land Tribunal may not grant them status to maintain the appeal.

- c) Register to speak at the Public Meeting (whether in-person or electronically), in advance, to clerk@neebing.org, or by calling the Clerk-Treasurer at the number below; or
- d) Attend the public meeting in-person, or via electronic means, and register with the Clerk-Treasurer, upon arrival, indicating your wish to address the Public Meeting orally.

Please note that, in order to be considered, written comments must be submitted by 4:30 p.m. on Wednesday, December 7, 2022. It is the writer's responsibility to check with the Clerk-Treasurer, using the contact information below, to confirm that electronically submitted or mailed written comments have been received

What's Been Happening at Council Meetings?

Since the November edition, there has been one regular meeting of Council on November 2nd and 16th. The inaugural meeting of the new term of Council was held on November 15th.

At the regular Council meeting on November 2nd, the following matters were considered:

- Council authorized initiating discussions with the MNRF regarding snowmobile trail development.
- Council authorized the renewal of the advertisement in the annual Superior Country Travel Guide.
- Council directed Administration to register delegates for the Rural Ontario Municipal Association (ROMA) Conference.
- Council passed a by-law to amend the procedure by-law to change the date of the inaugural meeting of Council.

At the inaugural meeting on November 15th, the new member of council for the 2022-2026 term were sworn in and each member provided an opportunity to say a few words to mark the start of the new term.

At the regular Council meeting on November 16th, the following matters were considered:

- Council declared the Crooks seat vacant and appointed Brian Wright as the Councillor for Crooks.
- Council reviewed the procedure by-law.
- Council reviewed appointments for various committees and positions.
 Appointments will be formalized through a by-law at the December 7th Council meeting.
- Council directed Administration to submit delegation requests for various Ministers at the ROMA conference.
- Council reviewed the province's proposed legislative changes related to the More Homes Built Faster Act

The next Council meeting will be held on December 7th. Regular Council meetings are normally scheduled for the 1st and 3rd Wednesday of each month



These days as I care for my own home and family, and the homes of others, my apron pockets collect things during the day and get emptied and sorted

Things that have wandered from their rightful owner and place and need some direction. When I go out on errands and to doctor's appointments deep pockets are a lifesaver right now. I need my hands as free as possible so purses just aren't my style. Pockets mean quick access to my phone, keys, money, ID and more. I have a pocket just for loose change.

If you've ever purchased an old jacket or sweater from the thrift store and found an old note or grocery list in the pocket from a previous owner, you'll understand how exciting it can be. It's like a secret moment in time. A pocket of memory. Or when you put your hand in the pocket of last year's winter coat and find a twenty dollar bill. Or that earring you thought you'd lost forever. Simple joyful moments. Shopping for any clothes these days, pockets are top of my must -have list. Deep enough to hold important things without fear of them falling out, strong enough to not rip or fray from over use, but still lay flat enough to look at least a bit stylish. If they can hold a small Bible or paper-back as well as my phone I am over the moon. Small ornate pockets, or heaven forbid one of those 'fake' sewn-up pockets what's the use? And if you're more a dress or skirt person, well yup those need and should have pockets too if you ask me! And while right now my pockets serve more of a 'utility' purpose, I hope that they can one day be a hiding place for treasures for my grandkids on the search for mints or loose change or some other secret stash. I wanna be like Santa with pockets filled with mini candy canes that somehow just appear in my big white gloved hand over and over again. And I hope that today and always, and especially at Christmas, that my pockets will be as deep and overflowing as my heart, ready to give and share whenever and to whomever is in need. As we reflect back on 2022 we would like Neebing residents to know that it has been the pleasure of NES Fire and 1st Response volunteers to have responded to Neebing residents in their time of need throughout the year. While at times pandemic restrictions meant we were not able to respond to all medical calls, as the year has unfolded and pandemic restrictions have diminished we were delighted to return to pre pandemic response mode. We see call levels returning to near pre pandemic levels and NES expects to have responded to more than one hundred (100) calls for emergency assistance in Neebing in 2022.

A special Thank You to all Neebing residents for the support and assistance given to NES by our Neebing neighbours throughout 2022. Whether providing a hand, or helpful neighborhood information to responders during a response, supporting community fire safety and fund raising activities, or taking extra care with burning throughout the fire season, all are appreciated by NES volunteers.

While national and global priorities changed rapidly over the year there is one priority that remains constant and should always be in the forefront of your mind and that is the fire safety of your home and family. Over the year, NES provides a variety of fire safety messages, from individual safety such as Stop Drop and Roll, seasonally focused safety tips like BBQ safety, to simple reminders to Check your Smoke Alarms. These messages appear in a number of places including; on this page, on the website on the highway sign boards or in handouts provided at community events. Hopefully these small reminders of simple actions you can take day to day help you and your families remain fire safe throughout the year.

As 2022 draws to a close seasonal fire safety messages abound regarding seasonal fire safety concerns from; heating appliances, electrical cords and the dangers of seasonal socializing. The Rural Pharmacist:

Children's Medicine Shortage. Can Santa and His Elves Help Us Out?

Toilet paper shortages and staff shortages are one thing throughout the COVID pandemic, but children's medicine shortage, such as Children's Tylenol and Advil, is another thing. Nobody is happy about it! Nobody likes to see the children affected by shortages, especially when they're ill and there are so few options as medicine for your little one.

At the time of writing, we have received notice that Health Canada has secured a foreign supply of Children's Tylenol to supplied to community pharmacies. Pharmacies haven't been notified of how many each pharmacy will receive, but it will be based on sales history. The supply is to be expected late November.

Our pharmacies are also expecting to receive some of the raw ingredients (acetaminophen powder, etc) so that we can compound acetaminophen suspension in our stores to sell overthe-counter. However, the compounded acetaminophen suspension must be kept in the fridge and only

has a stability of 14 days. Our pharmacy will also need to keep a record of who is purchasing our compounded acetaminophen products with names and contact information.

Also of note, these products do not require a prescription, contrary to media articles from a month or so ago. Although we keep them behind the counter to prevent stockpiling, they can still be purchased OTC.

We are doing whatever we can to help alleviate the challenges with this shortage, as we do with any medication shortages. We've also been trying to help any parents with sick children by offering dosing alternatives with acetaminophen or ibuprofen tablets. For example, most children's medication is dosed based on weight, so most doses can be achieved by splitting adult tablets into quarters or halves, depending on the child's weight. The split tablet can then be crushed and added to a soft food, if necessary. Talk to our pharmacists if you need assistance with dosing. Otherwise, hopefully we will have some compounded acetaminophen available soon! Sign up for our email newsletter for updates on when some of these products will be available.

We appreciate everyone shopping local for Christmas! We have some great gift ideas in our gift shop, along with gift cards available for both our gift shop and The Early Refill Coffee.

It's been a busy and long year for everyone, including our pharmacy team at Evergreen Pharmacy. We can't thank everyone in the community enough for your continued business and support, especially as we transitioned into our new building in Kakabeka. There were (and still are!) some long weeks and days throughout the year, and we appreciate your patience as things continue to fall into place. (Moving feels never ending! Sheesh!) We look forward to continue to expand services and grow to meet the needs of our communities out of Kakabeka and Rosslyn.

We wish everyone a Merry Christmas and Happy New Year! Maybe Santa has room on his sleigh to bring everyone a sack full of children's medicine? If he does let us know, we can utilize those reindeer for an efficient prescription delivery alternative when our northern country roads are in poor driving condition!




