

What can be taken to the landfill sites?

Household Garbage

Regular household garbage can be disposed of at both the Sand Hill and Scoble Landfill sites. Each bag must be tagged with a municipal bag tag. Annual bag tags can be picked up at the landfill sites by showing your photo ID.

Recycling Programs

Blue Box Items

- Containers (placed in bags)– pop cans, metal cans, milk cartons, tetra paks, plastic containers #1 to #7
- Paper Products (not bagged) flyers, flattened cardboard, paper, newspaper, magazines, flattened box board (such as cereal or cracker boxes)
 * Paper products must be separated from containers.

Electronics

The following electronic items can be dropped off for recycling: display devices, non-cellular telephones, cellular devices and pagers, home audio/video systems, desktop computers, floor-standing photocopiers/multi-function devices, portable computers, computer peripherals, desktop printers/multi-function devices, personal/portable audio/video systems, home theater in-a-box systems, and aftermarket vehicle audio/video systems.

Tires

Used tires can be dropped off at both landfill sites.

Batteries

Old batteries can be dropped off at both landfill sites. Accepted batteries are AA AAA C D 6 and 9-volt watch and cellphone batteries. Look for the signage and blue 45-gallon drums.

Metal

Any scrap metal can be recycled. Any item with metal in it should be placed in the "Metals" bin. Freezers, air conditioners and refrigerators must display a tag or notice signed by a certified technician indicating that the fluorocarbons known as CFCs, HCFCs or HFCs have been removed.

Other No Charge Areas

Clean wood and brush, ashes and compost can be dropped off at both landfill sites.

Good Neighbour Shed

Items in good condition can be dropped off in the Good Neighbour Shed for others to take.

**Items NOT accepted include upholstered furniture, baby furniture and car seats, electrical items, old magazines, and broken or damaged items. Please, use good judgement when placing your used items in the sheds.

The facilities at the landfill sites are not designed to protect fabric items from the elements and critters. Consider donating your upholstered furniture and clothing to one of the several thrift stores in Thunder Bay.

Bulky Items and Construction Debris

Bulky items and construction debris are only accepted at the Sand Hill Landfill Site. This includes items such as building construction materials, drywall, tubs, toilets, furniture (wood or upholstered), mattresses, glass, vinyl siding, plastics, etc. For a schedule of fees, visit our website at https://www.neebing.org/en/living-here/landfill-and-recycling.aspx.



Items NOT Accepted at the Landfill Sites

Hazardous Waste (such as paint, oil, aerosols, etc.) is not accepted at either landfill site. Watch for hazardous waste disposal events or contact the supplier for options to dispose of hazardous waste.

Fluorescent lights are considered hazardous waste and are not accepted at either landfill site. They can be disposed of at one of the following locations:

Residential

- Westburne Electric Supply, 1231 Amber Drive, 344-3100. Accepts boxed/packaged tubes but not loose. Call for applicable fees.
- Gescan-A, 565 Dunlop Street, 623-8404. Call for applicable fees. Commercial
- MGM Electric, 724 MacDonnell Street, 345-7767 (PCB free ballasts are also accepted). Call ahead for applicable fees. Small fee for handling.



What's Been Happening at Council Meetings?

Since the February edition, there has been two regular meetings of Council on February 1 and 15, 2023. There were also two Special Council meetings on February 1 and 15, 2023.

At the Special Council meeting on February 1st, Council heard a presentation from MPAC on property assessment in Ontario.

At the regular Council meeting on February 1st the following matters were considered:

- Council heard a deputation from Fire Marque regarding recovery of emergency response expenses through insurance claims.
- Council approved participation in the Lake Superior North Shore Tourism Project Phase II.
- Council approved participation in the Great Lakes Waterfront Trail Expansion Project.
- Council passed a resolution regarding House of Commons Bill C-21 relating to firearms restrictions.
- Council passed supporting resolutions relating to violence against women and Bill 42, Gender Affirming Healthcare Act.

At the Special Council meeting on February 15th, the Committee of the Whole reviewed two applications for severance. Recommendations to approve the applications were ratified at the regular Council meeting later that evening.

At the regular Council meeting on February 15th, the following matters were considered:

- Council approved a letter of support for the funding application related to the Lake Superior North Shore Tourism Project Phase II.
- Council approved set fine schedules for various by-laws.
- Council approved work to improve the parking at the Sturgeon Bay Boat Launch.
- Council deferred recommendations from the Cemetery Board to a future budget meeting.
- Council directed Administration to register members for the Northwestern Ontario Municipal Association conference that is being held in Thunder Bay.

The next Council meetings will be held on March 1 and 15, 2023. Regular Council meetings are normally scheduled for the 1st and 3rd Wednesday of each month.

This article contains only highlights from Council meetings – visit the website to see the approved minutes from each of the meetings. The minutes of each meeting are approved at the following meeting and are posted on the website once they have been approved and signed. If you don't have internet capabilities, you can always contact the office for copies of approved minutes.

Meeting agendas are always posted online on the Friday prior to the Wednesday meeting. Come out and see what your Council is doing on your behalf. Feel free to contact the Municipal Office for further information or with input into any of the items that Council is considering. The meetings are now being held at the Municipal Office, but there is the option to attend virtually as well. The links to login to the meetings are posted on our website in the calendar details.


Renovations to the Municipal Office began on January 23, 2023. During construction, we

P.13, as amended. The Committee's recommendations to Council will be considered for ratification at the Regular Council Meeting on the same evening, commencing at 6:00 p.m.

The Application (B03-2023) is brought by Darren Leduchowski, the property owner. Aging and Health

Property taxes are determined separately by each Municipality, and the amount of property tax that someone pays depends on how much money your Municipality needs to raise to meet their financial obligations.

If the Municipality each determine how much money they need to raise, then how does the assessed value of a property relate the amount of property tax you have to pay?

Each year, once the budget is finalized, Council will pass a Bylaw that sets the municipal tax rate. The assessed value of each property is multiplied by the municipal tax rate to determine the amount of municipal tax owed. Municipalities also collect education tax for the Province, so properties also have their assessed value multiplied by an education tax rate that is set by the Province.

So, if the budget remains the same each year, and all the property assessments in a Municipality increase by the same percentage, the tax rate is lowered and the amount of Municipal property tax you pay is roughly the same.

Other than increases to the municipal budget, what can cause changes in the amount of property tax someone pays?

If a property's assessed value increases at a higher percentage that other properties, then that property will have higher taxes. For example, if someone builds a garage or an addition, the assessed value of their property will increase more than other properties. Because the property increased in value by a different percentage than other properties, the amount of property tax will increase.



The Municipal Property Assessment Corporation (MPAC) is responsible for determining the assessed value of all properties in Ontario. Their website www.mpac.ca offers education regarding how property is assessed.



March - So Much to Celebrate



Regardless of the Groundhog's 2023 weather 'forecast', the potential for six [6] more weeks of winter is over in mid-March. With all things being equal (unlike last year), obvious signs of spring like warmer temperatures and more rain vs snow, should soon be apparent, as we move on through the month. Other signs of seasonal change should become evident as well, as the hours of daylight lengthen, and the evenings growing even longer with the switch to Daylight Savings Time with the hour hand springing forward by one [1] hour) on March 12th. Very interesting..... just in time for students to take advantage of the extra evening daylight hours to enjoy

their upcoming *March Break*, which begins on **March 13th**.

The Ides of March on March 15th are remembered more somberly due to historical events on that day. However, March 17th marks the celebration of St. Patrick's Day, a time when everyone / anyone regardless of heritage - is welcome to enjoy the opportunity to celebrate the Patron Saint of Ireland. These celebrations are said to have begun some 1500 years ago, and in the northern regions are considered to be a signal that spring has arrived. Should you be looking for more scientific assurance that winter will soon be gone, Mother Nature has gifted us with the Spring Equinox – which will occur this year on March 20th at 5:24 pm (to be accurate) marking the time when the sun is above the Equator, having completed half of its journey north for the year, and officially heralding the moment when **SPRING 2023** arrives in the northern hemisphere.

While we are celebrating the arrival of spring, there are a number of fire safety tips to keep in mind to ensure full enjoyment of the pleasures that March has to offer. March is still considered to be a 'heating season' month in Neebing, when indoor temperatures continue to be maintained by a home's heat source (oil, propane, natural gas, heat-pump, wood or solar panels) and generally indoor activities prevail. Fire safety considerations in March include ensuring that; electrical systems are not overloaded, nor cooking in the kitchen or on the BBQ, is ever left unattended, and be sure to check the chimney(s) for creosote buildup or structural weak spots and cleaning or repair (if necessary), and inspect furnace vents to ensure they are clear of snow or obstruction and are properly venting exhaust gasses, including Carbon Monoxide, from the home. And be sure to check your CO and Smoke Alarms, as they are possibly the most important fire safety devices in your home, regardless of the

Modern house fires tend to grow rapidly and generate smoke and toxic gases that can very quickly incapacitate occupants. Working CO/SMOKE alarms and a practiced Home Fire Escape Plan are key to providing early warning and safe exit should a fire occur in your home. As reported last month, the Ontario Fire Marshal has noted a significant increase in fire fatalities in Ontario where smoke alarms were either not working or not present. NES is looking at what actions it may take that can help Neebing residents ensure they always have working CO & Smoke Alarms in their homes.

In 2023, March 22nd will see the inaugural draw of the Neebing Fire Rescue Association (NFRA) 50/50 draw. NFRA has been raising funds to support Fire and 1st Response teams in Neebing for some 40 years through all means of activities - from bake sales and teas, penny and silent auctions, in person and online promotional activities and raffles, and now, for the first time a web based 50/50 draw. The draw appears to be receiving solid support, and NES Thanks the residents and friends of Neebing for their continued and ongoing support, in assisting NES obtain the equipment needed to provide the highest possible level of fire and 1st response service for our community.

On a related front, NES and Neebing Council have been made aware of a potential source of funding available through residential home insurance policies. It appears that many home insurance policies contain a provision for payment of costs incurred by fire departments in responding to non-medical emergencies at a property. While homeowners in Neebing are not required to pay for firefighting costs 'out of pocket', in those cases where the insurance policy includes a provision for some firefighting cost recovery, those funds, if accessed, could be useful in replacing older equipment or providing training or education to our Volunteer Firefighters.

Information received to date indicates that the amount of funding for Fire extinguishment reimbursement is small, and it should not impact either the policy holder's insurance rates nor any payout on their policy damage claim. And if there is provision in a homeowner's policy for cost recovery of fire extinguishment and the claim is not made, the money is not paid out to anyone and remains with the insurance company. The funds are only available if the Fire Department is aware of the provision and

makes a claim directly to the insurer. In the case where the home owner policy does not have the insurance provision for fire cost recovery, no claim would be assessed to the homeowner. NES is working with municipal administration to determine if and how, this process might possibly work in Neebing. Looks interesting and expect to hear more on this in upcoming months. With Spring Month Officially here, Enjoy the longer days, warmer temperatures and prepare for the summer soon to fol-



Since December 1974, LRCA staff have conducted snow surveys in the following three locations: McVicar Creek (Blanchard Street), Pennock Creek (Vibert Road), and Current River (Hazelwood Lake). Snow depth and equivalent water content were near/slightly above average compared to the historical averages for February 15th. Average snow depth was 4% above average (between 40 to 57 centimetres), and average equivalent water content was 24% above average (between 104 to 137 millimetres). Lake Superior's beginning of February level was 19 centimetres above its period-ofrecord (1918-2021) average, and 31 centimetres above the February 2022 level.

Please note that the 2023 Tree Seedling Program has been cancelled. The LRCA and Hill's Greenhouses look forward to returning in 2024.

Believe it or not, but spring is fast approaching, which means that ice conditions will start becoming more unstable. This is a reminder to exercise caution around waterways. The LRCA does not monitor ice conditions in our Conservation Areas; if you plan to go out on the ice, proceed with caution and at your own

Also, be sure to wear appropriate footwear while visiting Conservation Areas. The LRCA does not maintain trails during the winter, so conditions may range from deep snow to ice-covered to muddy and wet. With nicer weather on the horizon, visitation to Conservation Areas is going to increase, so we would like to remind visitors to use caution, as natural trails may be uneven and slippery. It's always a good idea to prepare for how the weather may affect your visit. Be sure to advise others of how long you expect to be in the area, and you should be aware of possible encounters with wildlife. Conservation Areas operate from dawn until dusk. Pets must be on-leash at all times. Alcohol is prohibited in Conservation Areas. Campfires and overnight camping is also prohibited. Trails are for recreational use only; no bicycles, motorized vehicles, etc. Harvesting of any kind is prohibited. Visitors must adhere to all Conservation Area Rules & Regulations. These regulations are in place to ensure that all visitors to Conservation Areas can enjoy them in a safe, sustainable manner. Thank you for your cooperation, and have fun exploring!

The Rural Pharmacist: Explaining the Process of Minor Ailment Prescribing through Example

Welcome back to this edition of The Rural Pharmacist! Since the Ontario government passed the pharmacistled Minor Ailment Prescribing program in January we've begun to see a flow of patients utilize this service at our two rural locations. With that has come an opportunity for our pharmacists to educate our patients on the utility of this service.

As mentioned in our February 2023 instalment of The Rural pharmacist, pharmacists in Ontario can now assess and prescribe for 13 minor ailments. Conditions range from uncomplicated urinary tract infections (UTI's) to cold sores. Generally, a minor ailment is a condition that meets the following criteria: the condition is usually short term, it does not regularly require lab results, there is a low risk that presenting symptoms may mask a more severe condition, there are no medication or medical conditions that present a red flag and, minimal follow-up is required.

The intent of this service is to help patients get the care they need sooner and closer to home. It will also help reduce strain on hospitals, emergency departments, walk-in clinics, and physician offices. Better yet, all you need is a health card to access this service at Ontario pharmacies.

So far, uncomplicated urinary tract infections have been the most common condition presented by our patients (although we have been presented with a few complicated cases). For that reason, I felt it a good idea to expand on the process that pharmacists undertake when presented with a possible UTI.

The first step a pharmacist will take when initiating an assessment for an uncomplicated urinary tract infection will be to ensure that this condition has been diagnosed in the past by a physician or nurse practitioner. The idea here is that the patient is familiar with the presenting symptoms and can confidently predict that this is indeed a urinary tract infection. In other words, the pharmacist is not performing an initial diagnosis.

Secondly, the pharmacist will determine how often the symptoms present themselves. Does this happen once per year? Twice? Every month? Based off this information, the pharmacist will either continue with their assessment or make a referral to the patient's primary care team.

As we work through our treatment algorithm, pharmacists will ask a series of questions to better understand a patient's condition, the medications that they take and, any red flags that may warrant a referral.

If a patient meets the requirements, our pharmacists can prescribe the most appropriate antibiotic to treat the suspected underlying infection. This information is then shared with the patient's primary care team. In addition, our pharmacy team would follow up with the patient in about a week to ensure everything is going according to plan. If not, a referral can then be made with the patient's physician or nurse practitioner at that time.

It should be noted that there have already been a few encounters in which a patient could not be prescribed an antibiotic. However, this

shouldn't be cause for discouragement. Instead, in this circumstance, the pharmacist acts as a guide to get you into the right hands. I know it's not always convenient. However, it's a safe approach that will help ensure patients get the proper care they need.

Hopefully this article will help shed light on how the minor ailments program is utilized in a community pharmacy. If you have any questions about how to program works or, if you may qualify, please do not hesitate to reach out to our staff!




